City Council Meeting of April 22, 2025

BUDGET STUDY SESSION DISCUSSION: FISCAL YEAR 2024-25 AND 2025-26 OPERATING AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT BUDGET

RECOMMENDATION:

- Receive information
- Provide direction on additional staffing, capital outlay and one-time expenditures; and capital projects for incorporation into the Fiscal Year 2025-26 and Fiscal Year 2026-27 Operating and Capital Improvement Budget

BACKGROUND:

In preparation for the Fiscal Year 2025-26 and 2026-27 budget process, the City held the following meetings:

March 7 -8	City Council Retreat: Priorities for the Fiscal Year 2025-26 and 2026-27 Budget
March 29	Community Budget Meeting
March 31	Continuation of the City Council Retreat related to budget priorities

During the retreat, preliminary financial information was presented, which included a review of ongoing revenues and expenditures, financial projections, fund balances, and the current capital improvement program list. The Council also received information from the Community Budget Meeting, and provided updates and ranking information for the Consolidated Projects List.

ANALYSIS:

Staff applied the ranking information from the Council Retreat to the updated Consolidated Projects List (**EXHIBIT A**). The consolidated list and City Values statements were used to develop a list of potential funding priorities for the Fiscal Year 2025-26 and 2026-27 Budget.

On-Going Revenues and Expenditures

At the time of the Council Retreat, the department requests and draft expenditure requests were still being reviewed. The original estimate for on-going revenues and expenditures, prior to adding any new or on-going costs were \$300,000 and \$600,000 for each of the two budgeted years. This amount has been revised to approximately \$390,000 annually based on updated routine operational needs. City Council Resolution 2012-46 requires the adoption of a balanced budget. This is defined as a budget where recurring annual expenses do not exceed annual revenues. To maintain a balanced budget in the forthcoming fiscal years, the amount of new positions and recurring costs are evaluated to determine if the proposed budget meets this criteria.

The City Council has the authority to direct the City Manager to prepare a budget that does not meet the balanced budget formula calculation. The preliminary recommended positions and ongoing expenses for Fiscal Year 2025-26 and Fiscal Year 2026-27 are proposed to result in an operating deficit of approximately \$372,000 (**EXHIBIT B**). Staff is recommending

incorporating these costs into the forthcoming budget to align with Council priorities and community growth. It is anticipated that with continued economic development, this deficit will be covered by on-going new revenues in the third year. To accommodate for this transitionary period, the City Manager is recommending setting aside approximately \$1.1 million to cover the three-year projected shortfall. This amount can be evaluated during the mid-cycle update or as part of the next budget cycle.

Capital Outlay

The initial capital outlay purchases include new vehicle purchases, equipment to enhance maintenance and public safety efforts; software to streamline processes, and a technology master plan to evaluate technology infrastructure and future needs. This information can be found in **EXHIBIT C**.

Capital Projects and General Fund Preliminary Estimated Fund Balance

The current capital project list and status' are included in **EXHIBIT D**. In addition, potential new capital projects, along with proposed General Fund allocations are identified in **EXHIBIT E**. This attachment also includes the impact on the General Fund balance after the proposed capital outlay, new on-going costs, and recommended capital projects are applied. Additional unfunded projects or projects that may be funded with development impact fees, grants, or other sources are included in **EXHIBIT F**.

Capital projects associated with development impact fees and other sources will be brought back for consideration based on Council feedback; and the additional funding needed to complete projects that are underway.

Aquatics and Sports Center

During the Council Retreat and the Community Budget Meeting, staff introduced the concept of committing or transferring \$11.8 million to facilitate a loan for the construction of the Aquatics and Sports Center, along with an additional \$1 million from a deferred FORA funded project (EDR2302 – Highway 1 Downtown Interchange Project). The repayment source for the \$11.8 million loan would come from FORA CFD fee revenues that are estimated to be received through Fiscal Year 2032-33.

Preliminary financial information estimates that in the initial partial year and the first full year of operations, the Aquatics and Sports Center will be operating at a cumulative deficit of approximately \$600,000. This deficit represents the pre-revenue phase to allow for the initial training of new staff and set-up of the Center prior to the grand opening; and bridge funding to supplement the first full year of operations. This will allow the community to become more familiar with the facility.

Considerations

Additional considerations could include using some of the Pension Stabilization Fund balance to begin offset rising PERS rates, funding an actuarial study to assist with future pension planning, and increasing the cost recovery level of existing recreation programs to allow for increased programming.

Please note that this information is preliminary and the Proposed Budget will be updated to reflect any adjustments to operating and capital estimates.
