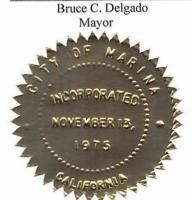

HONORING JACOB'S HEART CHILDREN'S CANCER SUPPORT SERVICES AND DECLARING SEPTEMBER 2022 AS CHILDHOOD CANCER AWARENESS MONTH IN THE CITY OF MARINA

WHEREAS, the character of our community is revealed in how we treat our most vulnerable; and

WHEREAS, each year, one in every 190 children in our community will be diagnosed with cancer; and

WHEREAS, cancer remains the leading cause of death by disease among children— more than asthma, diabetes, cystic fibrosis, congenital anomalies, and AIDS combined; and

WHEREAS, during the ongoing COVID-19 crisis Jacob's Heart has been keeping medically fragile children and families housed, fed and emotionally supported by steadfastly adhering to the following commitments: 1) Parents of children with cancer and other serious illnesses will be relieved of financial fears and able to focus attention on their children: 2) No child undergoing intensive treatment in our community will be homeless; 3) Families of seriously ill children will not experience food insecurity during and after the pandemic; and 4) No child seriously ill child in our community will ever miss a medical appointment because of a lack of transportation; and

WHEREAS, Jacob's Heart holds the memories and honors legacies of hundreds of children from our local community who have been lost to cancer, ensuring that their memories will never be forgotten; and

WHEREAS, the oncology department at Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford has worked closely with Jacob's Heart for the past 23 years as a trusted community partner in providing family-centered care that addresses the emotional, practical and financial struggles of families of children with cancer in the city of Marina; and

WHEREAS, it is important for all Marina City residents to recognize the impact of pediatric cancer on families within our community and honor the children in our community whose lives have been cut short by cancer.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bruce Carlos Delgado, Mayor of the city of Marina, hereby declare September 2022, as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month in the city of Marina and do hereby honor Jacob's Heart Children's Cancer Support Services for outstanding support to our community and acknowledge the organization's contributions to Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

MONTEREY PENINSULA COMMUNITY COLLEGE 75TH ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, 75 years ago, in September of 1947, Monterey Peninsula College (MPC) commenced its operation on the campus of Monterey High School; and by September of 1948, MPC enrolled 280 students and employed 20 faculty members, and began holding classes on the Monterey campus at 980 Fremont Street; and

WHEREAS, MPC's need to accommodate its growing student population became evident by 1957 when its enrollment approached 1,000 students, which led to the construction of its engineering building in 1958, the library in 1960, and the Art and Music Center and swimming pool in 1962; and continued its expansion in 1965, when new buildings for business, humanities, life sciences, physical education, physical sciences, and social sciences were constructed, as were the Lecture Forum, the College Theater, and the Student Center; and

WHEREAS, from 1971 to 1993, in cooperation with the U.S. Army, MPC operated an education center at Fort Ord, the former U.S. military base located in Northern Monterey County until its closure in 1994, benefiting the communities in the north side of MPC's service area, including armed forces personnel and their families; and

WHEREAS, in 1982-83, MPC and Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula entered into a partnership from which the Maurine Church Coburn School of Nursing was born, resulting in a generation of nurses who have cared for and taken care of countless members of MPC's surrounding communities; and

WHEREAS, MPC continued to strive to meet the educational needs of its surrounding communities with the construction of its Library and Technology Center in 2003 and the Child Development Center in 2007, the development of the Public Safety Training Center in 2009; and the construction of the Education Center at Marina in 2010; and

WHEREAS, MPC has hosted notable figures throughout its history, including James Baldwin, Joan Baez, William F. Buckley, Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, Aldous Huxley, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Dr. Margaret Mead, Joyce Carol Oates, Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, Rosa Parks, Ronald Reagan, Eleanor Roosevelt, Pierre Salinger, Carl Sandburg, and Carlos Santana; and

WHEREAS, since its humble beginnings in 1947, MPC has established itself as essential to the educational and cultural development of the Monterey Peninsula and has improved the lives of innumerable students, and by extension their families and its communities; and

WHEREAS, as MPC approaches its 75th year, it now offers exceptional educational opportunities at its campus in Monterey, its Education Center at Marina, its Public Safety Training Center in Seaside, its partner high schools, and online, as well as comprehensive supportive resources and specialized programs dedicated to ensuring its students have the tools they need to succeed; and

WHEREAS, MPC will celebrate its 75th anniversary throughout the 2022-23 Academic Year to commemorate this important milestone and to increase awareness of MPC's positive impact on its surrounding communities and the wealth of educational, professional, and personal enrichment opportunities it has to offer;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED, that the City Council of the City of Marina recognizes and commends Monterey Peninsula College on the eve of this special occasion, for its steadfast, 75 year-long commitment to transforming lives through education.

Council Questions: The air district and greenhouse gases, or in the solar are those per State law he's outside of the necessary? You mentioned CCNR's and some other nomenclature can you just define what you were talking about? *FORTAG Trail* = Was Fred Watson or any of the FORTAG Team involved in this? *Development Area Parks* = Do we have the approximate sizes of the parks? Is it true that parks 1, 2, 6, and 8 will have restrooms? How many ballfields are there in this development? So how do we know if one baseball field in that Southwest Corner satisfies the needs for a baseball field for that community called Marina Station? How do we know that there's enough baseball fields for the city, since we lost the one that was planned for park 2? Where those 2 baseball fields decided

during the master planning that had public engagement a few years ago that we referred to frequently? If we won't have any baseball fields in Northern Marina left and if we take the baseball field here, so back to Lane's question, if we do a revision because we have to, because we've lost a couple amenities here that were part of our grand vision, what flexibility does Marina station have? be part of that revision? If we have a baseball field at Park #5 at Marina Station, and we have a baseball field, it's not ours, but it functions very well at Los Arboles Middle School, and we have baseball fields at Preston Park and Maybe we're going to have one maybe we're not going to have one at The Dune City Park next to the Sports Center, those that I just mentioned seem to represent North, Central and South Marina will it be this public process revisioning that will determine if we have enough baseball fields; and what to do about it if we don't but that Marina Station sounds like it might be off the table to incorporate a baseball field if we find out that we need one there? Do you know why we have in Marina Station planned 2 soccer stations and 1 baseball? Is there logic to that? You helped develop East Garrison, correct? When we talk about the footprints for the parks, and we've got \$6.3 million to mitigate can we change a footprint to add things like pickle ball courts or things like that? Is there still time to negotiate what our residents might want? Park maintenance, is there going to be a shared agreement between Marina and the developer? Will all the parks within the development be accessible to the public? Can you tell us what would the total cost of this project would be when it's fully completed? Is Marina Station similar to the arrangement that we have with The Dunes? Can the soccer filed that was eliminated from one park be placed in park 2? Why was the baseball field eliminated from park 2?

Berkley/Medina Dirksen: we approve Resolution No. 2022-, approving the assignment of the development agreement related to the Marina Station Project to 3RD Millennium Partners and (2) read by title only in a way, further reading, and approve the first reading of ordinance 2022-, approving the first amendment to the development agreement related to the Marina Station project, and (3) that we come back and have a public information session to further discuss the parks.

Public Comments:

- Karen Andersen Asked if Park 6 restrooms be available to the Windy Hill Park users, will there be a fence or border? Thanked everyone for their effort in protecting the vernal pools. Thinks it would be well served to know just what the active park amenities inventory throughout the city include.
- Ralph Sirtak Spoke about the Boy Scouts and using the American Legion building to hold meetings.
- Mike Owen Asked about the FORTAG Trail on the eastern side; asked if the Maritime Chaparral ecosystem is allowed to flourish instead of being plowed under. Likes the idea the right-side trail goes by the landmark eucalyptus trees. Suggested trimming the northside of the eucalyptus trees to match the southside for aesthetic and safety reasons. Commented on saving the trees at the Dunes Park and never changing the footprint. Asked that along with bringing back the Recreation and Cultural Commission to include the Public Works, Commission to look at the infrastructure for these parks.
- Francine Rodd Spoke about the First 5 Monterey County program and talked about a section in the General Plan that talks about childcare facilities, and it talks about Armstrong Ranch and industrial centers and that as the community grows that there would be a focus on childcare. Hoping that as that section gets built out, we can look at setting aside some space for childcare.
- Tommy Bolea Asked if the parks will have artificial turf? Would prefer more indoor stuff such as daycare, swimming pool etc. Asked what was the lawyer litigation about? What percentage of the development is rentals when fully built out?

- Jeff Holder after seeing the amendment with the new trail systems coming, curious what the privacy is going to look like for the folks that have property up against that that property line the fence line there? Also asked about the lighting concessions for the residents along that area.
- John Laroco Asked that as we're moving forward with informing the public on the bond measure coming forward and it looks like there's a lot of infrastructure that's been designed into the Marina Station phase if we can relay that information as we're informing the public going forward with the bond measure how we've pre-planned or how we're extending services, you know fire and schooling and additional services for the Marina.
- Brian McCarthy Commented that it's critical we continue to foster a good relationship with the developer, the community and the city and one way to do that is through the various commissions and boards; and filling those boards with well qualified community members who want to be engage. Provided a little background into the lawsuit/settlement agreement on Armstrong Ranch.

- Sean Dowsing Attorney representing Resource Environmental. Commented on the bid protest letter submitted and hopes council had time to read it before making any decisions.
- Mike Owen Overwhelmed with the how much focus was going into certification of tree service.
 Spoke about an arborist would be accompanying staff on on-site inspections during tree removal and asked if one was hired.
- Les Martin Spoke about the current timeline to get the blight removed and asked why is it taking so long? Looking forward to the Council approving this contract and moving forward.
- Tommy Bolea Asked if animal trapping was going to be conducted prior to demolition? Will reclaimed water be used to keep the dust down? Who will police the removal of the trees? Will all the workers be certified?
- Jill Dupleich Vice president of a Limited Environmental. Provided clarification on the differences between "licensing and certification". Spoke about the RFP specifications, legal and procedural documents.
- Nestor Reyes Commented about Resource Environmental's bid protest letter and has no merit.
 Resource Environmental should be flagged and not be allowed to participate in future projects.
- Chase Tinsley Spoke against the previous speakers Jill Dupleich's and Nester Reyes's comments.
 Noted they we're the only contractor in the top 3 that did everything correct. We listed all the
 required subcontractors. We follow public contract. We had all require licenses. We had all
 required certifications. we are more than qualified, and we had no unfair advantages.

- Denise Turley Noted that the two properties that Mr. Martin spoke about do not belong to Abrams or Preston Park even though they are geographically with in those neighborhoods. Noted that the market survey that was done was full of errors and missing information.
- Tommy Bolea Was not aware that Abrams was a non-profit in that area. Commented Marina being the biggest landlords in the city and now seeking a bond when the city is making tons of money and exempt on property taxes.

DELGADO/MEDINA DIRKSEN: TO ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 2022-107, APPROVING ADVERTISING AND CALL FOR BIDS FOR THE EXECUTION OF THE CALIFORNIA AVENUE PEDESTRIAN CROSSING INSTALLATION PROJECT; AND THAT STAFF COME BACK TO US WITH OPTIONS OF HOW TO GET ARTWORK INTO OUR ELECTRICAL BOXES FOR THIS AND FUTURE NEW TRAFFIC SAFETY FEATURES SUCH AS SIGNAL LIGHT ELECTRICAL BOXES. 4-0-0-1(Berkley) Motion Passes by Roll Call Vote

- Les Martin Noted that the crosswalk looked like it was on the wrong side but was told that the other side had the bike path. Asked if an additional sidewalk would be installed on that side of the development?
- Nancy Amadeo Stated that Marina Youth Arts has taken on the painting of the utility boxes around Marina and suggested that staff contact Nick Kite.
- Liesbeth Visscher Familiar with this area and thanked staff for the proposed crosswalk and noted that the striping needs to be improved there sooner rather than later and also thanked staff for anticipating the future traffic lights when the amount of traffic will increase there.
- Jeffrey Markham Thankful this project is being done and just in time for school. Asked if there's any additional traffic calming that can be done from the light at Imjin down to this particular intersection?

- Denise Turley Noted the map of the area showed a different walkway not having anything to do with the roadway and asked if that is still current and then will another crosswalk be needed. Agrees with previous speaker about additional traffic calming in that area.
- Tommy Bolea Commented on the speed of vehicles at the intersection of Imjin and California and the near misses of accidents in that area. Commented on the need for better bike lanes and lot allowing commercial vehicles on California Ave. Suggested speed bumps for traffic calming.
 - c. City Council consider adopting **Resolution No. 2022-108**, approving the Local Roadway Safety Plan (LRSP).

Council Questions: Are the roundabouts and roundabout signs working in our city? Imjin has had about 61-79 crashes along it, is this a viable area to put roundabouts? The roundabouts at Del Monte and Beach. did you say that the number of crashes is less than they used to at that intersection when it was a 4 way stop? If we wanted to have the data supporting the pre and post numbers and severity of that roundabout is that information available to us? Clarification on AB843, we were told at the time that we had to increase the speed limits in order for enforcement to occur and it was said that there's something else happening where we can actually lower the speed limits again, correct? Many of your countermeasures are more physical kind of changes so by contrast to implementing those things that would manage speed how do you contrast them to the effect of enforcement in terms of police involvement with tickets? Engineering Countermeasure Toolbox, are these things we use when applying for grants? Considering the size of our city and the number of streets, and how they connect, would you say that we're average in terms of safety you know being able to negotiate the city bicycle pedestrian vehicle or do we have a lot of work to do? Are there reports that would help us to come to some kind of a grading of where we are? We have a number of large capital projects involving our roadways, and we have a number of housing projects scheduled to begin, taking this analysis and looking at these projects, do you see a way that we could use this data to suggest or inform a designs and maybe new ordinances speed zones those kinds of things? Does our police department base their patrolling and traffic monitoring on this kind of data?

MEDINA DIRKSEN/DELGADO: THAT WE ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 2022-108, APPROVING THE LOCAL ROADWAY SAFETY PLAN (LRSP); AND DIRECT STAFF TO COME BACK WITH US WITH PRE-ROUNDABOUT AND POST-ROUNDABOUT DATA. 4-0-0-1 (Berkley) Motion Passes by Roll Call Vote

- Denise Turley Concerned about bicycle safety at one of the proposed sites which is Abrams and Imjin Road. Asked if there's a possibility to get share the road signs with bicyclists or some kind of warning?
- Brian McCarthy presentation was interesting, asked where can the public and other interested parties both learn more about kind of the work that's being done here? Commented about the mention of stakeholders in the presentation. Spoke about advocates for amending the engineers suggested speed limits throughout the city and traffic fatality concerns. Asked if it would be appropriate or advisable to do by street segments into smaller sections during the next speed study to get more accurate speed limit counts for particular sections, for the traffic circles themselves versus that whole road segment?

- Les Martin Great study, can see the opportunity to get a lot of grant money from the State from the work. Has concerns about Imjin and Third Avenue and then New Fourth Avenue, which neither one has a right turn lane and the speed which people drive.
- Liesbeth Visscher Interesting report and presentation. Was one of the concerned residents who worked hard to limit the speed limit increases that the city was forced to accept because of that States of the States 85 percentile rule. Asked since the signing of AB43, how this new bill can help increase safety by lowering speed limits on some of the roads on some road segments? Commented about the poor striping of the bike lanes along California Ave. Is the city planning to we review the speed limits sooner than the next traffic survey is due because of the new AB43 and is the city planning to increase speed, speed limit enforcements, especially before the next traffic survey?
- Tommy Bolea Asked why the traffic surveys never include accident rates, DUI's and time of day measured? Asked if police department can monitor the streets remotely and mail them their tickets? Do we have license plate camera's like in other cities? Suggested turning Imjin into a Toll Road for non-residents.
- Karen Andersen Excellent presentation. Spoke about the two different driving instructor agencies that bring students to drive on the roundabouts and hopes to see some literacy on how to negotiate traffic circles.
 - d. City Council consider adopting **Resolution No. 2022-109**, authorizing the resumption of the Recreation and Cultural Services Commission, the Public Works Commission, the Economic Development Commission and the Tree Committee' and authorizing the disbanding of the Design Review Board.

Council Questions: What's the relevance of the Economic Development Commission concept? Is it effective? What have what products have actually come out of that commission before now? What have they actually done? How many members are in each commission/committee? if we put out the advertising for new commissioners and we don't get the full complex do we not start the commissions up again, and could that take a while, then? Or can we start with just a supposed quorum? Can the overall objective standards be found in multiple documents/places? If the DRB is disbanded will we still have the preferences for the signs based on the current sign program?

Delgado/Biala: that we authorize the resumption of the Recreation and Cultural Services Commission, The Public Works, The Economic Development Commission after staff comes to us with some more information on that particular Commission and the Tree Committee, and we authorize the disbanding of the Design Review Board.

- Nancy Amadeo Appreciates and supports the motion. Noted she was the Council Liaison to the EDC and that commission was discouraged because they heard reports and took no action on them and didn't even know the council's priorities for the year. In favor of the Design Review Board going away as long as there is some peer review.
- Brian McCarthy Thinks that our new Community Development Director Guido Persicone is leading our community development department in a positive direction and sensitive to the amount of work that department is doing. Thinks an architect should be contracted on an annual basis. Commented on the disbandment of the Design Review Board. Asked the council members who

were once planning commissioners if the DRB was helpful or not. Commented on objective design standards.

Council Member Medina asked for a friendly amendment: to come back within 6 months, or reasonable timeframe, as staff capacity allows, to revisit our ability to have an architectural review committee and with possible timelines.

CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION 2022-, RECOGNIZING A LOCAL EMERGENCY PERSISTS, RE-RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY GOVERNOR NEWSOM ON MARCH 4, 2020, AND RE-AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA AND ITS CONSTITUENT BODIES FOR THE PERIOD SEPTEMBER 20, 2022, THROUGH OCTOBER 20, 2022, PURSUANT TO BROWN ACT PROVISIONS.

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council consider:

1. Adopting Resolution No. 2022-, regarding the Ralph M. Brown Act (California Government Code §§54950-54963, hereinafter the "Brown Act") making certain findings; and authorizing the City to continue to implement remote teleconferenced public meetings of the City Council and its constituent bodies for the period September 20, 2022, through October 20, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

Government Code §54953(e) allows cities to continue to meet remotely during states of emergency proclaimed by the Governor under modified Brown Act requirements that are similar to but not identical to the rules and procedures established by the prior Executive Orders of Governor Newsom relating to the relaxation of certain Brown Act requirements during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Government Code §54953(e) authorizes local agencies to use teleconferencing without complying with teleconferencing requirement imposed by the Brown Act during a declared state of emergency when state or local health officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing during the proclaimed state of emergency or when the legislative body had determined by majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

At a special meeting held on October 5, 2021, the City Council adopted Resolution 2021-104 regarding the Brown Act making certain findings, and authorizing the City to implement remote teleconferenced public meetings of the City Council and its constituent bodies might be held without compliance with Government Code §54953(b)(3) for the period October 5, 2021 through November 4, 2021; subsequently on November 2, 2021, the Council adopted Resolution 2021-113 extending that period until December 2, 2021; on November 16, 2021, the Council adopted Resolution 2021-118 extending that period until December 16, 2021; on December 14, 2021, the Council adopted Resolution 2021-134 extending that period until January 13, 2022; and on January 11, 2022, the Council adopted Resolution 2022-02 extending that period to February 10, 2022; and on February 1, 2022, the Council adopted Resolution No. 2022-13, extending that period until March 3, 2022; on March 1, 2022 Council adopted Resolution No. 2022-32, extending that period to March 31, 2022, on March 15, 2022 Resolution 2022-34; April 19, 2022 Resolution No. 2022-48, and on May 17, 2022 adopted Resolution No. 2022-54; on June 21, 2022 Resolution No. 2022-78; on July 19, 2022, Resolution No. 2022-94 on August 16, 2022 Resolution No. 2022-105, extending the period during which remote teleconferenced public meetings of the City Council and its constituent bodies might be held without compliance with Government Code §54953(b)(3) to September 19, 2022.

ANALYSIS:

On June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21 which among other things rescinded his prior Executive Order N-29-20 and set the date of October 1, 2021, for public agencies to transition back to public meetings held in full compliance with the Brown Act.

As the Delta variants surged in California, the legislature took action to extend the COVID-19 exemptions to the Brown Act's teleconference requirements, subject to some additional requirements. California and Monterey County are presently continuing to experience cases of the rapidly-spreading Omicron variant. Assembly Bill 361 amended Government Code §54953 and allowed a local agency to use teleconferencing in any of the following circumstances without complying with certain Brown Act provisions:

- 1. The legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing.
- 2. The legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.
- 3. The legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and has determined, by majority vote taken at a meeting held for the purpose described in 2 above, that as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

A local agency that holds a meeting under any of these circumstances would be required to follow certain requirements listed in the attached Resolution, in addition to giving notice of the meeting and posting agendas as required under the Brown Act. These additional requirements are intended to protect the public's right to participate in the meetings of local agency legislative bodies. The City of Marina adheres to the listed requirements.

Government Code §54953(e)(3) provides that if the state of emergency remains active for more than 30 days, a local agency must make the following findings by majority vote every 30 days to continue using the exemption to the Brown Act teleconferencing requirements:

- The legislative body has reconsidered the circumstances of the emergency; and
- Either of the following circumstances exist: the state of emergency continue to directly impact the ability of members to meet safely in person or State or local officials continue to impose or recommend social distancing measures.

The goal of Government Code §54953 as revised by AB 361 is to improve and enhance public access to local agency meetings during the COVID-19 pandemic and future applicable emergencies by allowing broader access through teleconferencing options. The current version of Government Code §54953 became effective on September 16, 2021, with a sunset of the present version on January 1, 2024.

FISCAL IMPACT:

None identified.

CONCLUSION:

This request is submitted for City Council consideration and possible adoption of a resolution proclaiming a local emergency persists, re-ratifying the proclamation of a state of emergency by Governor Newsom on March 4, 2020, and re-authorizing remote teleconference meetings of the City Council of the City of Marina and its constituent bodies for the period September 20, 2022, through October 20, 2022, pursuant to Brown Act provisions.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA RECOGNIZING A LOCAL EMERGENCY PERSISTS, RE-RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY GOVERNOR NEWSOM ON MARCH 4, 2020, AND RE-AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA AND ITS CONSTITUENT BODIES FOR THE PERIOD SEPTEMBER 20, 2022, THROUGH OCTOBER 20, 2022, PURSUANT TO BROWN ACT PROVISIONS.

WHEREAS, the City of Marina is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the City Council and its constituent bodies; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of City of Marina's legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 - 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the City's legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provision for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the City's boundaries, caused by natural, technological or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the City Council previously adopted Resolution No. 2021- 104 on October 5, 2021, Resolution 2021-113 on November 2, 2021, Resolution 2021-118 on November 16, 2021, Resolution 2021-134 on December 14, 2021, Resolution 2022-02 on January 11, 2022, Resolution 2022-13 on February 1, 2022, Resolution No. 2022-13 on March 1, 2022, Resolution 2022-32, on March 15, 2022 Resolution 2022-34; April 19, 2022 Resolution No. 2022-48, and on May 17, 2022 Resolution No. 2022-54; on June 21, 2022 Resolution No. 2022-78; on July 19, 2022 Resolution No. 2022-94; on August 16, 2022, Resolution No. 2022-105 extending the period during which remote teleconferenced public meetings of the City Council and its constituent bodies might be held without compliance with Government Code §54953(b)(3) to September 19, 2022; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions found in section 54953(e), the City Council must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists in the City, and the City Council has done so; and

WHEREAS, emergency conditions persist in the City, specifically, the March 4, 2020, proclamation by the Governor of a state of emergency in the State of California due to COVID-19 and the March 13, 2020, proclamation of a state of emergency in the City of Marina by the City Manager, as the City's Director of Emergency Services, due to COVID-19 which was subsequently ratified by the City Council on March 17, 2020, and after having been supplemented twice, and both proclamations of states of emergency remain in effect; and

WHEREAS, on September 22, 2021, the County of Monterey Health Department issued a Recommendation Regarding Social Distancing Including Remote Meetings of Legislative Bodies, attached hereto as **Attachment 1**; and

WHEREAS, the City Council does hereby find that California and Monterey County are presently continuing to experience cases of the rapidly-spreading COVID-19 Omicron variant and as of June 13, 2022, the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention rated the risk level for community transmission of COVID-19 in Monterey County as medium with a case rate of 29.9 individuals per 100,000 persons, as of June 13, 2022, a total of 750 persons have died of COVID-19 and 367 persons are reported as new cases currently suffering from COVID-19 with 27 persons reported hospitalized in Monterey County by the County Health Department; this situation has and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the City that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the City, and desires to recognize and affirm a local emergency exists and re-ratify the proclamation of state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California and to recognize the County of Monterey Health Department's recommendation regarding social distancing; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency persisting, the City Council does hereby find that the City Council and its constituent bodies shall continue to conduct their meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that such legislative bodies shall continue to comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953; and

WHEREAS, the City of Marina will continue to implement the following measures for meetings of its City Council and its constituent bodies:

- Allow the public to access the meeting and require that the agenda provide an opportunity for the public to directly address the legislative body pursuant to the Brown Act's other teleconferencing provisions.
- In each instance when the local agency provides notice of the teleconferenced meeting or posts its agenda, give notice for how the public can access the meeting and provide public comment.
- Identify and include in the agenda an opportunity for all persons to attend via a call-in or an internet-based service option; the legislative body need not provide a physical location for the public to attend or provide comments.
- Conduct teleconference meetings in a manner that protects the statutory and constitutional rights of the public.
- Stop the meeting until public access is restored in the event of a service disruption that either prevents the local agency from broadcasting the meeting to the public using the call-in or internet-based service option or is within the local agency's control and prevents the public from submitting public comments (any action taken during such a service disruption could be challenged under the Brown Act's existing challenger provisions).

- Not require comments be submitted in advance (though the legislative body may provide that as an option) and provide the opportunity to comment in real time.
- Provide adequate time for public comment, either by establishing a timed public comment period or by allowing a reasonable amount of time to comment.
- If the legislative body uses a third-party website or platform to host the teleconference, and the third-party service requires users to register to participate, the legislative body must provide adequate time during the comment period for users to register and may not close the registration comment period until the comment period has elapsed.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.
- Section 2. <u>Affirmation that Local Emergency Persists</u>. The City Council hereby reconsiders the conditions of the state of emergency in the City and proclaims that a local emergency persists throughout the City, and:
- (a) On September 22, 2021, the County of Monterey Health Department issued a Recommendation Regarding Social Distancing Including Remote Meetings of Legislative Bodies; and
- (b) California and Monterey County are presently continuing to experience cases of the rapidly-spreading COVID-19 Omicron variant and as of June 13, 2022, the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention rated the risk level for community transmission of COVID-19 in Monterey County as medium with a case rate of 29.9 individuals per 100,000 persons, as of June 13, 2022, a total of 750 persons have died of COVID-19 and 367 persons are reported as new cases currently suffering from COVID-19 with 27 persons reported hospitalized in Monterey County by the County Health Department; and this has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the City that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the City.
- Section 3. <u>Re-ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency</u>. The City Council hereby reconsiders and re-ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.
- Section 4. <u>Remote Teleconference Meetings</u>. The City Manager and legislative bodies of the City of Marina, the City Council and its constituent bodies, are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, continuing to conduct open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.
- Section 5. <u>Effective Date of Resolution</u>. This Resolution shall take effect on immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) August 20, 2022, or such time the City Council adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the City Council of the City of Marina and its constituent bodies may continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.

Recommendation Regarding Social Distancing Including Remote Meetings of Legislative Bodies

Issued: September 22, 2021

The Monterey County Health Department continues to recommend that physical and social distancing strategies be practiced in Monterey County, which includes remote meetings of legislative bodies of local agencies, to the extent possible.

Monterey County continues to experience transmission of COVID-19 locally. Physical and social distancing is still an effective measure to reduce the spread of COVID-19, especially when combined with use of face coverings, frequent hand washing, staying home when ill, testing, and vaccination with U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved or authorized COVID-19 vaccines.

Remote meetings of legislative bodies allow for the virtual participation of agency staff, presenters, and community members in safer environments, with less risk of exposure to SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19.

The Monterey County Health Officer will continue to monitor local metrics and the necessity of this recommendation.

REQUEST: It is requested that the Marina City Council:

- 1. Adopt a Resolution No. 2022-, approving a Professional Services Agreement with Raimi+Associates for the preparation of Objective Design Standards for an amount not to exceed \$167,000;
- 2. Authorize the Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries; and
- 3. Authorize the City Manager to execute the Agreement on behalf of City with Raimi+Associates subject to final review by the City Attorney.

SUMMARY:

In addition to the plethora of housing bills, after January 1, 2020, multifamily housing projects, transitional and supportive housing, and mixed-use projects with at least two-thirds (2/3s) of the square footage designated for residential uses, must be reviewed for conformance with objective zoning standards:

"Objective design standard" means a design standard that involve no personal or subjective judgment by a public official and is uniformly verifiable by reference to an external and uniform benchmark or criterion available and knowable by both the development applicant or proponent and the public official before submittal of an application.¹

If a city wants to deny a housing project², it must make specific findings of fact detailing how the project is not consistent with objective design standards and that the project has a specific adverse effect to public health and safety that can't be mitigated in any other way.³ In effect "super findings of fact" must be made to deny a multifamily housing and mixed-use project moving forward.

A standard Professional Services Agreement (Agreement) for this item is included as **EXHIBIT A** and includes the consultant's scope of work, schedule, and insurance and liability information.

BACKGROUND:

The Community Development Dept. (CDD) released a Request for Proposals (RFP) to solicit proposals for the development of ODS and received four (4) qualified submittals. Staff interviewed all consultants and selected Raimi+Associates based on experience, understanding of the task, familiarity, and competitive budget.

In addition to helping the City meet the requirements of the variety of new housing laws mentioned in this report and Housing Element implementation measures, the Objective Design Standards will include the following elements:

- Review and analyze the City's existing policy documents, development standards and regulations, and permit procedures to become familiar with the physical form of the city, determine key development areas, and identify concerns, issues, challenges, and/or changes in the City's design guidance.
- Engage with City staff, community members, decision makers, and development professionals.
- Analyze architectural precedents to understand how development standards and design guidelines are currently being interpreted and applied.
- Test fit typical development sites to analyze new design standards.
- Update current regulations to conform to State Law, including removing subjective design language from existing documents (e.g., General Plan).
- Draft Citywide Objective Design Standards for single-family, multifamily, and mixeduse development that reflect the community's vision and improve compatibility between new development and surrounding neighborhoods.
- Incorporate compelling, easily digestible supporting design graphics.
- Streamline project review and permitting for residential and residential mixed-use developments.

An important item to note is that ODS are <u>not</u> intended to be "style" guidelines or standards that require particular architectural design features or cultural themes, but focus instead on building form, bulk and massing, site planning (setbacks, lot coverage, height, etc.), and building frontage requirements. The ODS are intended to balance the need for standardization with local context-based conditions.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Consultant fees for the development of the Objective Design Standards (ODS) will be provided through the City's Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) grant (\$65,000) and the City's Community Development Department from increased license and permit revenues within the Building Inspection Department. Staff has analyzed building permit revenues from commercial and residential construction and identified an increase in budgeted revenues for the current fiscal year which will fully offset the project cost. The REAP grant is provided by the State's Housing and Community Development Dept. (HCD) and administered by the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG).

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

The approval of this Professional Services Agreement is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to the State CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Sections: 15060(c)(2), because the proposed ordinance will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment; and 15061(b)(3), because the proposed ordinance is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment.

CONCLUSION:

This request is submitted for City Council consideration.

WHEREAS, completion of the Objective Design Standards requires a Professional Services Agreement with the candidate selected for the contract, Raimi+Associates, a community planning and urban design firm with local experience; and

WHEREAS, the approval of this Professional Services Agreement is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to the State CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Sections: 15060(c)(2), because the proposed ordinance will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment; and 15061(b)(3), because the proposed ordinance is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment.

CITY OF MARINA AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF OBJECTIVE DESIGN STANDARDS

Recitals

- A. City desires to retain Contractor to prepare Objective Design Standards consistent with California State law, hereinafter referred to as the "Project."
- B. Contractor represents and warrants that it has the qualifications, experience, and personnel necessary to properly perform the services as set forth herein.
- A. Consultant represents that it has the degree of specialized expertise contemplated within California Government Codes §§37103 and 53060 and holds all necessary licenses to practice and perform the services herein contemplated.
- B. City desires to retain Contractor to provide such services.

Terms and Conditions

For of good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged and in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, City and Contractor agree to the following terms and conditions:

1. Scope of Work.

- (a) Contractor is hereby hired and retained by the City to work in a cooperative manner with the City to fully and adequately perform those services set forth in **Exhibit "A"** attached hereto ("Scope of Work") and by this reference made a part hereof. With prior written notice to Contractor, City may elect to delete certain tasks of the Scope of Work at its sole discretion.
- (b) Contractor shall perform all such work with skill and diligence and pursuant to generally accepted standards of practice in effect at the time of performance. Contractor shall provide corrective services without charge to the City for work which fails to meet these standards and which is reported to Contractor in writing within sixty days of discovery. Should Contractor fail or refuse to perform promptly its obligations under this Agreement, the City may render or undertake the performance thereof and the Contractor shall be liable for any expenses thereby incurred.
- (c) If services under this Agreement are to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined in California Civil Code §2782.8(b)(2), design professional certifies that all design professional services shall be provided by a person or persons duly licensed by the State of California to provide the type of services described in Section 1(a). By delivery of completed work, design professional certifies that the work conforms to the requirements of this Agreement and all applicable federal, state and local laws, and the professional standard of care in California.

- (d) Contractor is responsible for making an independent evaluation and judgment of all relevant conditions affecting performance of the work, including without limitation site conditions, existing facilities, soils, hydrologic, geographic, climatic conditions, applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations and all other contingencies or considerations.
- (e) City shall cooperate with Contractor and will furnish all information data, records and reports existing and available to City to enable Contractor to carry out work outlined in Exhibit "A." Contractor shall be entitled to reasonably rely on information, data, records and reports furnished by the City, however, the City makes no warranty as to the accuracy or completeness of any such information, data, records or reports available to it and provided to Contractor which were furnished to the City by a third party. Contractor shall have a duty to bring to the City's attention any deficiency or error it may discover in any information provided to the Contractor by the City or a third party.

2. Term of Agreement & Commencement of Work.

- (a) Unless otherwise provided, the term of this Agreement shall begin on the date of its full execution and shall expire on September 30, 2023 unless extended by amendment or terminated earlier as provided herein. The date of full execution is defined as the date when all of the following events have occurred:
- (i) This Agreement has been approved by the City's Council or by the board, officer or employee authorized to give such approval, and;
- (ii) The office of the City Attorney has indicated in writing its approval of this Agreement as to form, and;
- (iii) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of Contractor by the person or persons authorized to bind the Contractor hereto, and;
- (iv) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of the City by the person designated to so sign by the City's Council or by the officer or employee authorized to enter into this Contract and is attested to by the Marina City Clerk.
- (b) Contractor shall commence work on the Project on or by September 1, 2022. This Agreement may be extended upon written agreement of both parties. Contractor may be required to prepare a written schedule for the work to be performed, which schedule shall be approved by the City and made a part of Exhibit A, and to perform the work in accordance with the approved schedule.

3. <u>Compensation</u>.

- (a) City liability for compensation to Contractor under this Agreement shall only be to the extent of the present appropriation to fund this Agreement. For services to be provided under this Agreement City shall compensate Contractor in an amount not to exceed one hundred sixty-seven thousand dollars (\$167,000) in accordance with the provisions of this Section and the Cost Estimate attached hereto as **Exhibit A** and incorporated herein by this reference.
- (b) Invoice(s) in a format and on a schedule acceptable to the City shall be submitted to and be reviewed and verified by the Project Administrator (see Section 5(a)) and forwarded to the City's Finance Department for payment. City shall notify Contractor of exceptions or dispute items and their dollar value within fifteen days of receipt. Payment of the undisputed amount of the invoice will typically be made approximately thirty days after the invoice is submitted to the Finance Department.

- (c) Contractor will maintain clearly identifiable, complete and accurate records with respect to all costs incurred under this Agreement on an industry recognized accounting basis. Contractor shall make available to the representative of City all such books and records related to this Agreement, and the right to examine, copy and audit the same during regular business hours upon 24-hour's notice for a period of four years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.
- (d) Contractor shall not receive any compensation for Extra Work without the prior written authorization of City. As used herein, "Extra Work" means any work that is determined by the City to be necessary for the proper completion of the Project but which is not included within the Scope of Work and which the parties did not reasonably anticipate would be necessary at the execution of this Agreement. Compensation for any authorized Extra Work shall be paid in accordance with the prior written authorization.
- (e) Expenses not otherwise addressed in the Scope of Services or the Fee Schedule incurred by Contractor in performing services under this Agreement shall be reviewed and approved in advance by the Project Administrator (Section 5(a)), be charged at cost and reimbursed to Contractor.

4. Termination or Suspension.

- (a) This Agreement may be terminated in whole or in part in writing by either party in the event of a substantial failure by the other party to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement through no fault of the terminating party, provided that no termination may be effected unless the other party is given (1) not less than ten days written notice of intent to terminate, and (2) provided an opportunity for consultation with the terminating party prior to termination.
- (b) If termination for default is affected by the City, an equitable adjustment in the price provided for in this Agreement shall be made, but (1) no amount shall be allowed for anticipated profit on unperformed services or other work, and (2) any payment due the Contractor at the time of termination may be adjusted to cover any additional costs to the City because of the Contractor's default. If after the termination for failure of Contractor to fulfill its contractual obligations, it is determined that the Contractor had not failed to fulfill contractual obligations, the termination shall be deemed to have been for the convenience of the City.
- (c) The City may terminate or suspend this Agreement at any time for its convenience upon not less than thirty days prior written notice to Contractor. Not later than the effective date of such termination or suspension, Contractor shall discontinue all affected work and deliver all work product and other documents, whether completed or in progress, to the City.
- (d) If termination for default is affected by the Contractor or if termination for convenience is effected by the City, the equitable adjustment shall include a reasonable profit for services or other work performed. The equitable adjustment for termination shall provide for payment to the Contractor for services rendered and expenses incurred prior to the termination, in addition to termination settlement costs reasonably incurred by Contractor relating to written commitments that were executed prior to the termination.

5. Project Administrator, Project Manager & Key Personnel.

(a) City designates as its Project Administrator Guido Persicone, Community Development Director, who shall have the authority to act for the City under this Agreement. The Project Administrator or his/her authorized representative shall represent the City in all matters pertaining to the work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement.

- (b) Contractor designates Simran Malhotra as its Project Manager who shall coordinate all phases of the Project. The Project manager shall be available to City at all reasonable times during the Agreement term.
- (c) Contractor warrants that it will continuously furnish the necessary personnel to complete the Project on a timely basis as contemplated by this Agreement. Contractor, at the sole discretion of City, shall remove from the Project any of its personnel assigned to the performance of services upon written request of City. Contractor has represented to City that certain key personnel will perform and coordinate the work under this Agreement. Should one or more of such personnel become unavailable, Contractor may substitute other personnel of at least equal competence upon written approval of the City. In the event that City and Contractor cannot agree as to the substitution of key personnel, City shall be entitled to terminate this Agreement for cause. The key personnel for performance of this Agreement are as follows: Simran Malhotra, Alessandra Lundin, and Jasmine Williams of Raimi+Associates; Megan Jones of Rincon Consultants, Inc.; and Christy Hopper, Planning Services Manager and Guido Persicone, CDD Director, of the City of Marina.

6. **Delegation of Work**.

- (a) If Contractor utilizes any subcontractors other than set forth in **Exhibit A** consultants, persons, employees or firms having applicable expertise to assist Contractor in performing the services under this Agreement, Contractor shall obtain City's prior written approval to such employment. Contractor's contract with any subcontractor shall contain a provision making the subcontract subject to all provisions of this Agreement. Contractor will be fully responsible and liable for the payment, administration, completion, presentation and quality of all work performed. City reserves its right to employ other contractors in connection with this Project.
- (b) If the work hereunder is performed by a design professional, design professional shall be directly involved with performing the work or shall work through his, her or its employees. The design professional's responsibilities under this Agreement shall not be delegated. The design professional shall be responsible to the City for acts, errors or omissions of his, her or its subcontractors. Negligence of subcontractors or agents retained by the design professional is conclusively deemed to be the negligence of the design professional if not adequately corrected by the design professional. Use of the term subcontractor in any other provision of this Agreement shall not be construed to imply authorization for a design professional to use subcontractors for performance of any professional service under this Agreement.
- (c) The City is an intended beneficiary of any work performed by a subcontractor for purposes of establishing a duty of care between the subcontractor and the City.
- **7. Skill of Employees.** Contractor shall ensure that any employees or agents providing services under this Agreement possess the requisite skill, training, and experience to properly perform such services.
- **8.** Confidential and Proprietary Information. In the course of performing services under this Agreement Contractor may obtain, receive, and review confidential or proprietary documents, information or materials that are and shall remain the exclusive property of the City. Should Contractor undertake the work on behalf of other agencies, entities, firms or persons relating to the matters described in the Scope of Work, it is expressly agreed by Contractor that any such confidential or proprietary information or materials shall not be provided or disclosed in any manner to any of Contractor's other clients, or to any other third party, without the City's prior express written consent.

9. Ownership of Data. Unless otherwise provided for herein, all documents, material, data, drawings, plans, specifications, computer data files, basis for design calculations, engineering notes, GIS files, and reports originated and prepared by Contractor, or any subcontractor of any tier, under this Agreement shall be and remain the property of the City for its use in any manner it deems appropriate. Contractor agrees that all copyrights which arise from creation of the work pursuant to this Agreement shall be vested in the City and waives and relinquishes all claims to copyright or intellectual property rights in favor of the City. Contractor shall provide two (2) sets of reproducibles of the above-cited items, except for the computer data files which shall consist of one (1) set. Contractor shall use all reasonable efforts to ensure that any electronic files provided to the City will be compatible with the City's computer hardware and software. Contractor makes no representation as to long-term compatibility, usability or readability of the format resulting from the use of software application packages, operating systems or computer hardware differing from those in use by the City at the commencement of this Agreement. Contractor shall be permitted to maintain copies of all such data for its files. City acknowledges that its use of the work product is limited to the purposes contemplated by the Scope of Work and, should City use these products or data in connection with additions to the work required under this Agreement or for new work without consultation with and without additional compensation to Contractor, Contractor makes no representation as to the suitability of the work product for use in or application to circumstances not contemplated by the Scope of Work and shall have no liability or responsibility whatsoever in connection with such use which shall be at the City's sole risk. Any and all liability arising out of changes made by the City to Contractor's deliverables is waived against Contractor unless City has given Contractor prior written notice of the changes and has received Contractor's written consent to such changes.

10. <u>Conflict of Interest.</u>

- (a) Contractor covenants that neither it, nor any officer or principal of its firm has or shall acquire any interest, directly or indirectly, which would conflict in any manner with the interests of the City or which would in any way hinder Contractor's performance of services under this Agreement. Contractor further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement, no person having any such interest shall be employed by it as an officer, employee, agent or subcontractor without the express written consent of the City Manager. Contractor agrees to at all times avoid conflicts of interest or the appearance of any conflicts of interest with the interests of the City in the performance of this Agreement. Contractor shall represent the interest of the City in any discussion or negotiation.
- (b) City understands and acknowledges that Contractor may be, as of the date of commencement of services under this Agreement, independently involved in the performance of non-related services for other governmental agencies and private parties. Contractor is unaware of any stated position of the City relative to such projects. Any future position of the City on such projects may result in a conflict of interest for purposes of this section.
- (c) No official or employee of the City who is authorized in such capacity on behalf of the City to negotiate, make, accept, or approve, or take part in negotiating, making accepting or approving this Agreement, during the term of his or her tenure or service with City and for one year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof or obtain any present or anticipated material benefit arising therefrom.
- **11. <u>Disclosure.</u>** Contractor may be subject to the appropriate disclosure requirements of the California Fair Political Practices Act, as determined by the City Manager.

12. Non-Discrimination.

- (a) During the performance of this Agreement the Contractor shall comply with the applicable nondiscrimination and affirmative action provisions of the laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City. In performing this Agreement, Contractor shall not discriminate, harass, or allow harassment, against any employee or applicant for employment because of sex, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), medical condition (including cancer), age, marital status, denial of family and medical care leave and denial of pregnancy disability leave. Contractor shall give written notice of its obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which it has a collective bargaining or other agreement.
- (b) Contractor shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this Section in all subcontracts.

13. Indemnification & Hold Harmless.

- (a) Other than in the performance of professional services by a design professional, which shall be solely as addressed by subsection (b) below, and to the full extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify, defend (with independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City) and hold harmless City, its Council, boards, commissions, employees, officials and agents ("Indemnified Parties" or in the singular "Indemnified Party") from and against any claims, losses, damages, penalties, fines and judgments, associated investigation and administrative expenses, and defense costs including but not limited to reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expert witness fees and costs of alternate dispute resolution (collectively "Liabilities"), resulting from property damage, bodily injury or death arising out of the operations in the performance of this Agreement by Contractor, its officers, employees, agents and sub-contractors. The Contractor's obligation to indemnify applies unless it is adjudicated that its liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party. If it is finally adjudicated that liability is caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party, the Contractor's obligation shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability of the Indemnified Party. Notwithstanding the foregoing, with respect to Contractor's professional liability (as opposed to Contractor's operations covered by Commercial General Liability Insurance), to the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnified Parties from any and all losses, costs, damages and expenses, (including the reimbursement of reasonable attorneys' fees), that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the Contractor. If it is finally adjudicated that liability is caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party, the Contractor's obligation shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability of the Indemnified Party.
- (b) To the fullest extent permitted by law (including without limitation California Civil Code Sections 2782.8), when the services to be provided under this Agreement are design professional services to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined under said section 2782.8, Contractor shall indemnify, protect, defend (with independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City) and hold harmless City and any Indemnified Party for all Liabilities regardless of nature or type that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of Contractor, or the acts or omissions of an officer, employee, agent or subcontractor of the Contractor. The Contractor's obligation to indemnify applies unless it is adjudicated that its liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an indemnified party. If it is finally adjudicated that liability is caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an indemnified party, the Contractor's obligation shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability of the indemnified party.

- (c) All obligations under this section are to be paid by Contractor as incurred by City. The provisions of this Section are not limited by the provisions of sections relating to insurance including provisions of any worker's compensation act or similar act. Contractor expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statues or laws as to City, its employees and officials. Contractor agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical to those set forth here in this section from each and every subcontractor, sub tier contractor or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Contractor in the performance or subject matter of this Agreement. In the event Contractor fails to obtain such indemnity obligations from others as required here, Contractor agrees to be fully responsible according to the terms of this section. Failure of City to monitor compliance with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder.
- (d) If any action or proceeding is brought against any Indemnified Party by reason of any of the matters against which the Contractor has agreed to defend the Indemnified Party, as provided above, Contractor, upon notice from the City, shall defend any Indemnified Party at Contractor's expense by counsel reasonably acceptable to the City. An Indemnified Party need not have first paid for any of the matters to which it is entitled to indemnification in order to be so defended.
- (e) This obligation to indemnify and defend City, as set forth herein, is binding on the successors, assigns, or heirs of Contractor and shall survive the termination of this Agreement or this Section.

14. Insurance.

- (a) As a condition precedent to the effectiveness of this Agreement and without limiting Contractor's indemnification of the City, Contractor agrees to obtain and maintain in full force and effect at its own expense the insurance policies set forth in **Exhibit "B"** "Insurance" attached hereto and made a part hereof. Contractor shall furnish the City with original certificates of insurance, signed digitally by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf, along with copies of all required endorsements. All certificates and endorsements must be received and approved by the City before any work commences. All insurance policies shall be subject to approval by the City Attorney and Risk Manager as to form and content. Specifically, such insurance shall: (1) protect City as an additional insured for commercial general and business auto liability; (2) provide City at least thirty days written notice of cancellation, material reduction in coverage or reduction in limits and ten days written notice for non-payment of premium; and (3) be primary with respect to City's insurance program. Contractor's insurance is not expected to respond to claims that may arise from the acts or omissions of the City.
- (b) City reserves the right at any time during the term of this Agreement to change the amounts and types of insurance required herein by giving Contractor ninety days advance written notice of such change. If such change should result in substantial additional cost of the Contractor, City agrees to negotiate additional compensation proportional to the increased benefit to City.
- (c) All required insurance must be submitted and approved the City Attorney and Risk Manager prior to the inception of any operations by Contractor.
- (d) The required coverage and limits are subject to availability on the open market at reasonable cost as determined by the City. Non availability or non-affordability must be documented by a letter from Contractor's insurance broker or agency indicating a good faith effort to place the required insurance and showing as a minimum the names of the insurance carriers and the declinations or quotations received from each. Within the foregoing constraints, Contractor's failure to procure or maintain required insurance during the entire term of this Agreement shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement under which City may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement or, at its discretion, procure or renew such insurance to protect City's interests and pay any and all premium in connection therewith and recover all monies so paid from Contractor.

- (e) By signing this Agreement, Contractor hereby certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 *et seq.*, of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provision of that Code, and that it will comply with such provisions at all such times as they may apply during the performance of the work pursuant to this Contract. Unless otherwise agreed, a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City is required.
- 15. <u>Independent Contractor.</u> The parties have reviewed and considered the principal test and secondary factors herein and agree that Contractor, its officers, employees and agents, if any, shall be independent contractors with regard to the providing of services under this Agreement, and that Contractor's employees or agents shall not be considered to be employees or agents of the City for any purpose and will not be entitled to any of the benefits City provides for its employees. City shall make no deductions for payroll taxes or Social Security from amounts due Contractor for work or services provided under this Agreement. City agrees that Contractor shall have the right to control the manner and means of accomplishing the result contracted for herein.

Principal Test: The Contractor rather than the City has the right to control the manner and means of accomplishing the result contracted for.

Secondary Factors: (a) The extent of control which, by agreement, City may exercise over the details of the work is slight rather than substantial; (b) Contractor is engaged in a distinct occupation or business; (c) in the locality, the work to be done by Contractor is usually done by a specialist without supervision, rather than under the direction of an employer; (d) the skill required in the particular occupation is substantial rather than slight; (e) the Contractor rather than the City supplies the instrumentalities, tools and work place; (f) the length of time for which Contractor is engaged is of limited duration rather than indefinite; (g) the method of payment of Contractor is by the job rather than by time; (h) the work is part of a special or permissive activity, program, or project, rather than part of the regular business of the City; (i) Contractor and City believe they are creating an independent contractor relationship rather than an employer-employee relationship; and (j) the City conducts public business.

- **Claims for Labor and Materials.** Contractor shall promptly pay when due all amounts payable for labor and materials furnished in the performance of this Agreement, so as to prevent any lien or other claim under any provision of law from arising against any City property (including reports, documents, and other tangible matter produced by the Contractor hereunder), against the Contractor's rights to payments hereunder, or against the City, and shall pay all amounts due under the Unemployment Insurance Act with respect to such labor.
- **17.** <u>Discounts.</u> Contractor agrees to offer the City any discount terms that are offered to its best customers for the goods and services to be provided herein, and apply such discounts to payment made under this Agreement which meet the discount terms.
- **18.** Cooperation: Further Acts. The Parties shall fully cooperate with one another, and shall take any additional acts or sign any additional documents as may be necessary, appropriate or convenient to attain the purposes of this Agreement.
- 19. Dispute Resolution. If any dispute arises between the parties as to proper interpretation or application of this Agreement, the parties shall first meet and confer in a good faith attempt to resolve the matter between themselves. If the dispute is not resolved by meeting and conferring, the matter shall be submitted for formal mediation to a mediator selected mutually by the parties. The expenses of such mediation shall be shared equally between the parties. If the dispute is not or cannot be resolved by mediation, the parties may mutually agree (but only as to those issues of the matter not resolved by mediation) to submit their dispute to arbitration. Before commencement of the arbitration, the parties may elect to have the arbitration proceed on an informal basis; however, if the parties are unable so to agree, then the arbitration shall be conducted in accordance

with the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The decision of the arbitrator shall be binding, unless within thirty days after issuance of the arbitrator's written decision, any party files an action in court. Venue and jurisdiction for any such action between the parties shall lie in the Superior Court for the County of Monterey.

20. <u>Compliance With Laws.</u>

- (a) Each party's performance hereunder shall comply with all applicable laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City including but not limited to laws regarding health and safety, labor and employment, wage and hours and licensing laws which affect employees. This Agreement shall be governed by, enforced and interpreted under the laws of the State of California. Contractor shall comply with new, amended or revised laws, regulations or procedures that apply to the performance of this Agreement.
- (b) If the Project is a "public work," or prevailing wages are otherwise required, Contractor shall comply with all provision of California Labor Code section 1720 *et seq.*, as applicable, and laws dealing with prevailing wages, apprentices and hours of work., etc.
- (c) Contractor represents that it has obtained and presently holds all permits and licenses necessary for performance hereunder, including a Business License required by the City's Business License Ordinance. For the term covered by this Agreement, the Contractor shall maintain or obtain as necessary, such permits and licenses and shall not allow them to lapse, be revoked or suspended.
- **21.** <u>Assignment or Transfer.</u> This Agreement or any interest herein may not be assigned, hypothecated or transferred, either directly or by operation of law, without the prior written consent of the City. Any attempt to do so shall be null and void, and any assignees, hypothecates or transferees shall acquire no right or interest by reason of such attempted assignment, hypothecation or transfer.
- **22. Notices.** All notices required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be personally delivered, sent by facsimile ("fax") or certified mail, postage prepaid with return receipt requested, addressed as follows:

Notice shall be deemed effective on the date personally delivered or transmitted by facsimile or, if mailed, three days after deposit in the custody of the U.S. Postal Service. A copy of any notice sent as provided herein shall also be delivered to the Project Administrator and Project Manager.

23. <u>Amendments. Changes or Modifications.</u> This Agreement is not subject to amendment, change or modification except by a writing signed by the authorized representatives of City and Contractor.

- **24. Force Majeure.** Notwithstanding any other provisions hereof, neither Contractor nor City shall be held responsible or liable for failure to meet their respective obligations under this Agreement if such failure shall be due to causes beyond Contractor's or the City's control. It is understood and agreed to by the Contractor and the City that they cannot, and will not, claim Force Majeure based on an economic downturn of any type. Such causes include but are not limited to: strike, fire, flood, civil disorder, act of God or of the public enemy, act of the federal government, or any unit of state of local government in either sovereign or contractual capacity, epidemic, quarantine restriction, or delay in transportation to the extent that they are not caused by the party's willful or negligent acts or omissions, and to the extent that they are beyond the party's reasonable control.
- **25.** Attorney's Fees. In the event of any controversy, claim or dispute relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the losing party reasonable expenses, attorney's fees and costs.
- **26.** Successors and Assigns. All of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall apply to and bind the respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the parties. Nothing in this paragraph is intended to affect the limitation on assignment.
- **27. Authority to Enter Agreement.** Contractor has all requisite power and authority to conduct its business and to execute, deliver and perform the Agreement. Each party warrants that the individuals who have signed this Agreement have the legal power, right and authority to make this Agreement and bind each respective party.
- **28.** <u>Waiver.</u> A waiver of a default of any term of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of any succeeding default or as a waiver of the provision itself. A party's performance after the other party's default shall not be construed as a waiver of that default.
- **29.** <u>Severability.</u> Should any portion of this Agreement be determined to be void or unenforceable, such shall be severed from the whole and the Agreement will continue as modified.
- **Construction. References. Captions.** Since the parties or their agents have participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement, the language of this Agreement shall be construed simply, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against any party. Any term referencing time, days or period for performance shall be deemed calendar days and not workdays. The captions of the various sections are for convenience and ease of reference only, and do not define, limit, augment or describe the scope, content or intent of this Agreement.
- **31.** Advice of Counsel. The parties agree that they are aware that they have the right to be advised by counsel with respect to the negotiations, terms and conditions of this Agreement, and that the decision of whether or not to seek the advice of counsel with respect to this Agreement is a decision which is the sole responsibility of each of the parties hereto. This Agreement shall not be construed in favor or against either party by reason of the extent to which each party participated in the drafting of this Agreement.
- **32.** <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original, but both of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument. Counterparts may be delivered by facsimile, electronic mail (including pdf. Or any electronic signature complying with the U.S. ESIGN Act of 2000, California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (Cal. Civil Code §1633.1 et seq.) or other applicable law) or other transmission method and any counterpart so delivered shall be deemed to have been validly delivered and be valid and effective for all purposes.

- **Time.** Time is of the essence in this contract.
- **Exhibits.** In the event of any conflict between the Terms and Conditions and any terms or conditions of any document prepared or provided by the Contractor and made a part of this Agreement, including without limitation any document relating to the scope of services or payment therefore, the Terms and Conditions of this Agreement shall control over those terms and conditions.
- **35.** Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the matters as set forth in this Agreement, and no other agreement, statement or promise made by or to any party or by or to any employee, officer or agent of any party, which is not contained in this Agreement shall be binding or valid.

Exhibit A: Scope of Work and Cost Estimate

The following work plan outlines the proposed scope of work. If selected, R+A will collaborate with staff to finalize the scope of work and schedule. The work plan assumes a 15-month process.

Task 1: Project Initiation & Management

Task 1.1 - Project Kick Off Meeting

R+A will attend a an in-person kick-off meeting with City staff to establish a mutual understanding of the key issues, discuss expectations, and lay out project milestones, meeting times, public workshops, and deliverables. The kickoff meeting will occur on the same day as the city tour outlined in Task 1.2 below.

Task 1.2 - City Tour

R+A will attend an in-person city tour on the same day as the project kickoff meeting, to gain additional insight related to community character and recent development projects. This may include conducting site visits with staff to review patterns and scales of existing development and assess the quality, scale, and placement of new structures recently approved.

Task 1.3 - Monthly Conference Calls / Project Coordination

R+A will hold monthly conference calls with the Community Development Director, Planning Services Manager, and relevant Planning staff to discuss project coordination and content topics, approximately one hour each. R+A's project manager or a designated representative will be on each call. R+A will maintain an online document outlining agendas and meeting notes.

Task 1 Deliverables

- Attend one (1) kick-off meeting with staff.
- Attend one (1) city tour with staff.
- Facilitate bi-weekly conference calls between designated City staff and Consultant Project Manager (R+A: 30 meetings)

Task 2: Background Analysis + Issue Identification Summary Memo

Task 2.1 - Data Gathering and Document Review

R+A will conduct a technical review and analyze existing documents, listed below, for policy, development standards, regulations, permit procedures, and design guidance that will influence the development of objective design standards. R+A will also draw on the best practices of surrounding cities as part of the analysis.

City staff will provide R+A with all existing documents that would be useful during the evaluation phase.

Documents to Review:

- Staff's initial issue identification document and recommended changes as necessary to improve the City's understanding of the issues.
- Specific/area plans for subjectivity and design character/preferences:
 - Downtown Vitalization
 - University Villages (Dunes)

- o Seahaven (formerly Marina Heights)
- Cypress Knolls
- o Marina Station
- Design Guidelines for subjectivity and design guidance:

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- City of Marina Design Guidelines and Standards for Landscape, Site and Parking Lot Design, Site Lighting, and Signs
- Zoning Ordinance (Title 17 of the Marina Municipal Code) and Marina General Plan to ensure consistency and remove subjectivity.
- City-wide plans:
 - Local Coastal Land Use & Implementation Plan

Task 2.2 – Current Project Review

City staff will provide consultants with 2 to 3 representative sets of plans for recently approved for single-family and multi-family development projects as well as projects currently under review, including those that have been controversial and/or appealed. The City will also provide all data regarding the size, placement, and height of new residential structures that have been approved by the City, as well as any other data readily available that would be useful during the evaluation phase. In addition, City staff will provide input received at relevant Planning Commission meetings that will help highlight key concerns and sentiment from the public and decision makers on these projects. Staff will be asked to identify 2-3 buildings that exemplifies what they would like to see in the City and one that represents design features they would like to avoid. R+A will hold a 1- hour virtual meeting with the Planning Services Manager to review and discuss the current projects.

R+A will review the representative project plans to understand how development standards are currently being interpreted and applied during the current permit review process.

Task 2.3 - Site Analysis + Issue Identification Summary Memo

R+A will identify areas with the potential for single-family, multi-family, or mixed-use residential development and document key physical characteristics of the existing surrounding community and neighborhoods. This analysis will exclude the Downtown Vitalization, University Villages (Dunes), Seahaven (formerly Marina Heights), Cypress Knolls, and Marina Station Specific Plan Areas. The site analysis will serve as a visual inventory of the City in order to provide detailed information to develop appropriate City-specific objective standards. This effort will also help guide and focus the study while also enabling the project team, City staff, decision makers, and the public to better understand where such development is most likely to occur.

R+A will prepare an Issue Identification Summary Memo based on information gained from the background analysis in Task 2.1 and engagement activities in Tasks 3.2-3.3 (below). R+A will make one round of revisions to the document. The Memo will include the following:

- Summary of feedback from City Staff, Planning Services Manager, and Community Development Director
- Summary of feedback from focus group participants (Task 3.2)
- Current/recent project review and analysis
- Identification of opportunities and constraints to creating objective standards
- Results of Visual Preference Survey (See Task 3.3)

Task 2.4 - Staff Working Session #1

R+ will prepare for and attend a virtual working session with appropriate City departments and staff to review and solicit comments on the Issue Identification Summary Memo findings. The goal of the meeting will be to review and confirm the challenges and opportunities with the current guidelines and process and discuss potential frameworks for the new objective standards.

Task 2.5 - PC/CC Study Sessions

R+A will prepare for and present at Planning Commission and City Council Study Sessions (1 each) to provide an update on the existing baseline – Site Analysis and Issue Identification Memo. The feedback received will guide the development of the objective design standards. Virtual attendance is assumed.

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Task 2 Deliverables

Issue Identification Summary Memo

Task 3: Public Outreach

Task 3.1 - Project Fact Sheet

In preparation for initial engagement with the residents and stakeholders, R+A will prepare a public-facing fact sheet (2-page max) that simply describes State regulations, and the need to create objective standards and establishing a streamlined process for ministerial review. This document will be clearly written for the public, contain graphics describing the issues, challenges, and project goals. The content will be added to a City-run website for the project.



Task 3.2 - Focus Groups

R+A will conduct up to two small group discussions with stakeholders, including, but not limited to, housing developers and local designers and architects, conducted virtually. The intent is to discover the most critical issues for the City early in the process and what the project should focus on to ensure success. Stakeholders will also identify exceptional buildings to establish a list of buildings that exemplify what the city is looking for. R+A will collaborate with Staff to identify a stakeholder list for the project. City staff is responsible for scheduling and logistics. Virtual attendance is assumed.

If requested, as an optional task, focus group meetings may also be held later in the project to get additional feedback on standards as they are being developed and provide a sounding board for draft design standards.

Task 3.3 - Public Outreach

Objective standards are a challenging topic to engage the typical layperson. Instead of community workshops, our team recommends surveys as a tool to get input on a variety of design topics at the early stages of the project. Additional community input may be received at the study sessions with the Planning Commission and City Council. We have found this to be an effective approach in other communities. However, if it is decided that a different approach is warranted, then the hours assigned for this task may be re-allocated to undertake the modified task.

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R+A will conduct a community-wide Visual Preference Survey to get an understanding of the issues that are of most importance to the Marina community. This survey will help the team identify both positive and negative aspects of development that will help guide the development of the objective standards as outlined in Task 4.

- Project Fact Sheet
- Two Focus Groups
- (2) PC + CC Study Sessions (1 each)
- Visual Preference Survey

Task 4: Draft Objective Standards

Task 4.1 - Objective Design Standards Framework Plan

R+A will develop a framework plan for the transformation of the city's design guidelines into objective design standards. The framework plan will identify topic areas for design standards, the approach and format of the objective design standards, consideration of standards in specific plans, and a preliminary outline. R+A will produce a first draft of the framework plan. Any City comments will be incorporated in the preparation of the Administrative Draft.

Task. 4.2 - Staff Working Session #2

R+ will prepare for and attend a virtual working session with appropriate City staff to review and solicit comments on the Framework Plan. The discussion will help R+A to revise and finalize the Framework Plan and start preparing the draft objective design standards.

Task 4.3 – Objective Design Standards Administrative Draft

R+A will produce an illustrated Administrative Draft of the proposed objective design standards for single-family, multi-family, and residential mixed-use development. Standards will reflect the variety of building types and architectural styles appropriate in Marina and address topics such as site planning, building massing and articulation, building frontages, entrances, exterior materials, landscaping, utilitarian/mechanical elements of building design, etc. Standards will also be applicable to specific typologies based on development types (such as rowhouses/walkups, small lot single-family, garden apartments, podium buildings, etc.), design type, lot size and configuration, or other organizing principles. R+A will identify and study (4) four typologies. R+A will prepare graphic illustrations and provide images to represent and explain a suggested design topic or standard, many of which will contain text callouts helping to illustrate the design intent.

The Administrative Draft will be in Word format. Admin Draft will be used to receive feedback from the City on the initial/draft standards. The City will provide one consolidated set of actionable comments to R+A.

The Draft will include some of the following components:

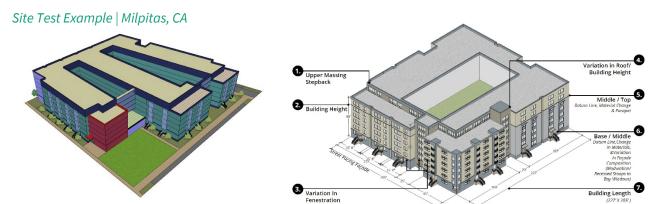
- **Site Design** The relationship of buildings to each other as well as to sidewalks, streets, and parking, and transitions between the public and private realm (frontages and setbacks, etc.).
- Massing Composition Vertical and horizontal massing breaks and façade orientation.
- **Building Articulation** Three-dimensional changes in the outside walls of a building, including projections and recesses (e.g., balconies, bay windows, etc.), upper-floor step-backs, building composition, fenestration patterns, and the like.

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- **Buffer Zones/Neighborhood Transitions** For multi-family developments adjacent to single-family neighborhoods. The team will evaluate current transitional standards and assess whether and how these might be strengthened to meet community and city objectives.
- **Parking-** The location, configuration, design, and screening of parking areas and/or structures.
- **Building Materials** Use of high quality, innovative building materials.
- **Landscaping Requirements** Objective landscape screening standards for buffering between different uses and building scales and providing green neighborhoods.

Task 4.4 - Site Tests (+1 set of revisions)

R+A will use the administrative draft of the Objective Design Standards to evaluate up to four typical site locations and/or building types. The site tests will include 3D massing models and plans that will be based on typical building prototypes of residential and mixed-use buildings in Marina. The site tests will be used to identify potential issues and provide staff and stakeholders with examples of how the standards comprehensively apply to building design. The project team will evaluate the standards on prototypical sites to ensure the standards enable the intended development. Following feedback from City staff, R+A will make (1) round of revisions to the site tests.



Task. 4.5 - Staff Working Session #3

R+ will prepare for and attend a virtual working session with City staff to review and solicit comments on the Admin Draft of the Objective Design Standards and the Site Tests. The discussion will help R+A to refine the standards and prepare the Public Review draft of the Objective Design Standards (Task 4.9).

Task 4.6 - General Regulations and Design Review

R+A will identify, discuss, and propose updates to other sections of the Zoning Ordinance as necessary to ensure consistency with the objective design standards, such as revisions to General Site Regulations and Site and Architectural Design Review. R+A will identify potential conflicts with any new State or Federal legislation and/or recent court rulings that would require changes to the city's documents.

Task 4.7 - General Plan Amendments Draft

In a memo, R+A will identify and discuss what updates to the General Plan may be necessary to ensure consistency with the objective design standards.

Task 4.8 - Public Review Draft

R+A will review the consolidated feedback from City staff on the Administrative Draft Design Standards and make all necessary updates to prepare the Public Review Draft Objective Design Standards.

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Task 4.9 – PC/CC Study Sessions (2)

R+A will prepare for, present, and solicit comments on the Public Review Draft Standards at Planning Commission and City Council Study Sessions (1 each). Feedback received will be incorporated in the Final standards. Virtual attendance is assumed.

Task 4 Deliverables

- Objective Design Standards Framework Plan
- Objective Design Standards Administrative Draft
- Site Tests (4)
- Proposed Zoning Code Revisions
- General Plan Amendment Memo

Task 5: Environmental Review

Task 5.1 - CEQA Analysis

Through R+A's experience on other objective design standards projects in California and discussions with Rincon Consultants, Inc., we believe the scope of work will not result in significant environmental impacts, and it is possible that the design standards could qualify for an exemption under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), specifically under CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3) (the "common sense exemption"). In the event the project does not quality for an exemption under CEQA and would not result in significant unmitigable impacts, Rincon Consultants can prepare an Initial Study to support a Negative Declaration or Mitigated Negative Declaration pursuant to Section 15168(c) and (e) (see Optional Tasks below).

Task 5 Deliverables

CEQA Analysis (Letter of Exemption)

Task 6: Adoption + Final Documents

Task 6.1 - PC/CC Hearings

R+A will present final documents and prepare all required visual aids, printed material, and make formal public presentations at up to (1) Planning Commission hearing and (1) City Council hearing to support adoption of the Objective Design Standards. Virtual attendance is assumed.

Task 6.2- Final Objective Design Standards

R+A will review the consolidated feedback from the City following the PC/CC Hearings and make all necessary updates to the Objective Design Standards and prepare the final documents for reproduction, dissemination, and integration into Title 17 Zoning Ordinance. R+A will provide the City with a word document of all standards and guidelines and jpg versions of all diagrams and/or photographs used in the documents. This task includes the final drafts of the other zoning amendments. A certain number of hours are budgeted for this task. If the level of effort exceeds the budgeted hours, a contract amendment may be required.

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Task 6 Deliverables

• Final Documents (Word version, and associated graphics)

Optional Tasks:

Optional Task A - Initial Study

As an optional task, Rincon can prepare an Initial Study (IS) for the project. Rincon would prepare an Administrative Draft IS for review by City staff. The Administrative Draft IS would address all items on the environmental checklist at a sufficient level of detail to allow for the determination of levels of significance. When warranted, mitigation measures would be incorporated for any potentially significant impacts identified. This scope of work assumes a low level of detail is required to address all issue areas, with no modeling for air quality, greenhouse gas emissions, noise, or transportation being required. Rincon will address one round of consolidated comments on the Administrative Draft IS and prepare a Draft IS for public review. City staff would be responsible for noticing and public circulation tasks. After a 30-day public review period, Rincon will respond to up to three public comment letters and, as necessary, prepare a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP). Only digital copies of the IS would be provided.

Budget - \$21,000

Optional Task B - SB9 Ordinance Draft (+1 set of revisions)

SB 9 was approved by Governor Gavin Newson on September 16, 2021; and went into effect on January 1, 2022. SB 9 requires the ministerial approval of a proposed urban lot split containing no more than two residential units per lot without discretionary review or a hearing. R+A will draft a stand-alone SB9 Ordinance with development and design regulations for the subdivision and development of qualified SB9 properties in the City.

Budget - \$13,060

Scope of Work Assumptions

- The scope indicates which meetings will be held virtually.
- The scope of work assumes any notification to property owners based on zoning code or general plan land use changes will be managed by the City of Marina.

- The City will provide comments on all draft documents electronically in Word. This will include one set of non-conflicting comments that provide clear direction for the consultant team.

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Cost Proposal

The Raimi + Associates team's cost proposal for preparing the Objective Design Standards for Single-Family, Multiple-Family and Mixed-Use Developments is \$167,000. The cost proposal includes a breakdown of the anticipated personnel hours for each task by billing rate category, and non-labor direct costs (travel, printing, etc.) and markups. A Letter of Exemption has been included in the base budget for environmental review.

If an IS/ND is required, the optional task budget of **\$21,000** is also provided. The preparation of a SB9 ordinance is also included as an optional task with a budget of **\$13,060**. The R+A team will work with the City staff to modify the scope and budget to best meet the City's needs.

Exhibit B - Insurance

Contractor agrees to provide insurance in accordance with the requirements set forth herein. If Contractor uses existing coverage to comply with these requirements and that coverage does not meet the requirements set forth herein, Contractor agrees to amend, supplement or endorse the existing coverage to do so. Contractor shall furnish the City with original certificates of insurance, manually autographed in ink by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. All certificates and endorsements must be received and approved by the City before any work commences. The City reserves its right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies at any time. The following coverage will be provided by Contractor and maintained on behalf of the City and in accordance with the requirements set forth herein.

Commercial General Liability (primary). Commercial general liability insurance covering Contractor's operations (and products where applicable) is required whenever the City is at risk of third party claims which may arise out of Contractor's work or presence on City premises. Contractual liability coverage is a required inclusion in this insurance.

Primary insurance shall be provided on ISO-CGL form No. CG 00 01 11 85 or 88 or on an ISO or ACORD form providing coverage at least as broad as ISO form CG 00 01 10 01 and approved in advance by the City Attorney and Risk Manager. Total limits shall be no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for all coverages. If commercial general liability insurance or other form with a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this Project or the general aggregate limit shall be two million dollars (\$2,000,000). Contractor must give written notice to the City of any pending claim, action or lawsuit which has or may diminish the aggregate. If any such claim or lawsuit exists, Contractor shall be required, prior to commencing work under this Agreement, to restore the impaired aggregate or prove it has replacement insurance protection to the satisfaction of the City Attorney and Risk Manager.

City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents and volunteers shall be added as additional insureds using ISO additional insured endorsement form CG 20 10 11 85 or forms CG 20 10 10 01 and CG 20 37 10 01. Coverage shall apply on a primary, non-contributing basis in relation to any other insurance or self-insurance, primary or excess, available to the City or any agent of City. Coverage is not expected to respond to the claims which may arise from the acts or omissions of the City. Coverage shall not be limited to the vicarious liability or supervisory role of any additional insured. Coverage shall contain no contractors' limitation endorsement. There shall be no endorsement or modification limiting the scope of coverage for liability arising from pollution, explosion, collapse, underground property damage or employment-related practices.

Umbrella Liability Insurance. Umbrella liability insurance (over primary) shall apply to bodily injury/property damage, personal injury/advertising injury, contractual liability and completed operations at a minimum, and shall be in an amount of not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000), and include a "drop down" provision providing primary coverage above a maximum \$25,000.00 self-insured retention for liability not covered by primary policies but covered by the umbrella policy. Coverage shall be following form to any underlying coverage.

Coverage shall be provided on a "pay on behalf" basis, with defense costs payable in addition to policy limits. There shall be no cross liability exclusion and no contractor's limitation endorsement. Policies limits shall be not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and in the aggregate, above any limits required in the underlying policies shall have starting and ending dates concurrent with the underlying coverage.

Business Auto. Automobile liability insurance is required where vehicles are used in performing the work under this Agreement or where vehicles are driven off-road on City premises, it is not required for simple commuting unless City is paying mileage. However, compliance with California law requiring auto liability insurance is a contractual requirement.

If automobile insurance is required for work under this Agreement, primary coverage shall be written on ISO Business Auto Coverage form CA 00 01 06 92 including symbol 1 (Any Auto) or on an ISO or ACORD form providing coverage at least as broad as CA 00 01 10 01 approved by the City Attorney and Risk Manager. Coverage shall be endorsed to stated that the City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents and volunteers shall be added as additional insureds with respect to the ownership, operation, maintenance, use, loading or unloading of any auto owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the Contractor or for which the Contractor is responsible. Limits shall be no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage. Starting and ending dates shall be concurrent. If Contractor owns no autos, a non-owned auto endorsement to the commercial general liability policy described above is acceptable.

Workers' Compensation/Employers' Liability. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability insurance are not required for single-person contractors. However, under California law these coverages (or a copy of the State's Consent to Self-Insure) must be provided if Contractor has any employees at any time during the period of this Agreement. Policy(s) shall be written on a policy form providing workers' compensation statutory benefits as required by law. Employers' liability limits shall be no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident or disease and shall be scheduled under any umbrella policy described above. Unless otherwise agreed, policy(s) shall be endorsed to waive any right of subrogation as respects the City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents and volunteers.

Property Insurance. Property insurance, in a form and amount approved by the City Attorney and Risk Manager, is required for Contractors having exclusive use of premises or equipment owned or controlled by the City. City is to be named a Loss Payee As Its Interest May Appear in property insurance in which the City has an interest, e.g., as a lien holder. Fire damage legal liability is required for persons occupying a portion of City premises.

Errors and Omissions/Professional Liability. Errors and Omissions or professional liability coverage appropriate to Contractor's profession is required, in a form and amount approved by the City Attorney and Risk Manager. Such insurance shall be in an amount of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per claim and in annual aggregate. Contractor shall maintain such insurance in place for a period of five years following completion of work or services provided under this Agreement. Such continuation coverage may be provided by one of the following: (1) renewal of the existing policy; (2) an extended reporting period endorsement; or (3) replacement insurance with a retroactive date no later than commencement of the work or services under this Agreement.

Contractor and City further agree as follows:

- a) This Exhibit supersedes all other sections and provisions of this Agreement to the extent that any other section or provision conflicts with or impairs the provisions of this Exhibit.
- b) Nothing contained in this Exhibit is to be construed as affecting or altering the legal status of the parties to this Agreement. The insurance requirements set forth in this Exhibit are intended to be separate and distinct from any other provision in this Agreement and shall be interpreted as such.
- c) All insurance coverage and limits provided pursuant to this Agreement shall apply to the full extent of the policies involved, available or applicable. Nothing contained in this Agreement or any other agreement relating to the City or its operations limits the application of such insurance coverage.
- d) Requirements of specific coverage features or limits contained in this Exhibit are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits or other requirements, or a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. Specific reference to a given coverage feature is for purposes of clarification only and is not intended by any party to be all inclusive, or to the exclusion of other coverage, or a waiver of any type.
- e) For purposes of insurance coverage only, this Agreement will be deemed to have been executed immediately upon any party hereto taking any steps that can be deemed to be in furtherance of or toward performance of this Agreement.

- f) All general or auto liability insurance coverage provided pursuant to this Agreement, or any other agreements pertaining to the performance of this Agreement, shall not prohibit Contractor, Contractor's employees, or agents from waiving the right of subrogation prior to a loss. Contractor hereby waives all rights of subrogation against the City.
- g) Unless otherwise approved by City, Contractor's insurance shall be written by insurers authorized and admitted to do business in the State of California with a minimum "Best's" Insurance Guide Rating of "A:VII." Self-insurance will not be considered to comply with these insurance specifications.
- h) In the event any policy of insurance required under this Agreement does not comply with these requirements or is canceled and not replaced, City has the right but not the duty to obtain the insurance it deems necessary and any premium paid by City will be promptly reimbursed by Contractor.
- i) Contractor agrees to provide evidence of the insurance required herein, satisfactory to City Attorney and Risk Manager, consisting of certificate(s) of insurance evidencing all of the coverages required and an additional endorsement to Contractor's general liability and umbrella liability policies using ISO form CG 20 10 11 85. Certificate(s) are to reflect that the insurer will provide at least thirty days written notice of cancellation, material reduction in coverage or reduction in limits and ten days written notice for non-payment of premium. Contractor agrees to require its insurer to modify such certificates to delete any exculpatory wording stating that failure of the insurer to mail written notice of cancellation imposes no obligation, and to delete the word "endeavor" with regard to any notice provisions. Contractor agrees to provide complete copies of policies to City within ten days of City's request for said copies.
- j) Contractor shall provide proof that policies of insurance required herein expiring during the term of this Agreement have been renewed or replaced with other policies providing at least the same coverage. Such proof will be furnished at least two weeks prior to the expiration of the coverages.
- k) Any actual or alleged failure on the part of the City or any other additional insured under these requirements to obtain proof of insurance required under this Agreement in no way waives any right or remedy of City or any additional insured, in this or any other regard.
- l) Contractor agrees to require all subcontractors or other parties hired for this Project to provide workers' compensation insurance as required herein and general liability insurance naming as additional insureds all parties to this Agreement. Contractor agrees to obtain certificates evidencing such coverage and make reasonable efforts to ensure that such coverage is provided as required here. Contractor agrees to require that no contract used by any subcontractor, or contracts Contractor enters into on behalf of City, will reserve the right to charge back to City the cost of insurance required by this Agreement. Contractor agrees that upon request, all agreements with subcontractors or others with whom Contractor contracts with on behalf of City, will be submitted to City for review. Contractor acknowledges that such contracts or agreements may require modification if the insurance requirements do not reflect the requirements herein. Failure of City to request copies of such agreements will not impose any liability on City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents and volunteers.
- m) If Contractor is a Limited Liability Company, general liability coverage must be amended so that the Limited Liability Company and its Managers, Affiliates, employees, agents and other persons necessary or incidental to its operation are insureds.
- n) Contractor agrees to provide immediate notice to City of any claim or loss against Contractor that includes City as a defendant. City assumes no obligation or liability by such notice, but has the right (but not the duty) to monitor the handling of any such claim or claims if they are likely to involve the City.

- o) Coverage will not be limited to the specific location or individual entity designated as the address of the Project. Contractor agrees to have its coverage endorsed so that all coverage limits required pursuant to this requirement are available separately for each and every location at which Contractor conducts operations of any type on behalf of City. Contractor warrants that these limits will not be reduced or exhausted except for losses attributable to those specific locations and not by losses attributable to any other operations of Contractor.
- p) Contractor agrees not to attempt to avoid its defense and indemnity obligations to City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents and volunteers by using as a defense Contractor's statutory immunity under workers' compensation or similar statutes.
- q) Contractor agrees to ensure that coverage provided to meet these requirements is applicable separately to each insured and that there will be no cross liability exclusions that preclude coverage for suits between Contractor and City or between City and any other insured or Named Insured under the policy, or between City and any party associated with City or its employees.
- r) Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability, and if necessary, commercial umbrella liability insurance, with a limit of not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) each occurrence for at least three years following substantial completion of the work.
- t) City reserves the right to modify the insurance requirements set forth herein in accordance with the terms of any specific Service Order issued as provided by the Agreement.

REOUEST:

It is requested that the City Council and Boards:

1. Consider receiving Investment Reports for the City of Marina, City of Marina as Successor Agency to the Marina Redevelopment Agency, and Preston Park Sustainable Community Non-Profit Corporation (PPSC-NPC) for the quarter ended June 30, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

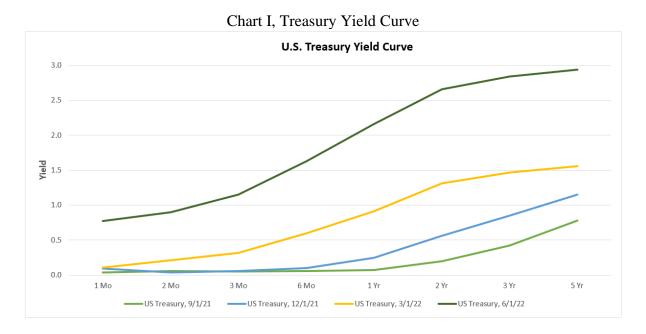
Cash Management. The City continued to maximize the deposit of idle cash into the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). Additionally, staff explored and executed investments options beyond LAIF that also aligned with the City's investment policy, which includes high-quality notes, commercial paper, and U.S. Treasuries. Changes to the City's investment portfolio for last quarter are shown in Table I, Cash and Investments. The table shows a \$23.5 million increase in total City cash, due to property tax receipts, land sales proceeds and impact fees collections.

The end of quarter LAIF interest rate was .86%, which represents a .50% increase from the previous quarter, as seen in Table I. <u>Chart I, Treasury Yield Curve</u> shows the treasury yield curve and its recent shift from September 2021 to June 2022. As this upward shift continues, staff will continue to explore other investment options, including treasury notes and additional high quality corporate products, to maximize the return of idle cash while still retaining liquidity and quality in its portfolio. Nearly half of the city's interest revenue is allocated to the General Fund while Fund 215 – Public Facilities Impact Fees, Fund 223 – FORA Dissolution Fund and Fund 422 – Measure X Capital Projects receive most of the remaining interest revenue. Interest Rate / Economy. Interest rates increased from the prior quarter and that trend is expected to continue well into 2023. The expectation is that interest rates will rise as the Fed seeks to guard against inflation. Staff will closely monitor the yield curve and purchase longer term (maturities beyond one year) investments as those opportunities arise.

Economically, the city is in a strong position with property tax revenues remaining high and transient occupancy and sales tax revenues recovering from the pandemic. Staff will closely monitor those revenues as we approach the end of the fiscal year.

Portfolio Strategy. Staff's goal is to match or outperform LAIF. As shown in Chart I, current treasury yields are such that a 3-month treasury note would accomplish that goal. Staff is exploring treasury non-treasury investments that mature in the 3-month to 2-year range to provide an equal or greater return than LAIF.

Council has previously expressed concerns about investing in fossil fuel companies, or companies that cultivate, process, or sell fossil fuel. Many state and local agencies have sought to promote a low-carbon economy by divesting from fossil fuels. The City of Marina currently has no direct investments in fossil fuel companies. LAIF, which makes up the largest component of the city's portfolio, mostly invests in United States Treasury Notes and Bills as well as other government-backed securities. Other LAIF investments include a modest amount of highly rated certificates of deposit, corporate notes, and commercial paper. These securities are issued by well capitalized domestic and international institutions. While LAIF has no formal investment policy that restricts fossil fuel investments, the State Treasurer has expressed a strong desire to divest from fossil fuels. Staff will keep abreast of any formal LAIF policy change and will also seek to incorporate fossil fuel divestment into the City of Marina's future investment policy revision, subject to City Council approval.

ANALYSIS:

The attached investment reports include the City of Marina's and the City of Marina as Successor Agency to the Marina Redevelopment Agency's reports ("**EXHIBIT A**"). These include unreconciled balances of City, Successor Agency and Preston Park investments held by financial institutions as reported on their monthly statements.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Investing the City's cash in a safe manner can yield significant interest earnings for the City.

CONCLUSION:

This request is submitted for City Council consideration and possible action.

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council consider:

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2022-, approving the allocation and appropriation of \$95,000 from unallocated General Funds to the Capital Improvement Program adding the Patton Parkway Retaining Wall Repair Project HSR2201, and;
- 2. Authorizing Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries.

BACKGROUND:

Construction of Patton Parkway was completed in 2008. The project included a wood retaining walls along a bicycle and pedestrian trail north of the roadway. The retaining walls were intended to stabilize the slope down to the trail from adjacent residential property that is at a higher elevation. The depth of the founding posts is not sufficient to continue retaining soil which will require reconstructing the retaining walls with better foundations (see attached **EXHIBIT A**).

Staff reviewed the retaining wall and identified the need for replacement over the past few months. Staff performed the engineering calculations to determine an adequate retaining wall design and prepared estimates for the work.

City staff received an email correspondence from the resident of 3001 Independence Avenue on August 15, 2022 regarding erosion issues along Patton Parkway. At the regular meeting of August 16, 2022, the City Council received public comment from the same resident regarding the hillside erosion on Patton Parkway immediately behind his property creating fence damage and ground slope erosion.

ANALYSIS:

The project scope consists of removing and replacing approximately 280 linear feet of retaining wall varying in height from 4 feet tall down to 1 foot tall. The new retaining wall will consist of concrete footings, treated timber, and drainage elements to prevent further erosion and contain the hillside with minimal future maintenance.

If approved by City Council, staff will issue a work order to the current on-call construction contractor to expedite the retaining wall replacement prior to winter.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Should the City Council approve this request, the City Finance Director will make all necessary accounting and budgetary entries to facilitate a \$95,000 interfund transfer from the unallocated General Fund balance to CIP Account HSR2201 – Patton Parkway Retaining Wall Repair Project.

CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA READ BY TITLE ONLY AND APPROVE THE FIRST READING OF ORDINANCE 2022-, AMENDING MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 5 TO MODIFY SECTION 5.32.090 TO ALLOW THE ASSIGNMENT OF A SECOND CARDROOM PERMIT IN THE MARINA MUNICIPAL CODE.

REQUEST: It is requested that the Marina City Council:

- 1. Read by title only and waive further reading and approve the first reading of Ordinance 2022-, approving Amendments to Title 5 of the Municipal Code by modifying Sections 5.32.090 to remove language that allow the assignment of a cardroom permits to the applicant ("EXHIBIT A").
- 2. If the City Council approves the first reading of the Ordinance above, direct staff to work with the Planning Commission to prepare a zoning text amendment to identify the specific zoning districts the second cardroom would be located and to make a recommendation for their location for City Council review in a timely manner.

SUMMARY:

On July 28, 2022, Parkwest Casinos applied for a Marina Municipal Code (MMC) and Zoning Code text change ("**EXHIBIT B**") requesting to change Municipal Code Chapter 5.32 to allow the second permit to be transferred to them and to allow them to locate a new cardroom in the City of Marina.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Marina's MMC Chapter 5.32 allows two cardrooms with up to ten tables per cardroom. There were two cardrooms operating within the City of Marina upon its corporation in 1975.

The previous cardroom business known as Mortimer's closed in September of 2015. With the closure of the business the license expired after thirty days of not being transferred or assigned per MMC Section 5.32.090 and the legal non-conforming use at the previous location of 3100 Del Monte Boulevard was abandoned after six months per MMC 17.64.050. On January 20, 2022, the State of California Gambling Control Commission approved Parkwest Casino Marina's request for an Initial State Gambling License ("EXHIBIT C"). Therefore, Parkwest Casino is requesting Municipal Code text changes to allow the transfer of the permit and then Title 17 Zoning Ordinance changes to allow cardrooms to be permitted in the City of Marina.

ANALYSIS:

Parkwest Casinos is proposing to modify Section 5.32.090 Assignment of permit section of the Municipal Code to allow the assignment of what was previously Mortimer's card room permit to Parkwest Casinos. Under State law, new card room permits may not be issued by a city, only a transfer or assignment of an existing permit.

Staff does not have any concerns regarding the proposed change by the applicant. If approved, it will result in the redevelopment of the existing site, or potentially the development a new vacant site in the City.

Currently, our Zoning Ordinance does not allow card rooms to be permitted in the City of Marina. If this proposed Municipal Code change is approved, the applicant will need to submit an application for an change to the Zoning Ordinance to modify the Zoning Code to identify specific zoning districts for card rooms.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The City has a card room tax that provides revenue for the City's General Fund. The following charts shows the revenue that can be generated from card rooms and the historical revenue collected from card rooms since 2015.

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-__

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 5 TO MODIFY SECTION 5.32.090 "ASSIGNMENT OF PERMIT" TO ALLOW THE ASSIGNMENT OF A SECOND CARDROOM PERMIT IN THE MARINA MUNICIPAL CODE.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. To allow the assignment of a second cardroom permit to Parkwest Casino Marina, the City shall modify Chapter 5.32 Cardrooms Section 5.32.090.
- 2. An amendment to the City of Marina's Municipal Code is needed allow the assignment.
- 3. <u>Chapter 5, Article 32</u>. Chapter 5, Article 32, entitled "Cardrooms" is hereby amended by modifying Section 5.32.090 "Assignment of permits", to the Municipal Code to read as set forth on the attached Exhibit "A," and incorporated herein by this reference thereto.
- 4. <u>Environmental</u>. In accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), staff finds that this ordinance is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to the State CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Sections: 15060(c)(2), because the proposed ordinance will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment; and 15061(b)(3), because the proposed ordinance is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. Therefore, the adoption of this ordinance is exempt from CEQA and no further environmental review is necessary.
- 5. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect on thirty (30) days after its final passage and adoption.
- 6. <u>Severability</u>. If any portion of this Ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or invalid the City Council hereby declares that it would have enacted the remainder of this Ordinance regardless of the absence of any such invalid part.

7. <u>Posting of Ordinance</u> . Within fifteen (15) days after the passage of thi
Ordinance, the City Clerk shall cause it to be posted in the three (3) public places designated by
resolution of the City Council.

Proposed Changes to Chapter 5.32 Cardrooms

Section: 5.32.090 Assignment of permit

No cardroom permit, or any interest therein, issued under the authority of this chapter, may be transferred from person to person, assigned, pledged or hypothecated in whole or in part, except as authorized by this chapter. Such permit shall not be subject to transfer to any other holder or operator through the levy of any execution by any judgment creditor or any judicial sale under any proceedings to enforce or collect any judgment, debt or obligation. The transfer of the cardroom activity to a different location may be approved by the chief of police provided the application or transfer fulfills all the conditions specified in Sections 5.32.040 and 5.32.050 for the issuance of cardroom permits and such location is allowed under Title 17 of this code (Zoning Ordinance). The transfer of a valid cardroom permit to another person may be allowed by the chief of police when the permittee is deceased and the executor or administrator of his estate has applied for such transfer within thirty days after the date of death, or when the permittee has become physically incapacitated so that he is unable to conduct his cardroom business and will be so incapacitated for a period of six months or more from the date of such application; provided further, that any such application for transfer of a cardroom permit to another person may only be made by or on behalf of a permittee holding a valid permit issued and unrevoked at the time of adoption of the ordinance codified in this chapter and not by the transferee or such permit or any other person; provided further, that the proposed recipient of any such permit transfer shall fulfill all the terms and conditions of this chapter for the issuance of any cardroom permit.

Marina Municipal Code section 5.32.050 Issuance of a Permit

A cardroom permit may be issued for a period of one year upon the recommendation of the chief of police, subject to the following conditions and qualifications:

- A. No applicant shall be recommended for a cardroom permit if:
- 1. The applicant has knowingly misstated, misrepresented, concealed or withheld any material fact on the application for permit; or
- 2. Such applicant has previously been convicted of a felony or of any narcotics violation; or
- 3. Any said cardroom is proposed to be located within any area of the city which is zoned residential; or if said cardroom location is adjacent to a residential area and, in the opinion of the chief of police, the operation of a cardroom in such location would tend to cause a public nuisance or a police problem; or
- 4. Said cardroom is proposed to be located within one hundred and fifty five hundred feet of a public school, church, hospital, children's playground or any other public facility where the presence of said cardroom might tend to promote a demoralizing effect or cause a police problem or create a public nuisance.
- B. The action of the chief of police in recommending the denial of such a permit on the basis of any part of this section shall be subject to an appeal to the city council.

 Notice of such appeal shall be filed in writing with the city clerk within ten days after the denial of said permit. Upon failure to file such notice of appeal within the ten-day period, the action of the chief of police in denying such permit shall be final and conclusive.

The rear of the proposed location is adjacent to 2 residential homes. It is Parkwest Casinos' intent to locate the casino building towards the rear of the property to act as "buffer" between it and the residential homes. The public areas of the cardroom will away from the residential homes and toward Highway 1. Additionally, Parkwest Casinos plans to erect a barrier between the casino property and the 2 residential homes, and employ full time security to patrol the casino and parking lot.

The proposed location is only 1300 ft. from City Hall and the Marina Police Department Headquarters.

Further, Parkwest Casinos does not believe the proposed revised Municipal Code section 5.32.050(A) would be applicable to the proposed location due to the following reasons:

- The closest park (Marina City Park) is 1100 ft. away.
- The nearest church (Church of Christ Marina) is 1100 ft. away.
- Marina High School is approximately 150 feet away.
- · The nearest hospital is 2 miles away.
- The proposed location is not zoned residential.

To avoid any doubt concerning the transferability of the license from Mortimer's, Inc. to Parkwest Casino Marina, LLC, we recommend amending Municipal Code section 5.32.090. The proposed changes will allow a gaming permit to transfer, while still requiring the transferee to meet all existing conditions of the Municipal Code for a cardroom owner permit.

Marina Municipal Code section 5.32.090 Assignment of Permit

The transfer of a valid cardroom permit to another person may be allowed by the chief of police when the permittee is deceased and the executor or administrator of his estate has applied for such transfer within thirty days after the date of death, or when the permittee has become physically incapacitated so that he is unable to conduct his cardroom business and will be so incapacitated for a period of six months or more from the date of such application; provided further, that any such application for transfer of a cardroom permit to another person may only be made by or on behalf of a permittee holding a valid permit issued and unrevoked at the time of adoption of the ordinance codified in this chapter and not by the transferee or such permit or any other person; provided further, that the transferee of any such transfer shall fulfill all the terms and conditions of this chapter for the issuance of any cardroom permit.

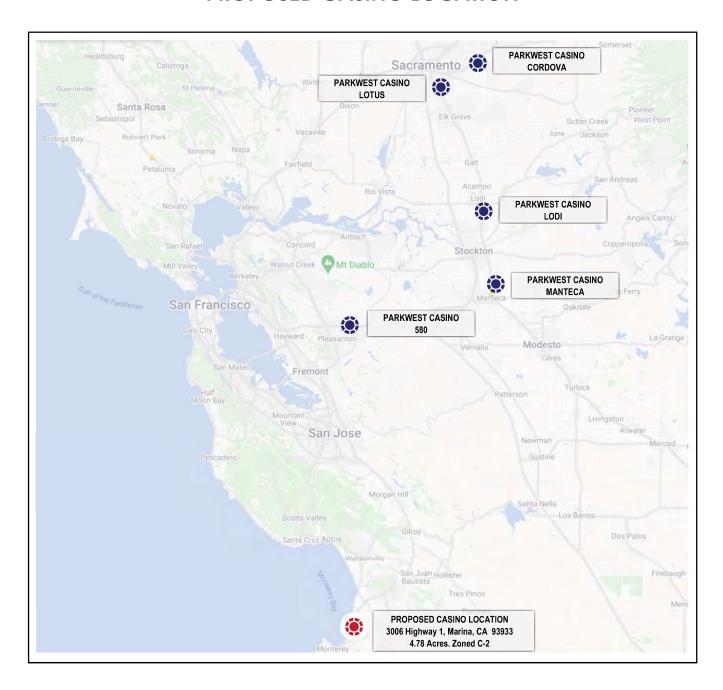

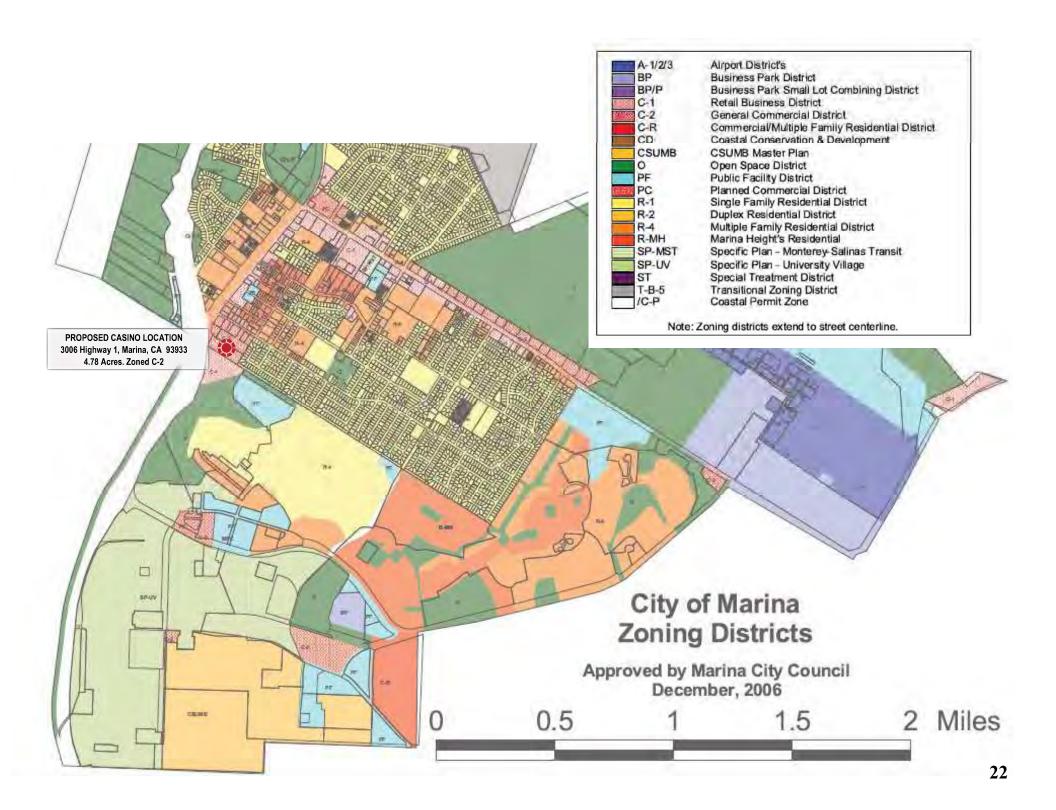
Marina Municipal Code section 17.20.030 Conditional Uses

Uses permitted, subject to first securing a use permit in each case, in the C-2 districts shall be as follows:

- A. Hotels, motels, clubs and lodges;
- B. Public and quasi-public uses, including schools, churches and public utility buildings;
- C. Drive-in banks, open air retail and wholesale sales, drive-in restaurants, refreshment stands, theaters, laundries, development laboratories, used car sales, used or secondhand goods, and other uses which are of similar character;
- D. Wholesale distributors of petroleum products, contractors' yards, welding shops and other uses of a similar character;
- E. Manufacture of clothing, handicraft products, printing, lithographing, and other light manufacturing or industrial uses of a similar character;
- F. Airports, heliports, and landing strips for aircraft;
- G. Single-family, duplex and multiple-family residential dwellings limited to studio and one-bedroom units with a minimum of five hundred twenty-five square feet and a maximum of nine hundred square feet to a maximum density of one unit per five thousand square feet of lot area within the same building as commercial uses on the site and located above those commercial uses. Such residential uses shall be permitted subject to site and architectural design review approval. However, if residential use is existing or approved for a site, only those uses identified in Section 17.20.020(A) shall be allowed on the same site and all other permitted uses and all conditional uses listed in this chapter shall not be permitted on the site;
- H. Cannabis retailer;
- I. Cannabis manufacturing, cannabis distribution and cannabis testing labs; or
- J. Cardrooms.

The California Gambling Control Commission (Commission) has approved Parkwest Casino Marina and it's owner-licensee's Initial Cardroom Business License Applications at its January 20, 2022 Commission Meeting through January 31, 2024 with the following conditions:

The Owner-Licensee may not open or offer controlled games until the Bureau of Gambling Control has inspected the cardroom and determined that the cardroom is in compliance with all pertinent regulatory standards. Prior to the opening for business, the owner-licensee, shall provide to the Bureau of Gambling Control:

- 1. A current and fully completed Business Entity: Supplemental Information, CGCC-CH2-06 (New 05/20), or its most current successor form, which includes the new address of the gambling establishment;
- 2. The Owner-Licensee must comply with applicable relocation requirements pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title 4, Division 18, Chapter 7, Article 1, Section 12364;
- 3. A current and valid business license issued by the City of Marina for the gambling establishment;
- 4. A current reviewed and approved Safety and Security Plan, as required by California Code of Regulations, title 4, sections 12370 and 12372;
- 5. A current Emergency and Evacuation Plan, as required by California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 12370, that has been approved by the responsible local authority;
- 6. A current lease for the gambling establishment's premises, if applicable; and
- 7. A current and complete Chart of Accounts, as required by California Code of Regulations, title 4, section 12312.

CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2022–APPROVING A CONCESSIONAIRE AGREEMENT WITH CHAPARRAL COUNTRY CORPORATION, INC. OF WOODSIDE, CA TO PROVIDE RECREATION FACILITIES AND PROGRAMS TO THE PUBLIC AT THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN CENTER PARK; AUTHORIZE THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE THE AGREEMENT ON BEHALF OF THE CITY SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY; AND DIRECT STAFF TO PROVIDE NOTICE TO VACATE TO THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN ASSOCIATION

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council consider:

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2022-, approve a concessionaire agreement with Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc. of Woodside CA (**EXHIBIT A**) to provide recreational facilities and programs to the public at the Marina Equestrian Center Park; and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the agreement on behalf of the City subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney; and
- 3. Direct staff to provide notice to vacate to the Marina Equestrian Association.

BACKGROUND:

The 13.76-acre parcel of property at 5th Avenue and 9th Street known as the "Marina Equestrian Center Park" ("MEC Park") was conveyed to the City of Marina ("City") by Quitclaim Deed from the Department of the Interior of the U.S. Government, acting by and through the Director, National Park Service ("NPS"), on April 13, 1998, under provisions of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 (40 USC §550(e)) and the Federal Lands to Parks Program (the "Lands to Parks Program") a public benefit conveyance program. The City paid no consideration to the federal government for the land and continued public ownership is mandatory as the land conveyed must be used in perpetuity only for public park and public recreation area purposes. Under the Lands to Parks Program, there is no authorization for the dedication of any portion of the land conveyed for private purposes nor for the generation of revenue by any means other than by providing a service that facilitates public recreation. The approved use must be in accordance with a Program of Utilization and Plan ("POU"), to which NPS' concurrence is required, which may be amended from time to time.

Together, the "Public Conveyance of Parks and Recreation Property at Fort Ord," July 1993, attached as **EXHIBIT B**, and the letter dated May 25, 1994, with City Resolution No. 94-23 attached as **EXHIBIT C**, and the Quitclaim Deed recorded April 24, 1998 ("Quitclaim Deed"), attached as **EXHIBIT D**, provided for the transfer to the City of 27.235 acres, then commonly referred to as "horse stables at Fort Ord."

The present operator of MEC Park, the Marina Equestrian Association (the "MEA"), was formed in 1994 by a group of military families and civilians who were operating the horse stables at Fort Ord. Faced with the closure of Fort Ord and with the loss of their Army sponsor for the land, and the potential loss of the facility to military and civil service families regularly assigned to the Monterey peninsula, the MEA approached the City in April of 1994 to sponsor MEA's application to continue to operate on the (then) 34-acre property where the Fort Ord recreational stables were located.

In 1994, the City's request for conveyance of the horse stables at Fort Ord was added by amendment to the City's request for conveyance of the Sports and Tennis Parcels. A POU for the stables was not provided at that time. In a letter to the City dated December 30, 1997, the NPS requested a detailed POU Plan, which outlined the proposed use and development plans for the stable parcel. In response, on January 30, 1998, the City submitted a draft POU and received NPS' acceptance and concurrence to that POU (the "1998 POU") on March 20, 1998. On January 8, 2000, the City and the MEA entered into an Operating Agreement for the Marina Equestrian Center ("Operating Agreement") for certain premises and facilities consisting of 13.76 acres. Although the land deed requires NPS approval of the Concessionaire and Operating Agreement, MEA has never received NPS approval as a concessionaire. The term of the Operating Agreement commenced on February 1, 2000, and ended on January 31, 2005. MEA, has continued to operate on a month-to-month basis to the present time.

The City Council subsequently directed that a second POU be prepared to replace the 1998 POU and an ad hoc committee was established for this purpose and a public process was conducted. The resulting POU (the "2013 POU") was approved by the City Council on July 16, 2013, and in September 2013 the 2013 POU was provided to NPS for its review. A copy is attached as **EXHIBIT E**. On January 12, 2017, NPS, through NPS Federal Lands to Parks Program Manager Mr. David Seigenthaler, communicated its conditional concurrence with the 2013 POU with a caveat concerning the private boarding of horses. NPS does not consider private long-term boarding of horses to be a public recreational use of the site. This communication is attached as **EXHIBIT F**. The 2013 POU was developed in accordance with the NPS' advice and is the current operative POU for MEC Park. Over the years, the most problematic use of the equestrian center by MEA has been the issue of private boarding.

The Council has prioritized the development of MEC Park as a public park consistent with the Lands to Parks Program and the best interests of the City and the public. The Quitclaim Deed and the Lands to Park Program authorize the use of concessionaires, subject to NPS' prior concurrence, to offer public services. In order to implement the 2013 POU on March 21, 2017, the City Council unanimously adopted Resolution 2017-28, directing staff to prepare and issue a Request for Proposals ("RFP") for a concessionaire to operate an equestrian facility at the MEC Park consistent with the 2013 POU and direction from the NPS.

Three proposals in response to the RFP were received on January 4, 2021. The proposing concessionaires were Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc. ("Chaparral"); MEA; and Fort Ord Equine Foundation. Staff evaluated the proposals, presentations by the proposers and interview responses according to the criteria stated in the RFP. The proposers were rated and ranked to determine the most qualified respondent to the request for proposals. Staff determined that Chaparral is the most qualified concessionaire. Staff recommendations were presented at a special City Council meeting held on August 31st, 2021. At the meeting, City Council received comments from the public and continued the item to the September 8th, 2021 meeting when the City Council adopted Resolution 2021-96, attached as **EXHIBIT G**. The Resolution took the following actions: approved Chaparral as the most qualified respondent to the RFP to provide recreational facilities and programs to the public at MEC Park; directed staff to negotiate the terms of a concession agreement with Chaparral; directed staff to obtain NPS concurrence with the terms of the concession agreement; directed staff to do further vetting of the financials of Chaparral; and directed staff to return to City Council with a concession agreement for approval.

ANALYSIS:

Over the past year, City staff has been actively working with the Chaparral team in negotiating a draft concessionaire agreement. With the assistance of Keyser Marston, the City reviewed the proprietary financial records of Chaparral and has determined they appear to be financially stable and have sufficient equity available to operate successfully as the concessionaire a the MEC Park.

On August 15th, 2022 MEA members provided access for City staff and Chaparral to the MEC Park facilities they have been utilizing under the Operating Agreement. This allowed for the completion of an inventory of the facilities and equipment that will be made available to the concessionaire under the draft agreement attached as **EXHIBIT A**.

While this was happening, there was an effort put together by certain members of the public and others to reach out to United States Congressman Jimmy Panetta and get his assistance in requesting the NPS reconsider their prior decision and direction to the City of Marina regarding long-term boarding of horses. Attached is a letter from Congressman Panetta written to the NPS on December 14, 2021 (**EXHIBIT H**).

As a response to this effort, the City received a letter dated July 12, 2022, from Joel Lynch, the Chief of State and Local Assistance Programs from the NPS Washington, DC office attached as **EXHIBIT I**, issuing a final request and notice for the City to cure non-compliance at MEC Park. As indicated in the letter, the NPS continues to support the City of Marina's efforts to make the MEC Park a truly public park and wanted a status update of our draft concessionaire agreement with Chaparral. However, as indicated in the letter, NPS and the General Services Administration (GSA) must explore alternative actions to remedy the current situation at the MEC Park if the City does not move forward with approving a concessionaire agreement with Chaparral.

If the City Council does not want to move forward with approving an agreement with Chaparral, the following alternate remedies were provided to the City by NPS:

- 1. Voluntary reversion of MEC Park to federal ownership.
- 2. Abrogation of the park use requirements through sale of the property to the City at fair market value.
- 3. Transfer of the property to another governmental entity (such as the County) capable of operating the site as a public park under NPS regulations.
- 4. Involuntary reversion as a last resort, absent an adequate response by the City to NPS request for a public use plan that meets the public recreation purpose of the conveyance.

If Council approves a concessionaire agreement with Chaparral, staff will provide reasonable notice to MEA to vacate MEC Park.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Approval of the agreement will provide revenue to the NPS fund through rent payments and concessionaire revenue sharing amounting from \$76,800 to \$114, 240 during the first 5-year term of the agreement.

CONCLUSION:

This matter is submitted to the City Council for consideration and possible action.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA APPROVING A CONCESSIONAIRE AGREEMENT WITH CHAPARRAL COUNTRY CORPORATION, INC. OF WOODSIDE, CA TO PROVIDE RECREATION FACILITIES AND PROGRAMS TO THE PUBLIC AT THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN CENTER PARK; AUTHORIZE THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE THE AGREEMENT ON BEHALF OF THE CITY SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY; AND DIRECT STAFF TO PROVIDE NOTICE TO VACATE TO THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN ASSOCIATION

WHEREAS the 35-acre parcel of property at 5th Avenue and 9th Street known as the "Marina Equestrian Center Park" was deeded by the U.S. Government to the City of Marina on April 13, 1998, under the National Park Service's (NPS) Federal Lands to Parks Program; and

WHEREAS together, the "Public Conveyance of Parks and Recreation Property at Fort Ord," July 1993, attached as **EXHIBIT B**, and the letter dated May 25, 1994, with City Resolution No. 94-23 attached as **EXHIBIT C**, and the Quitclaim Deed recorded April 24, 1998 ("Quitclaim Deed"), attached as **EXHIBIT D**, provided for the transfer to the City of 27.235 acres, then commonly referred to as "horse stables at Fort Ord"; and

WHEREAS on July 16, 2013, City Council unanimously adopted a proposed Program of Utilization (POU) for the Marina Equestrian Center Park; and

WHEREAS in July 2013, the proposed POU was submitted to the National Park Service; and

WHEREAS on January 12, 2017, the National Park Service communicated its approval of the proposed POU with the proviso that the private long-term boarding of horses is not a public recreational use of the site and the City must establish a suitable plan to make boarding of horses an equitable park use; and

WHEREAS in order to implement the POU, the City Council adopted resolution 2017-28 on March 21, 2017, directing staff to prepare and issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) for a concessionaire to operate an equestrian facility at the Marina Equestrian Center Park consistent with the POU and direction from the NPS; and

WHEREAS staff issued an RFP for potential concessionaires on October 23, 2020. Three proposals in response to the RFP were received on January 4, 2021; and

WHEREAS the proposing concessionaires were Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc. (Chaparral); Marina Equestrian Association; and Fort Ord Equine Foundation. Staff evaluated the proposals, presentations by the proposers and interview responses according to the criteria stated in the RFP. The proposers were rated and ranked to determine the most qualified respondent to the request for proposals. Staff determined that Chaparral is the most qualified concessionaire; and

WHEREAS staff recommendations were presented at a special City Council meeting held on August 31st, 2021. At the meeting, City Council received comments from the public and continued the item to the September 8th, 2021 meeting when the City Council adopted Resolution 2021-96, attached as **EXHIBIT G**. The Resolution took the following actions: approved Chaparral as the most qualified respondent to the RFP to provide recreational facilities and programs to the public at MEC Park; directed staff to negotiate the terms of a concession agreement with Chaparral; directed staff to obtain NPS concurrence with the terms of the concession agreement; directed staff to do further vetting of the financials of Chaparral; and directed staff to return to City Council with a concession agreement for approval; and,

WHEREAS over the past year, City staff has been actively working with the Chaparral team in negotiating a draft concessionaire agreement. With the assistance of Keyser Marston, the City reviewed the proprietary financial records of Chaparral and has determined they appear to be financially stable and have sufficient equity available to operate successfully as the concessionaire a the MEC Park; and,

WHEREAS on August 15th, 2022 MEA members provided access for City staff and Chaparral to the MEC Park facilities they have been utilizing under the Operating Agreement. This allowed for the completion of an inventory of the facilities and equipment that will be made available to the concessionaire under the draft agreement attached as **EXHIBIT A**; and,

WHEREAS while this was happening, there was an effort put together by certain members of the public and others to reach out to United States Congressman Jimmy Panetta and get his assistance in requesting the NPS reconsider their prior decision and direction to the City of Marina regarding long-term boarding of horses. Attached is a letter from Congressman Panetta written to the NPS on December 14, 2021 (**EXHIBIT H**); and,

WHEREAS as a response to this effort, the City received a letter dated July 12, 2022, from Joel Lynch, the Chief of State and Local Assistance Programs from the NPS Washington, DC office attached as **EXHIBIT I**, issuing a final request and notice for the City to cure non-compliance at MEC Park. As indicated in the letter, the NPS continues to support the City of Marina's efforts to make the MEC Park a truly public park and wanted a status update of our draft concessionaire agreement with Chaparral. However, as indicated in the letter, NPS and the General Services Administration (GSA) must explore alternative actions to remedy the current situation at the MEC Park if the City does not move forward with approving a concessionaire agreement with Chaparral; and,

WHEREAS, if the City Council does not want to move forward with approving an agreement with Chaparral, the following alternate remedies were provided to the City by NPS:

- 1. Voluntary reversion of MEC Park to federal ownership.
- 2. Abrogation of the park use requirements through sale of the property to the City at fair market value.
- 3. Transfer of the property to another governmental entity (such as the County) capable of operating the site as a public park under NPS regulations.
- 4. Involuntary reversion as a last resort, absent an adequate response by the City to NPS request for a public use plan that meets the public recreation purpose of the conveyance

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council hereby approves Resolution No. 2022—which includes the following actions:

- Approve a concessionaire agreement with Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc. of Woodside CA to provide recreational facilities and programs to the public at the Marina Equestrian Center Park; and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the agreement on behalf of the City subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney; and
- 3. Direct staff to provide notice to vacate to the Marina Equestrian Association.

CONCESSION AGREEMENT

This Concession Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into this	day of
, 2022, between the City of Marina, California ("City") and C	haparral
Country Corporation, 4040 Woodside Road Woodside, California 94062, Fein # 27	7-0939720
which is a corporation organized under the laws of California ("Concessionaire").	

Recitals

Whereas, the City owns certain land totaling 35 acres, obtained by the City from the United States of America (the "USA"), as surplus property, known as the Marina Equestrian Center Park ("MEC Park" or "Property"), and deeded to the City on April 24, 1998. Said quitclaim deed ("Deed") is attached and hereinafter referred to as **Exhibit A**; and

Whereas, Condition No. 3 of said Deed provides that the "property shall not be sold, leased, assigned or otherwise disposed of except to another eligible governmental agency [...]. However, nothing in this provision shall preclude the [City] from providing related recreational facilities and services compatible with the approved application, through concession agreements entered in with third parties, provided prior concurrence to such agreements is obtained in writing by the Secretary of the Interior," or their delegated representative, the National Park Service ("NPS"); and

Whereas, the City and Concessionaire desire to provide an equestrian riding and training program on a portion of the MEC Park for the use and benefit of the general public; and

Whereas, the City is satisfied that provision of additional services and facilities at the MEC Park is in the best interest of the City and the public.

NOW, THEREFORE, for the reasons set forth above, and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements as hereinafter set forth, the City agrees to allow Concessionaire to provide equestrian riding, guided equestrian rides, equestrian riding lessons, limited equestrian boarding for visitors, and history education services more particularly described in **Exhibit D**, Concessionaire Uses and Programs, upon a portion of the real property described in **Exhibits A** - **C** attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference and located at the MEC Park.

1. Location: The City does hereby assign to the Concessionaire the use of five (5) former veterinary hospital buildings, three (3) riding arenas, a round pen, parking areas, seventy-one (71) horse stalls, and the area enclosed by thirty-two (32) turnouts. All five (5) of the former veterinary hospital buildings are on the historic registry and subject to applicable use requirements. See Exhibit B, attached hereto for site map. The area assigned to the Concessionaire is a 14.22 acre portion of the Property designated as areas C and D on Exhibit B, Site Map, along with the 6,000 square foot parking area south of building 2850 within area B on Exhibit B. Utilization of the buildings and grounds shown on Exhibit C ("Concession Location") and described below are subject to all pertinent

restrictions imposed in the quitclaim deed ($\underline{Exhibit A}$). The Parties have the option to expand the Concession Location, subject to appropriate approvals.

a. Kennel Building 2838 5th Avenue

The Kennel Building 3144 (see Concession Location, **Exhibit C**) has over a dozen dog kennels and two (2) ADA restrooms.

b. Veterinary Ward A 2834 5th Avenue and Ward B 2836 5th Avenue (Tack Rooms and Secondary Uses)

Combined, the two (2) veterinary wards have thirty (30) tack rooms. Ward B 2836 has a restroom that shall be available to the public at all times during MEC Park hours. Either building may be beneficial in remaining a tack room to better facilitate the Concessionaire's equestrian services.

c. Colic Building 2832 5th Avenue

The Colic Building has one bathroom and a small kitchen inside. There is a sink as well as connections for new appliances.

d. Veterinary Clinic 2830 5th Avenue

The Veterinary Clinic building has four (4) internal offices and two (2) bathrooms. This building shall be publicly accessible while the MEC Park is open and may be a venue for special events or historic and cultural lectures. It can accommodate approximately 75 to 100 people.

e. Arenas and Stalls

There are three (3) arenas, a round pin, seventy-one (71) horse stalls and thirty-two (32) turnouts at the MEC Park. The Program of Utilization ("POU") **Exhibit J** approved by the City on March, 21st, 2017 (Resolution 2017-28) indicates appropriate use of stalls by area. See **Exhibit B**. Stalls on the Northwest portion of MEC Park may be made available for limited, short-term rentals to visitors after public use has been maximized to the full extent by the Concessionaire. Such rentals shall require a written agreement, are limited to less than sixty (60) days in duration, and are not subject to renewal.

f. Parking Areas

Areas available for parking within the Concession Location are east of building 2832, north of building 2838, and south of building 2850 ("Parking Areas").

2. Use of Property/Concession Location:

a. Concessionaire shall use, occupy, and maintain the Concession Location in a business like, careful, clean, and non-hazardous manner for the sole purpose of providing services more particularly described in **Exhibit D** in strict accordance with all terms and provisions imposed by the Department of the Interior as set forth in **Exhibit A**. Written approval by the City and written concurrence by the Secretary of the Interior or their delegated representative, NPS, shall be required for other proposed use in conjunction with or in addition to those specified above.

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- b. Existing buildings are known to contain asbestos and lead as documented in the material surveys attached as **Exhibit E**. Any alteration of the existing buildings shall require City approval of plans suitable for issuance of a building permit. All work shall be conducted in a safe manner per the requirements of any building permit issued.
- c. No Warranty. Concessionaire further understands and agrees that no representation, statement, or warranty, express or implied, has been made by or on behalf of the City as to the condition of the Property or the suitability of the Property for its intended use, save and except for the representation and warranty that no City officer, employee, or agent has caused any condition of pollution or contamination that may now exist on the Property. Such representation and warranty, however, shall not extend to any condition of pollution or contamination caused by the federal government or to any lessee of City. Concessionaire agrees to accept the Property in its present condition and "as is" with respect to all conditions that may now exist on or under the Property. Moreover, Concessionaire agrees to waive any claim or right of action against the City that Concessionaire now has or hereafter may acquire arising out of the condition of the Property, its soils or the groundwater underlying the Property, including but not limited to any claim of indemnity which Concessionaire may have by reason of costs incurred by Concessionaire arising out of the abatement or cleanup of any pollution or contamination condition discovered on the Property hereinafter required under applicable state, federal or City laws or regulations save and except for a claim or right of action arising out of a condition of pollution or contamination caused by an officer, employee or agent of the City.
- d. Public access to MEC Park shall be allowed during hours established by the City's Municipal Code.
- e. Fees charged for services provided by Concessionaire shall be reasonable so as to encourage participation by the general public.
- f. Parking Areas shall be made available to the public. Any parking restrictions proposed by Concessionaire must be reviewed and approved by City prior to implementing changes.
- 3. Personal Property: An inventory of the existing personal property for use by the Concessionaire throughout the term of the Agreement is attached hereto as **Exhibit F**. Concessionaire shall maintain all such personal property in good working condition, subject to reasonable wear and tear. Upon completion or termination of this Agreement, all personal property items shall be accounted for and returned to the City. During the course of this Agreement, Concessionaire shall promptly notify City of any damage to personal property.
- 4. <u>Term</u>: The Agreement shall be effective from the date of execution for an initial term of five (5) years, unless terminated earlier.

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5. Renewal: Concessionaire will have an option to renew this Agreement for two consecutive five-year terms upon conditions to be mutually-agreed upon by the Parties. Any Agreement reached by the City and Concessionaire for renewal of this Agreement shall be subject to the written approval of the Secretary of the Interior or their delegated representative, NPS, if any significant changes to the Agreement are included.

Concessionaire shall notify the City ninety (90) days prior to the expiration of the term of the Agreement of its intent to exercise an option to renew the Agreement with the City.

6. Concession Payments.

- a. <u>Commencement of Payment Obligations:</u> For the purposes of this Agreement and payment of Concession Payments, Month One (1) shall mean the first month of Concessionaire occupancy under this Agreement, which shall commence no later than January 1, 2023.
- b. Within thirty (30) days of the month following commencement of operations, and on or before the thirtieth (30th) day of each month thereafter, Concessionaire shall produce a revenue report and tender payment to City for the preceding month according to the following schedule:
 - 1) Payments shall be made to the office of the City Finance Director, City Hall, 211 Hillcrest Avenue, Marina, California 93933.
 - 2) Base Payments

Payments to City by Concessionaire shall be per the following schedule.

- 4) Additional payments to City by Concessionaire: In any month beginning month 24 through the end of this Agreement, Concessionaire shall pay City an additional One and one-half percent (1.5%) of revenue earned in performance of this Agreement as a performance fee, during any month in which revenue from the operation of the Concession exceeds Fifty-Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) per month.
- c. Late Payments. Should any payments due under this Agreement remain unpaid ten (10) days after the due date of such payment a penalty of 10% shall be added to any payments past due.

7. Concessionaire's Records and Documents:

- a. With respect to all matters covered by performance of this Agreement, Concessionaire's records and documents shall be subject at all times to inspection, review, or audit by the City. Concessionaire shall supply the City any documentation that may be needed by the City to prepare required compliance reports to the Secretary of the Interior or their delegated representative, NPS.
- a. <u>Reporting:</u> Concessionaire shall maintain books and records that shall reflect expenses and revenues for the operation of the Concessionaire Uses and Programs. Concessionaire shall prepare a monthly summary report for transmission to City showing applicable expenses and revenue from the performance of this Agreement. This report shall form the basis for payments by Concessionaire to the City.

8. Operations

- a. Hours of operation for the Concession Location are subject to approval by the City. MEC Park shall remain open and available for public use in accord with the requirements of the Municipal Code, as may be amended.
- b. The Operations Plan for the Concession Location is set forth in <u>Schedule G</u>, attached hereto.
- 9. <u>Maintenance and Repair</u> The maintenance and repair obligations of the Parties are set forth in <u>Exhibit H</u> attached hereto.
 - Concessionaire shall, at its sole cost and expense, maintain the Concession Location in good condition and perform such repairs that become necessary from time to time during the term of this Agreement and any renewals thereof.
- 10. <u>Licenses and Permits</u>: Concessionaire shall obtain all necessary licenses and permits to operate the Concession Location before operation may begin. All licenses and permits are subject to the City's Code Enforcement for safety, health, and fire inspections.
- 11. Operating Expenses and Utilities:

- a. Concessionaire shall pay all expenses related to performance of this Agreement and operation of the Concession Location, including but not limited to water service, telephone service, data connectivity services, electricity service, trash and waste collection and sewer services on the Concession Location as designated in **Exhibit H**.
- b. City shall be responsible for necessary upgrades to the power and utility systems necessary for safe, secure and code compliant operation of the Concession Location.
- c. Provision of Utilities. During the term of this Agreement, Concessionaire shall have the right to connect the Concession Location and all improvements thereon and facilities appurtenant thereto to the existing utilities serving the Concession Location at its sole cost and expense. The City shall make available to Concessionaire maps in its possession showing the location of sewer, water, electrical, gas and telephone lines located on or near the Concession Location. Concessionaire shall be responsible for arranging and paying for all utilities required for the Concession Location. The City will use its best efforts to continue all utility services as they presently exist, but it cannot and does not guarantee there will be no interruptions of service. Concessionaire hereby waives any rights or claims it may have which result from temporary interruptions of service. To the extent it has knowledge, the City will provide notice of any work scheduled that may interrupt the utility service to the Concession Location. If City is unable to provide access to utility service facilities due to the imposition of any limit on consumption or on the construction of additional utility facilities, or the allocation or curtailment of utility facilities or service by law or regulation, it shall have no obligation hereunder.
- d. The City shall provide repairs and upgrades to infrastructure designated in **Exhibit H** in a timely manner within available funding available to the City. 'After the repairs and upgrades, Concessionaire, at its own costs, shall be responsible for maintenance of the infrastructure as designated in **Exhibit H**.
- e. City agrees to be fully responsible for all required asbestos, lead paint, and hazardous material removal and remediation at MEC Park.
- f. Concessionaire shall notify the City of any health, safety, and code deficiencies related to the Concession Location infrastructure and buildings in a prompt manner. City is responsible for correcting existing deficiencies.
- g. City agrees to provide signage required by the Municipal Code and shall maintain all Parking Areas in a safe and compliant manner.
- 12. <u>Non-discrimination</u>: The City and Concessionaire agree to comply with all Federal laws relating to non-discrimination in connection with any use, operation, program, or activity on or related to MEC Park, including but not limited to:
 - a. All requirements imposed by or pursuant to the non-discrimination regulations of the U.S. Department of the Interior (43 C.F.R. Part 17);

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- b. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d-1), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, or natural origin;
- c. The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 6101 et seq.), which prohibits discrimination of the basis of age;
- d. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S.C. § 794), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicap;
- e. The Architectural Barriers Act of 1968, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 4151), which requires local facilities located on the Property to be accessible to the physically handicapped; and
- f. The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. § 12181), which requires that no otherwise qualified handicapped individual shall, solely by reason of his or her handicap, be excluded from the participation in, be denied benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance.
- 13. <u>Historic Properties</u>: MEC Park is deemed to be a historic property as stated in Exhibit A, and City and Concessionaire will adequately ensure the preservation of the historic property per the covenants stated therein. Any proposed changes to a historic structure require consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) and will be in compliance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation and Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings.
- 14. Alterations and Improvements: Concessionaire shall not make alterations or improvements to the Concession Location without prior written consent of the City. Such written consent will not be unreasonably withheld or delayed. Any changes requiring a building permit will be subject to the approval of the City's Building Official. If structural changes are required, the City and Concessionaire will negotiate an amendment to this Agreement that establish the Party responsible for supervision, all necessary construction work, and all costs associated with providing the changes. All construction work must comply with the Historic Properties section of this Agreement.
- 15. Concessionaire acknowledges that MEC Park is subject to the possibility of reversion with improvements without compensation to the USA should there be a material breach of noncompliance by the City or Concessionaire for not adhering to covenants and agreements contained within **Exhibit A**.
- 16. <u>Inspection of Concession Areas</u>: Concessionaire shall allow the City, or its designee and/or the Secretary of the Interior's designated representative, NPS, at <u>any</u> and <u>all</u> reasonable times, with or without notice, to inspect the Concession Location operated under this Agreement.
- 17. <u>Indemnity</u>: Concessionaire and the City agree that the City, its officers, employees and agents should, to the extent permitted by law, be fully protected for any loss, injury, damage, claim, lawsuits, expense, attorney's fees, litigation costs, defense costs, court costs or any other cost arising out of or in any way related to the matters set forth below.

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To the fullest extent permitted by law, Concessionaire hereby expressly agrees to indemnify, save, and hold harmless, and defend the City, its officers, employees, and agents against any and all against all fines, claims, damages, losses, liabilities, actions, judgements, costs, and expenses, including liability for injuries to any person or persons or damage to property, arising at any time during and/or arising out of, or from, or in any way connected or attributable actually, allegedly or impliedly, in whole or in part, with (a) the intentional act of Concessionaire or Concessionaire's employees, agents, contractors, subcontractors or invitees, (b) any breach or default in performance of any obligation to be performed by Concessionaire under this Agreement, or (c) Concessionaire's use, occupancy and operation of the Concession Location.

Without affecting the rights of the City under any provision of the Agreement, Concessionaire shall not be required to indemnify, hold harmless or defend the City as set forth above to the extent liability is attributable to the sole or gross negligence or willful misconduct of the City, its officers, employees or agents, provided such is determined by agreement between the Parties or the findings of a court of competent jurisdiction. This exception will apply only in instances where the City is shown to have been solely or grossly negligent or to have engaged in willful misconduct and not in instances where Concessionaire is solely or partially at fault, or in instances where City's fault accounts for only a percentage of the liability involved. In those instances, the obligation of Concessionaire will be for that portion of the liability not attributable to the City's gross negligence or willful misconduct.

Concessionaire agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical to those set forth here in this section, or other similar provisions as may be approved by the City in writing, from each and every contractor, subcontractor, or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Concessionaire in the performance of this Agreement and operation of the Concession Location. In the event Concessionaire fails to obtain such indemnity obligations from others as required here, Concessionaire agrees to be fully responsible according to the terms of this section.

The City shall provide Concessionaire with prompt notice of all claims subject to indemnification. Concessionaire has the right to defend each claim by all appropriate proceedings with independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City. The City may retain separate counsel to monitor or participate in, but not control, any defense or settlement. City must cooperate with Concessionaire and its counsel in defending against each claim. No claim may be settled without Concessionaire's consent, which shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

18. <u>Insurance</u>: Concessionaire shall, at its own expense, provide and maintain such insurance that will protect Concessionaire and the City from all claims for damages to property and persons in accord with <u>Exhibit I</u>, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein. <u>All policies</u>, endorsements, certificates, and/or binders shall be subject to approval by the City as to form and content. These requirements are subject to amendment or waiver only if so approved by the City in writing. A lapse in any required insurance coverage during this Agreement shall be a breach of this Agreement.

- 19. <u>Assignment</u>: Except as defined in <u>Exhibit D</u>, Concessionaire shall not assign this Agreement or any interest therein, nor let the Concession Location, or any part thereof, or any right privilege appurtenant thereto, nor permit the occupancy or use of any part thereof by any other person or entity. This language shall not be interpreted to prohibit Concessionaire from sponsoring and allowing ancillary activities and services onsite, including activities by third parties that produce revenue to Concessionaire. Said activities shall be subject to approval by the City and such revenue shall be accounted to City and shall be counted under payment formula to City. Any assignment or lease of the Concession Location shall be grounds for termination of Agreement by the City.
- 20. Amendment to Concession Agreement: This Agreement contains all the terms and conditions between the Parties, and no alteration, amendment, or addition shall be valid unless in writing and signed by both Parties.
- 21. Independent Contractor. This Agreement shall not constitute, and it is not intended to constitute, either party as an employer, employee, agent, partner or legal representative of the other party for any purpose, or give either party any right to supervise or direct the functions of the other party. Except as specifically provided herein, neither party shall have authority to act for or obligate the other party in any way or to extend any representation on behalf of the other party. Each party agrees to perform under this Agreement solely as an independent contractor and neither party shall have any right, power, or authority, nor shall they represent themselves as having any authority to assume, create, or incur any expense, liability or obligation, express or implied, on behalf of the other party for any purpose. Each party agrees not to permit its employees or agents to do anything that might be construed or interpreted as acts of the other party.
- 22. <u>Laws and Regulations</u>: Concessionaire is aware of and agrees that it shall use the Concession Location so as to conform with deeded environmental and usage controls and not violate any laws, regulations, and/or requirements of the USA and/or State of California and/or any ordinance, rule, or regulation the City now or hereafter made, relating to the use of the Concession Location.
- 23. <u>Signage</u>: Concessionaire shall place no sign or advertisement upon any location of the Concession Location unless prior written approval has been granted by the City, and the City shall have the right, without first notifying Concessionaire, to remove at the expense of the Concessionaire, any sign or signs that are erected without prior approval.
- 24. <u>Surrender</u>; <u>Waste</u>: Concessionaire agrees that upon expiration of this Agreement or earlier termination thereof, it shall surrender the Concession Location to the City is as good or better condition as they were in at the time of execution of this Agreement, ordinary wear excepted.
 - Concessionaire further agrees that it shall permit no waste nor suffer the same to be committed, nor injure nor misuse the Concession Location.

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- 25. <u>Liens</u>: Concessionaire shall keep the Concession Location free from any and all liens arising out of any work performed, materials furnished, or obligations incurred by Concessionaire during the term of this Agreement or any extension or renewal thereof.
- 26. Waiver: Failure of either Party to complain of any act or omission on the part of the other Party, no matter how long the same may continue, shall not be deemed to be a waiver by said Party of any of said Party's rights hereunder. No waiver by either Party at any time, expressed or implied, of any breach of any provision of this Agreement shall be deemed a waiver of breach of any other provision of this Agreement or a consent to any subsequent breach of the same or any other provision. If any action by either Party shall require the consent and approval of the other Party, the other Party's consent to or approval of such action on any one occasion shall not be deemed to be a consent to or approval of such action on any subsequent occasion. Any and all rights and remedies which either Party may have under this Agreement, upon any breach, shall be distinct, separate, and cumulative and shall not be deemed inconsistent with each other; and no one of them, whether exercised by said Party or not, shall be deemed to be an exclusion of any other.
- 27. <u>Default/Material Breach</u>: Concessionaire shall be in default of its obligations under this Agreement if any of the following events occurs:
 - a. Concessionaire's failure to make payments when due or within ten (10) days after notification that such payment is past due;
 - b. Concessionaire's breach of any term, covenant or condition of this Agreement, except those requiring payment, and Concessionaire's failure to cure such breach within fourteen (14) days after written notice from City specifying the nature of such breach;
 - c. Concessionaire's breach of any of Concessionaire's duties and obligations under this Agreement, which breach can be cured, if such breach is not cured within forty-eight (48) hours after being provided written notice thereof by the City; or
 - d. Concessionaire's vacation or abandonment of the Property.

28. Termination:

- a. The City or Concessionaire may unilaterally terminate the Agreement upon 365 days written notice for any cause or no cause whatsoever and specifying the date of termination.
- b. This Agreement shall terminate automatically upon the occurrence of any of the following events:
 - 1) Concessionaire or City materially violates any provision of the Agreement; or.
 - 2) The expiration of the Term of this Agreement or any renewal thereof.

- 29. Dispute Resolution. If any dispute arises between the parties as to proper interpretation or application of this Agreement, the parties shall first meet and confer in a good faith attempt to resolve the matter between themselves. If the dispute is not resolved by meeting and conferring, the matter shall be submitted for formal mediation to a mediator selected mutually by the Parties. The expenses of such mediation shall be shared equally between the Parties. If the dispute is not or cannot be resolved by mediation, the parties may mutually agree (but only as to those issues of the matter not resolved by mediation) to submit their dispute to arbitration. Before commencement of the arbitration, the Parties may elect to have the arbitration proceed on an informal basis; however, if the Parties are unable so to agree, then the arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The decision of the arbitrator shall be binding, unless within thirty days after issuance of the arbitrator's written decision, any party files an action in court. Venue and jurisdiction for any such action between the parties shall lie in the Superior Court for the County of Monterey.
- 30. Attorney's Fees. In the event of any controversy, claim or dispute relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the losing party reasonable expenses, attorney's fees and costs.
- 31. <u>Severability</u>: Should any portion of this Agreement be determined to be void or unenforceable, such shall be severed from the whole and the Agreement will continue as modified.
- 32. <u>Counterparts</u>: This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original.
- 33. Acknowledgment: This Agreement and the obligations of the Parties hereto are subject to the terms and conditions set forth in the deed from the USA to the City, dated April 24, 1998, and recorded at Monterey County Registry of Deeds/Clerks Office at instrument number 9824966, Exhibit A, and the current Program of Utilization (Exhibit J) which governs the use of the assigned property. Violations of the said terms and conditions may be grounds for reversion to the USA, at its discretion and termination of this Agreement. Concessionaire owned personal and real property improvements associated with the Concession Location, may be subject to seizure, without compensation, by the USA.
- 34. <u>Notice</u>: Any notice by either Party to the other shall be in writing and shall be deemed to be given only if delivered personally or mailed by registered or certified mail as follow:

QUITCLAIM DEED

THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, acting by and through the Secretary of the Interior, acting by and through the Director, National Park Service, under and pursuant to the power and authority contained in the provisions of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 (63 Stat. 337), as amended, and particularly as amended by Public Law 485, 91st Congress, and regulations and orders promulgated thereunder (hereinafter designated "Grantor" or "Army" in specific situtations), for and in consideration of the perpetual use of the hereinafter described premises as and for public park and public recreation area purposes, by the City of Marina, California (hereinafter designated "Grantee"), does hereby release and quitclaim to Grantee, and to its successors and assigns, all Grantor's right, title and interest in and to property, including all buildings, improvements, and fixtures thereon, located in Monterey County, California, consisting of approximately 27.235 acres, and identified as Parcel A in Exhibit A, attached hereto;

The property is conveyed "As Is, Where Is" without any representation, warranty or guarantee, except as required pursuant to applicable law or otherwise stated herein, by the Grantor as to quantity, quality, title, character, condition, size, or kind, or that the same is in condition or fit to be used for the purpose for which it was intended, and no claim for allowance or deduction upon such ground will be considered. There is no objection on the part of the Grantor to make any alterations, repairs, or additions, and neither said Grantor or Army shall be liable for any latent or patent defects in the property.

The hereinbefore decribed property is granted by the Grantor to the Grantee subject to valid and existing easements for streets, utility systems, rights-of-way, railroads, pipelines, and/or covenants, restrictions, reservations, conditions, and agreements which now exist affecting the foregoing the described premises and further subject to the reservations, exceptions, restrictions, conditions and covenants herein expressed and set forth unto the Grantee, its successors and assigns, forever.

Pursuant to authority contained in the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990, as amended and the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended, and applicable rules, regulations, and orders promulgated thereunder, the Department of the Army determined the property to be surplus to the needs of the United States of America and assigned the property to the Department of the Interior for conveyance to the Grantee.

The Grantor expressly excepts and reserves all oil, gas, and mineral rights and deposits in said land to the Grantor or to such person(s) as may be authorized by the Grantor to prospect, mine, and remove such deposits from the hereinbefore described property under applicable laws.

And the Grantee by its acceptance of this deed does acknowledge its understanding of the agreement, and does covenant and agree for itself, and its successors and assigns, forever, as follows:

This property shall be used and maintained for the public purposes for which it was conveyed in perpetuity as
set forth in the program of utilization and plan contained in an application submitted by the Grantee on July
28, 1993, and amended by letter dated May 25, 1994, which program and plan may be amended from time to
time at the written request of either the Grantor or Grantee, with the written concurrence of the other party,
and such amendments will be added to and become a part of the original application.

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- 2. The Grantee shall, within 6 months of the date of the deed of conveyance, erect and maintain a permanent sign or marker near the point of principal access to the conveyed area indicating that the property is a park or recreation area and has been acquired from the Federal Government for use by the general public.
- 3. The property shall not be sold, leased, assigned or otherwise disposed of except to another eligible governmental agency without the prior approval of the Secretary of the Interior in writing. Any such disposition shall assure the continued use and maintenance of the property for public park or public recreational purposes subject to the same terms and conditions in the original instrument of conveyance. However, nothing in this provision shall preclude the Grantee from providing related recreational facilities and services compatible with the approved application, through concession agreements entered into with third parties, provided prior concurrence to such agreements is obtained in writing from the Secretary of the Interior.
- 4. From the date of this conveyance, the Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall submit biennial reports to the Secretary of the Interior, setting forth the use made of the property during the preceding two-year period, and other pertinent data establishing its continuous use for the purposes set forth above, for ten consecutive reports and as further determined by the Secretary of the Interior.
- 5. As part of the consideration for this Deed, the Grantee covenants and agrees for itself, its successors and assigns, that: (1) the program for or in connection with which this Deed is made will be conducted in compliance with, and the Grantee, its successors and assigns, will comply with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to the regulations of the Department of the Interior as in effect on the date of this Deed (43 C.F.R. Part 17) issued under the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; (2) this covenant shall be subject in all respects to the provisions of said regulations; (3) the Grantee, its successors and assigns, will promptly take and continue to take such action as may be necessary to effectuate this covenant; (4) the United States shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this covenant; (5) the Grantee, its successors and assigns, will (a) obtain from each other person (any legal entity) who, through contractual or other arrangements with the Grantee, its successors or assigns, is authorized to provide services or benefits under said program, a written agreement pursuant to which such other person shall, with respect to the services or benefits which he is authorized to provide, undertake for himself the same obligations as those imposed upon the Grantee, its successors and assigns, by this covenant, and (b) furnish a copy of such agreement to the Secretary of the Interior or his successor; (6) this covenant shall run with the land hereby conveyed, and shall in any event, without regard to technical classification or designation, legal or otherwise, be binding to the fullest extent permitted by law and equity for the benefit of, and in favor of the Grantor and enforceable by the Grantor against the Grantee, its successors and assigns; and (7) the Grantor expressly reserves a right of access to, and entrance upon, the above described property in order to determine compliance with the terms of this conveyance.
- 6. The Grantee further agrees to comply with the requirements of Public Law 90-480 (82 Stat. 718) the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 as amended by Public Law 91-205 of 1970 (84 Stat. 49) to assure that public facilities developed on this property are accessible to the physically handicapped; and, further assure in accordance with Public Law 93-112, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (87 Stat. 394) that no otherwise qualified handicapped individual shall solely by reasons of his handicap be excluded from the participation in, be denied benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity in effect on this property; and agrees to comply with the provisions of Title III of the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (Public Law 94-135; 45 C.F.R. Part 90) prohibiting discrimination on the basis of age in programs and activities conducted on this property.
- 7. The Grantee further agrees to comply, where applicable, with the provisions of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (87 Stat. 975) and the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 4102).

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- 8. The Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall hold harmless, defend and indemnify the United States, its employees, agents, and representatives from and against any suit, claim, demand or action, liability, judgement, cost or other fee arising out of any claim for personal injury or property damage (including death, illness, or loss of or damage to property or economic loss) that relates to the Grantee's failure to comply with the terms of this deed or from the use or occupancy of the property by the Grantee and/or the Grantee's successors and assigns, transferees, or agents, except as otherwise provided in this deed or law.
- 9. The conveyed property is subject to the condition and requirement that the Grantee shall convey to Monterey County an easement for a future light rail corridor. The area subject to this condition and requirement is described as a portion of Parcel A, labeled as the "approximate limits of future light rail corridor", an area containing approximately 4.117 acres, as depicted on a Record of Survey attached as Exhibit B. Said future conveyance shall be at no cost, except for direct and indirect expenses of such conveyance, and will be subject to prior approval and any condition deemed appropriate by the Grantor.
- 10. The conveyed property is subject to the following reservations;
 - 10.1. A reservation for use by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers of a 0.942 acre area for a period of ten years. The area subject to the reservation is described as a 0.942 acre parcel, a portion of Parcel A, as depicted on attached Exhibit C. Said reservation requires the Grantee to permit the use of said described property by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, subject to mutually agreeable terms and conditions contained within a reservation agreement.
 - 10.2. A reservation for all storm sewer and sanitary sewers collection lines located on the property, serving and collecting stormwater and wastewater from locations not on the property, subject to future assignment and transfer of said facilities.
 - 10.3. A reservation for water distribution lines located between the property boundary and water meter location. All telecommunications facilities located on the property are transferred to the Grantee without reservation.
 - 10.4. The Grantee shall not impair the reasonable maintenance, repair, or replacement of improvements described within this section, provided that proper consultation and coordination has occurred with the Grantee.
- 11. The Grantee acknowledges that it has received the technical environmental reports, described within this instrument, prepared by, or on behalf of the Army. The Grantee acknowledges that it has inspected and accepts the physical condition and current level of environmental hazards on the property and deems the property to be safe for the Grantee's intended use, human health, and the environment in general, except as otherwise noted herein. The Grantee's acknowledgement of the condition of the Property creates a rebuttable presumption that hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or petroleum products discovered on the property after the date of the transfer are related solely to the activity of, caused, deposited, or created by the Grantee, its agents, transferees, successors or assigns as consideration for the conveyance, agrees to release the Grantor and Army from any liability or responsibility for any claims or damages arising out of or in any way related to the release of any substances on the property occurring after the conveyance of the property to the Grantee. This paragraph shall not affect or limit liabilities of the Army under applicable law or its responsibilities to conduct response actions or corrective actions that are required by law.
- 12. By accepting this deed, the Grantee, acknowledges that the Army has provided the Grantee with a copy of the *Federal Facilities Agreement* (FFA) dated July 23, 1990, between the Army and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The Army shall provide the Grantee with a copy of any future amendments to the FFA. In this regard, it is understood that:





- 12.1. In exercising the rights hereunder, the Army shall give the Grantee or its successor or assigns reasonable notice of action taken on the property under the FFA and shall, to the extent reasonable, consistent with the FFA endeavor to minimize the disruption to the operation and use of the subject property.
- 12.2. The Grantee agrees that notwithstanding any other provision of this deed, the United States assumes no liability to the Grantee, its successor or assigns, or any other person, should implementation of the FFA interfere with the use of the property. The Grantee and its successors and assigns shall have no claim on account of any such interference against the United States or any officer, agency, employee, or contractor thereof.
- 12.3. The Grantee covenants for itself, it successors and assigns to not interfere with any response action being undertaken on the subject property, or interrupt, relocate, or directly or indirectly interfere with any remediation system, now or in the future located, over, through, or across any portion of the property without the prior written consent of the Army and EPA.
- 12.4. Prior to the determination by the United States that all remedial action is complete under the Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA) of the Fort Ord National Priorities List (NPL) site, the Grantee, its successors and assigns shall; (a) not undertake activities on the property that would interfere with or impede the completion of the CERCLA clean-up at the Fort Ord NPL site, (b) give prior written notice to the Army, EPA, and DTSC of any construction, alterations, or similar work on the property which may interfere with or impede said clean-up, and (c) comply with any institutional controls put in place by the Grantor or required by the previously issued Record of Decision (ROD) or amendments thereto, issued pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) or the FFA, and (d) ensure that any permit or license for the use of property provides for legally binding compliance with terms herein.
- 12.5. All terms and conditions contained within this section shall bind and run with the land and are forever enforceable by the Army, EPA or DTSC. The Grantor reserves the right to rescind all or portions of this section, upon request of the Grantee, following the receipt of a determination by the United States that all remedial actions at the Fort Ord NPL site are complete.
- 12.6. Prior to the determination by the Army that all remedial action under CERCLA and the FFA are complete for the Fort Ord NPL site, the Grantee shall provide written notice by certified mail to the appropriate regional office of the EPA and the State of California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC), together with the required authorization of the Grantor as required by other terms and conditions of the deed, of any conveyance of interest in the subject property. Said notice shall be made within fourteen days of the date of transfer.
- 13. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(i) of CERCLA (42 U.S.C. 9620), the Grantor has been provided a copy and an opportunity to review the *Finding of Suitability to Transfer* (FOST), dated July 14, 1997 and the Letter of Assignment (LOA) dated September 5, 1997. The FOST and LOA contains, to the extent such information is available, a notice of the type and quantity of hazardous substances stored on the property for one year or more, a notice of the time at which such storage, release, or disposal took place, and a description of the remedial actions taken of the property.
- 14. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(ii)(I) and (B) of CERCLA, and pursuant to a finding by the EPA that the groundwater remedy for the property is operating properly and successfully, the Army has covenanted, by virtue of a 1997 Memorandum of Agreement (hereby incorporated and made a part of this agreement by reference) between the Grantor and the Department of Defense among others, that all remedial action necessary to protect human health and the environment with respect to any hazardous substances on the property has been taken prior to this conveyance.
- 15. The Grantee acknowledges the receipt of notice contained within the FOST and LOA regarding the contamination of groundwater located beneath the property with volatile organic chemicals. The Grantee

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covenants for itself, its successors and assigns that it shall not engage in or authorize the drilling water wells, use the groundwater, or access to the groundwater beneath the property. These restrictions bind and run with the land and are forever enforceable by the Grantor or the State of California.

- 16. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(ii)(II) of CERCLA, the Army has covenanted, by virtue of a 1997 Memorandum of Agreement (hereby incorporated and made a part of this conveyance) between the Grantor and the Department of Defense among others, that any additional remedial action found to be necessary after the date of this conveyance that resulted from the Army's use or occupancy of the property shall be conducted by the Army.
- 17. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(iii) of CERCLA, the Grantor reserves a right of access to the property on behalf of the Army, EPA, and DTSC in any case in which remedial action or correction action is found to be necessary, after the date of this conveyance. To the extent permitted by law, this reservation includes the right or access to and the use of available utilities at reasonable cost. The Army shall give the Grantee reasonable notice of action requiring access to the property and endeavor to minimize the disruption of the Grantee's use of the property.
- 18. The Grantee, its successors or assigns, acknowledges the provisions of the *Habitat Management Plan* (HMP), incorporated and made a part hereof, may apply to the subject property. The property is shown in the HMP as parcel L5.9.1 and is designated as a Development Area. The Grantee, its successors or assigns, is responsible for complying with the Endangered Species Act (16 U.S.C. 1531-1544), its regulations, the HMP, and the accompanying Biological Opinion by the U.S Fish and Wildlife Service, dated April 11, 1997, as may be applicable to the property conveyed by this deed.
- 19. The Grantee is hereby informed and does acknowledge nonfriable asbestos and asbestos containing materials have been found on the property [Asbestos Survey Report, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers-Fort Ord Installation, Fort Ord, California (April 1993)]. The Grantee covenants and agrees, on behalf of it, its successors and assigns, that in its use and occupancy of the property, it will comply with all Federal, State and local laws relating to asbestos; and that neither the Grantor or Army assumes liability for damages for personal injury, illness, disability or death, to the Grantee, its successors or assigns, or to any other person, including members of the general public, arising from or incident to the purchase, transportation, removal, handling, use, disposition, or other activity causing or leading to contact of any kind whatsoever with asbestos on the property, whether Grantee, its successors or assigns have properly warned or failed properly to warn the individual(s) injured. The Grantee further agrees to be responsible for any future remediation of asbestos found to be necessary on said property.
- 20. The Grantee is hereby informed and does acknowledge that all buildings on the property constructed prior to 1978 are presumed to contain lead based paints. The presence of lead based paints within these structures effects there possible use for residential purposes in compliance with 24 CFR Part 35, Subpart H. The Grantee acknowledges receipt of notice to this effect as contained in the FOST, LOA, Environmental Baseline Survey or the Community Environmental Response Facilitation Act (CERFA) Report, Fort Ord (April 8, 1994).
 - 20.1. The Grantee acknowledges that lead based paints present an exposure risk to young children and pregnant women, which could result in lead poisoning resulting in neurological damage. The Grantee covenants and agrees to provide notice of said risks to any successor or assign of any interest in said property pursuant to this deed.
 - 20.2. The Grantee covenants that it has received the opportunity to conduct a risk assessment or inspection for the presence of lead-base paints or lead based paint hazards prior to the execution of this conveyance. The Grantee further covenants that it will provide for an inspection, abatement, and/or elimination of any lead based paint hazard prior to the occupancy or use said portion of the property

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- containing a lead based paint hazard by successors or assigns as required by and in compliance with applicable federal and state law. The Grantee covenants and agrees to be responsible for any remediation of lead based paint or lead based paint hazards on the property found to be necessary after the date of conveyance.
- 20.3. The Grantee covenants and agrees, on behalf of it, its successors and assigns, to indemnify and hold harmless the Grantor and Army, its agents and employees against any health problems which may result from the existence of lead-based paint on the property or any claims by the parties in relation to thereto.
- 21. The Grantee acknowledges that said property is located on a former military installation with a historyof ordinance and explosive (OE) use. Although OE investigations indicate that OE is unlikely on the property, there is a potential for OE to be present. In the event that the Grantee, its successors or assigns, should discover or become aware of ordinance or explosives on the property, the Grantee agrees it shall not attempt to remove or destroy it but shall notify local law enforcement officials and the Directorate of Law Enforcement at the Presidio at Monterey for prompt disposal of such ordinance at no expense to the Grantee.
- 22. The Grantee, its successors and assigns, acknowledges that said property is located within the vicinity of general aviation airports, and covenants and agrees to obtain a determination of no hazard to air navigation issued by the Federal Aviation Administration, pursuant to 14 CFR 77, for any proposed structure which would exceeds an elevation of 330 feet mean sea level at its highest point.
- 23. An obligation by the Army to reimburse any money under this deed is subject the availability of appropriated funds, and nothing in this deed shall be interpreted to required obligations or payment by the United States in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.
- 24. The Grantee and its successors and assigns shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the United States, it's employees, agents, and representatives, from and against any suit, judgement, cost or other fee (including death, illness, or loss of or damage to property or economic loss) that results from, or is in any manner predicated upon, the release or threaten release of any hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant, or petroleum or petroleum derivative as a result of the activities of the Grantee or the Grantee's successors, assigns, transferees, and/or agents except where such suit, claim, demand or action, liability, judgement, cost or other fee is the result of negligence of willful misconduct by the Department of Defense or any of its employees, agents, or representatives.
- 25. Subject to the limitation and other requirements contained in Section 303 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1993 (P.L. 102-484), as amended (10 U.S.C. 2687), the Secretary of Defense shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the Grantee, it's successors and assigns, transferees, and/or agents from and against any suit, judgement, cost or other fee arising out of any claim for personal injury or property damage (including death, illness, or loss of or damage to property or economic loss) that results from, or is in any manner predicated upon, the release of any hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant, or petroleum or petroleum derivative as a result of Department of Defense activities at the Fort Ord NPL site.
- 26. In the event that there is a breach by the Grantee, its successors or assigns, of any of the conditions and covenants, whether caused by the legal or other inability of the Grantee, its successors or assigns, to perform said conditions and covenants, the Grantor will give written notice, with a reasonable time stated therein, that the Grantee shall eliminate, rectify, cure, or commence actions necessary to cure said breach. Upon failure to eliminate, rectify, cure, or commence actions necessary to cure said breach within the time set forth in the notice, all right, title, and interest in and to said premises shall, at the Grantor's option revert to and become the property of the Grantor. In addition to all other remedies for such breach, the Grantee, its successors and

assigns, at the Grantor's option, shall forfeit all right, title, and interest in any and all of the tenements, hereditaments, and appurtenances thereunto belonging. The failure of the grantor to require in any one of more instances complete performance of any of the conditions or covenants shall not be construed as a waiver or relinquishment or such future performance, but obligation of the Grantee, its successors and assigns, with respect to such future performance shall continue in full force and effect.

27. The Grantor, Army, and other federal agencies, have the right of access, upon reasonable notice, to inspect for compliance with the provisions herein, as well as applicable federal laws and regulations. The Grantor, to the extent it knows, will give the Grantee reasonable prior notice of the intention of Army or other federal agencies to enter. Such notice shall not apply when the entry is required for safety, environmental, operation, or security or law enforcement purposes.

During the above access situations, the United States, and its agencies will be liable to the extent allowed by the Federal Tort Claims Act for wrongful death, personal injuries, or property damage resulting from negligent or wrongful act or omission of any employee of the United States while acting within the scope of his employment, arising out of this conveyance. Further, said Grantor, or other federal agency employees will be covered by the Federal Employees Compensation Act, to the extent allowed by law, for injuries to said employees.

28. The Grantee, by its acceptance of this deed, covenants and agrees for itself, and its successors and assigns, that in the event the Grantor exercises its option to revert all right, title, and interest in the property to the Grantor, or the Grantee voluntarily returns title to the property in lieu of a reverter, then the Grantee shall provide protection to and maintenance of said property at all times until such time as the title is actually reverted or returned to and accepted by the Grantor, including the period of any notice of intent to revert. Such protection and maintenance shall, at a minimum, conform to the standards prescribed by the General Services Administration in its regulations FPMR 101-47.402 in effect as of the date of this deed.

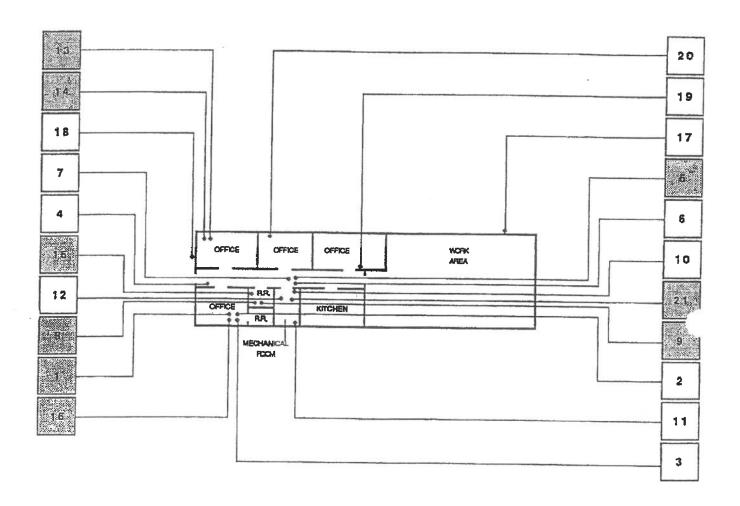

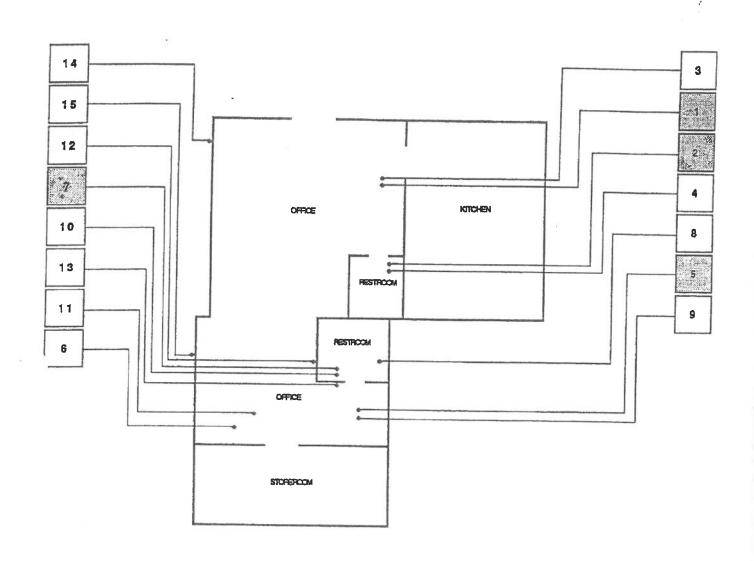


BUILDING T03141 ROOF PLAN NOT TO SCALE

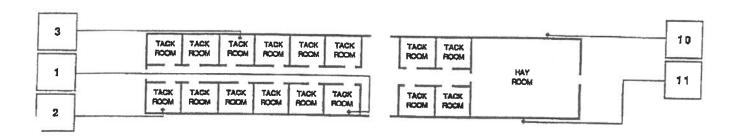

BUILDING T03142 FIRST FLOOR PLAN NOT TO SCALE

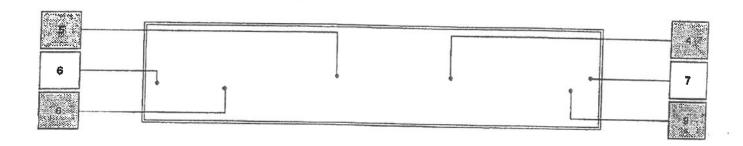

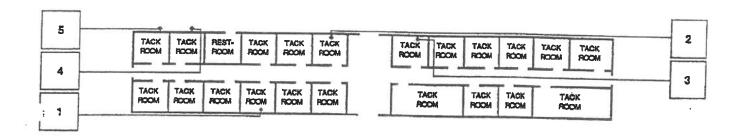

BUILDING T03143 FIRST FLOOR PLAN NOT TO SCALE

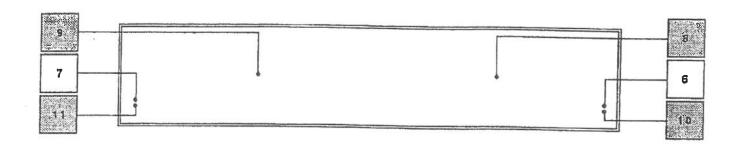

Concessionaire shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property that may arise from or in connection with Concessionaire's operation and use of the Property. The cost of such insurance shall be borne by the Concessionaire.

MINIMUM SCOPE AND LIMIT OF INSURANCE

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. Automotive Liability: ISO Form Number CA 00 01 covering any auto (Code 1), or if Contractor has no owned autos, hired, (Code 8) and non-owned autos (Code 9), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. Workers' Compensation: as required by State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. (This applies to Concessionaires with employees).
- 4. Property insurance against all risks of loss to any Concessionaire improvements or betterments, at full replacement cost with no coinsurance penalty provision.

If the Concessionaire maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the City requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or the higher limits maintained by the Concessionaire. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City.

Other Insurance Provisions

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

Additional Insured Status

The City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85

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or if not available, through the addition of both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 if a later edition is used).

Primary Coverage

For any claims related to this Agreement, Concessionaire's insurance coverage shall be primary and non-contributory and at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of Concessionaire's insurance and shall not contribute with it. This requirement shall also apply to any Excess or Umbrella liability policies

Umbrella or Excess Policy

Concessionaire may use Umbrella or Excess Policies to provide the liability limits as required in this Agreement. This form of insurance will be acceptable provided that all of the Primary and Umbrella or Excess Policies shall provide all of the insurance coverages herein required, including, but not limited to, primary and non-contributory, additional insured, Self-Insured Retentions (SIRs), indemnity, and defense requirements. The Umbrella or Excess policies shall be provided on a true "following form" or broader coverage basis, with coverage at least as broad as provided on the underlying Commercial General Liability insurance. No insurance policies maintained by the Additional Insureds, whether primary or excess, and which also apply to a loss covered hereunder, shall be called upon to contribute to a loss until the Contractor's primary and excess liability policies are exhausted.

Legal Liability Coverage:

The property insurance is to be endorsed to include Legal Liability Coverage (ISO Form CP 00 40 04 02 or equivalent) with a limit equal to the replacement cost of the leased property.

Notice of Cancellation

Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the City.

Waiver of Subrogation

Concessionaire hereby grants to City a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Concessionaire may acquire against the City by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Concessionaire agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

Self-Insured Retentions

Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. The City may require the Concessionaire to purchase coverage with a lower retention or provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or City. The CGL and any policies, including Excess liability policies, may not be subject to a self-insured retention (SIR) or deductible that exceeds \$25,000 unless approved in writing by City. Any and all deductibles and

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SIRs shall be the sole responsibility of Concessionaire who procured such insurance and shall not apply to the Indemnified Additional Insured Parties. City may deduct from any amounts otherwise due Concessionaire to fund the SIR/deductible. Policies shall NOT contain any self-insured retention (SIR) provision that limits the satisfaction of the SIR to the Named. The policy must also provide that Defense costs, including the Allocated Loss Adjustment Expenses, will satisfy the SIR or deductible. City reserves the right to obtain a copy of any policies and endorsements for verification.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the City.

Verification of Coverage

Concessionaire shall furnish the City with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsements Pages of the CGL and any Excess policies listing all policy endorsements. All certificates and endorsements and copies of the Declarations & Endorsements pages are to be received and approved by the City before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Concessionaire's obligation to provide them. The City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time. City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

Special Risks or Circumstances

The City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances

Proposed Program of Utilization

This is a Program of Utilization for property known as the "Marina Equestrian Center" (herein referred to as "MEC"), deeded from the US Government to the City of Marina on April 13, 1998 under the National Park Service's Federal Lands to Parks Program.

This program of utilization specifies the use of the property consistent with the Quitclaim Deed recorded in the County of Monterey on April 24, 1998; and specifies budget, time for completion and environmental impacts.

Physical Description

The MEC is an approximately 35-acre facility bound by Ninth Street on the south, California Avenue to the west, Imjin Parkway to the north and the former post stockade to the east. The site includes five of the six original buildings of the 1941 Fort Ord Station Veterinary Hospital, three arenas, one round pen, 73 horse stalls, and 33 horse turnouts. Unrelated existing structures on the site are a portable building formerly used by the Army Corps of Engineers, and a shortwave radio building with accompanying radio antennas. There is a cell tower on the site from which additional monthly income for park development is generated.

Purpose

Geographically, Marina is without dispute the northern gateway to the Monterey Peninsula, Fort Ord National Monument, and Fort Ord Dunes State Park. The MEC will be key in Marina's plans to market this identity, besides being a recreational draw in itself.

The MEC shall serve the residents of the City of Marina and tourists to the Monterey Peninsula as a multi-use recreational facility with a primary focus on outdoor recreation serving as a primary connection between the urban and natural resources of the City of Marina by capitalizing on its proximity and connections to the newly designated Fort Ord National Monument (Department of the Interior) and the Fort Ord Dunes State Park (California State Parks). It will serve as a spacious public park with natural landscapes, stables, horse and bicycle rentals; serve as a recreation hub for activities by individuals and groups; and be a venue for public events and celebrations for the city and region. Community access and programming will be developed for the radio and portable buildings in coordination with recreation and cultural programs provided by the City alone and in cooperation with regional park programming providers.

The park is half a mile from another Lands to Parks transfer, consisting of 12 acres at 8th Street and 2nd Avenue. With proper planning, the MEC will connect the two federally granted parks and provide much-coveted northern gateway to the Monterey Bay at Fort Ord Dunes State Park. The existing Monterey Bay Coastal Trail through the state park enables recreationers to travel 29 miles between Castroville to the north and Asilomar/Pacific Grove to the south. Trekkers will branch off the coastal trail into Marina and to the MEC for amenities, services, rental of horses and bikes, and greenway access to Fort Ord National Monument.

In addition to the connection between the urban and natural worlds the park will provide a connection between Fort Ord's past and present. Combining a location rich in recreational potential with structures whose history unites a number of compelling themes, the park will beckon locals and visitors to exploration and refreshment. With enhancement of naturalistic landscapes, the addition of scenic walking paths and facilities for picnics, horse/bicycle rentals, outdoor recreation, and public and private events, the MEC shall be the emblem of Marina excellence in recreation, as Golden Gate Park is for San Francisco.

In addition to creating new and needed recreational opportunities, the proposal further benefits the public by potentially anchoring a new community identity, creating jobs, and supporting the local economy. The City of Marina and its residents have identified these benefits as goals consistent with the community's vision (City of Marina, 2003).

Outdoor recreation is a \$46B annual industry in California. Marina's weather, location, and the resources given by the Army on the breakup of Fort Ord, including airport, beach, equestrian center, and trail system make it an ideal destination for outdoor recreation tourists.

Concept Plan

Outdoor recreation is prescribed by the Fort Ord Base Reuse Plan. The City of Marina is already an outdoor recreation venue on the Peninsula. The MEC is very well situated to provide both a destination venue and to fulfill the desired connection between the urban and natural resources of the City of Marina, and the City with the newly designated Fort Ord National Monument and the Fort Ord Dunes State Park.

The MEC will provide and manage significant new public outdoor recreation opportunities for all on the park site and the surrounding area. It will serve as both a venue and a recreation hub for residents and tourists to enjoy the horseback riding, off-road and on-road bicycling, and hiking. The equestrian facilities on the site will be available for public use, horse rentals, lessons, guided trail rides, both temporary and some private, long-term boarding, and multiple disciplines of equine therapy. All amenities will promote informal and structured cultural and recreational opportunities. All recreational opportunities will be available to the local and regional public, and insofar as possible be accessible for people with disabilities. Associated parking and other required support amenities will be included as part of the development of the site.

The MEC's second major connection is cultural. Thematically, the park will capitalize on the five Fort Ord Station Veterinary Hospital structures, which provide an excellent example of the mobilization-style construction now fast disappearing on Fort Ord. This medical facility is a significant landmark in the history of warfare, represented the final years of horse use by U.S. cavalry and field artillery. The continuity of use and unaltered appearance of the structures create an opportunity for living history. Historical continuity will also be an important aspect of MEC design and branding. The park will have a retro military theme for signage, accounterments, and amenities, to contribute to the singular identity of the venue and to avoid stylistic clashes when used for living history events. The buildings have been identified as the last existing World War II era veterinary hospital in the United States.

FUNCTIONS OF THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN CENTER

Public Park

The MEC will serve as a community park with picnic area, benches, landscaping, bike racks, and walking paths for visitors.

The area north of 9th Street, east of California Avenue and west of the large arena, south of the small arena will be closed to vehicular traffic. This southeast corner of the property, in and around the historical structures lining California Street (the C-5 Building and Colic Building and its surrounding area) will be most heavily used for general park purposes. The large open space between these buildings and the main arena will serve as picnic area, a place for public and private events. Addition of picnic facilities, barbecues, bench seating, and landscape will transform this area and provide an inviting place to meet, eat and mingle. The addition of a gazebo will provide a stage, enhancing both private and public events.

Hiking paths will be developed through the natural landscape of the northwestern portion of the property. A trail will traverse the northern perimeter of the property along Imjin Parkway to further the objective of creating connections for multiple disciplines of recreational users and commuters to the residential neighborhoods of Marina. Developing a run/walk path between the park and Peninsula Wellness Center to the west along Imjin Parkway will encourage development of a cooperative, outdoor fitness program for fitness center members and its patients.

Landscaping will pay homage to traditional military and national-park practices such as white-painted rocks demarking flowerbeds. Additional trees will be added to soften sea breezes and improve shade and aesthetics. Nature trails will draw visitors into the natural, coastal landscape. Interpretive signage will enhance the knowledge and enjoyment. Vista points will be accessed by trails and enhanced with installation of seating.

Trails and Recreation Hub

The City of Marina will capitalize on the open space corridor prescribed in Fort Ord Reuse Plan Map 3.6-1. The MEC will provide trailhead amenities as set forth in the land application submitted by the City of Marina to the National Park in a letter of May 25, 1994, citing "the need to keep the stables open at Fort Ord to provide public recreation and to take advantage of the extensive trail system currently available, particularly in the north-easterly region of the base." Connection with the trail system is an extremely valuable aspect of the MEC, both in economic and recreational terms. The MEC will provide bike racks, hitching posts, trailer parking, and water for man, horse, and dog, maps, restrooms, picnic tables, and other typical recreation hub amenities, including a snack shop. The City will also plan a route for the "Beach to National Monument" that connects with the MEC and the second Lands to Parks transfer at 8th Street and 2nd Avenue.

Cultural and Educational Center

Stabilization and revitalization of the veterinary hospital buildings will allow for interpretation of the buildings in their original use as well as stress the broader scope of military presence on the Monterey Peninsula; provide meeting and event space; provide a venue for historical displays

both from Fort Ord and other military periods of interest; and incorporate a Marina visitor center and reception area with brochures and maps. Installation of equipment to accommodate automated slide-talks and/or movie programming that tells the history of the Fort, Marina and the County through photos and films will be incorporated. The story of the soldier and the warhorse may be further illustrated with reenactments and demonstrations in the equestrian portion of the park.

The MEC will be integrated into Marina life as a destination for annual school trips and senior outings, rec department activities, and community events. Children's horse, art, and nature day-camps will be offered in the summer. Instruction will be provided by volunteer docents, groups, and businesses or city or school district staff. Space for these classes will be available in the C-5, Colic, C-6, and portable and radio buildings.

Focuses may include:

- o Fort Ord and Presidio of Monterey history
- o site history
- o equestrian topics
- o native plants
- o Native American history
- o leave-no-trace trail principles
- o bike-horse safety
- o art
- o shortwave radio and citizens' emergency response

Equestrian Center

Utilization of the property as an equestrian center was the guiding purpose of the land grant from the National Park Service through the Federal Lands to Parks program. In its application letter, dated May 25, 1994, the City of Marina cites a need to "operate the stables for community benefit and to make the stables available to military families, as well as the civilian community at large. Recently F.O.R.G. (the Fort Ord Reuse Group) amended the reuse plan to allow the use of a stable in the area it is currently located."

The equestrian functions of the property will continue. The City currently is engaged in preparation of a Request for Proposal for a concessionaire to restructure and manage equestrian uses of the park, with the specific direction to increase public uses and access. Guided trail rides, lessons, and equine activities are to be offered to the public.

The ability to rent horses for riding lessons and guided trail rides will be a significant feature of the park. The facility will also accommodate transient horse use by enabling tourists to board horses for a day or for the duration of a longer stay in our local hotels/motels and for equine events.

A portion of the existing stables will be available for self-care and full-care boarding. Fees for these services will be at market rate, although City of Marina residents may receive a resident discount. This is not to suggest fewer privately owned horses, but rather, better management of the space available to minimize the area dedicated to private use. Partial funding of the planned park improvements is dependent upon generation of revenues from horse boarding.

Qualified providers will offer a variety of horse-based therapeutic programs such as PATH, EAGALA, and Horses for Heroes.

Public-event Venue

Public events such as history days, Halloween, Veterans Day, and other holiday celebrations put on by City of Marina and partners, as well as lectures, and meetings will be accommodated in and around the buildings. The buildings will provide multiple private party and meeting venues. Uses are expected to include city-sponsored activities and events as well as use of the buildings and grounds for weddings, birthdays, and other private events. Possible addition of a gazebo may enhance these uses. Currently the C-5 building will accommodate approximately 75 seats for meetings and has a sink/prep/storage area with no oven. The Colic Building contains a kitchen with oven and small stage/meeting area. The portable building will also accommodate such use.

The outdoor arenas will be available for public rental.

Recreation Center

Bike rentals and bicycle tours to Fort Ord National Monument and Fort Ord Dunes State Park will be available. The venue will be marketed as bike friendly, with trailer parking, bike racks, and maps.

This currently under-utilized City land resource will addresses a newly identified, continually growing need in Marina and the region for easy access to trails and open space that offer significant distances and points of interest. The MEC will allow the development and ongoing operation of unique multi-use recreational facilities and opportunities otherwise unattainable by the City.

Site Improvements

The City anticipates working with a park planner to develop future improvements on the site. For example, the topography of the north easterly area of the property may be ideally suited for an amphitheater cut into the leeward side of the property. The natural bowl-like setting may lend itself to construction of a community amphitheater. This will provide a venue for live stage productions, movies, and other performances.

Bike rental and storage facilities will be developed. Hitching posts and watering troughs added. Additional bathrooms installed and food concession incorporated. Portions of the areas presently identified as turnouts will be transformed to complement the park uses.

Time for Completion

The City of Marina regards the fulfillment of this Program of Utilization as high priority.

Budget

The City of Marina will retain the oversight of the proposed park and facility; enlist a park

planner as needed; and direct the development through full implementation. An independent concessionaire will be sought for operation of the site consistent with the intended use and ongoing operating costs.

Environmental Impacts

The proposed utilization is consistent with prior public and equestrian use under army ownership, albeit with expansion of the number of users/visitors. While appropriate site specific environmental evaluation will occur during project planning, larger scale environmental evaluations conducted under the base re-use process did not identify any sensitive environmental resources on this site (Fort Ord Base Reuse Authority, 1997).

Guiding Documents

Current and future uses of the Project Site must be consistent with several planning documents including the National Park Service's Federal Lands to Parks Program, the California Outdoor Recreation Plan, the Fort Ord Reuse Plan, and the City of Marina Parks and Recreation Plan.

The National Park Service (NPS) requires land acquired through the Federal Land to Parks Program be used for "public park and recreational use in perpetuity." The land may be "developed for a single recreational activity, or multiple recreation activities, or be used to support an existing park or recreation area by providing parking or improved access. It may serve as a community center, a neighborhood park, a town square, or a regional or state park" (National Park Service, 2004). The proposed use for the Project Site is consistent with NPS goals as it develops a public park and recreational area serving several recreational purposes. The proposed services will attract individuals and groups throughout the community and beyond and will serve as a community center, a neighborhood park, a recreation hub, and a venue for public and private events.

The California Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP), as developed by the California State Parks' Planning Division, serves as the master plan for parks, outdoor recreation, and open space for all recreation providers. The CORP states that the goal of all park and recreation providers in California should be meeting the park and recreation needs of all current and future residents.

The Fort Ord Reuse Plan for the City of Marina further defines CORP's broader goals by setting the overall parameters for recreational uses in the former Fort Ord area within which this park is situated. In particular, Objective D for the City of Marina's Recreation Policies and Program is, "Establish a system of community and neighborhood parks which provide recreation opportunities reflective of local community standards" (Fort Ord Reuse Authority, 1997). Objective E reads, "Create opportunities for economic revitalization of the former Fort Ord through encouragement of commercial recreation opportunities in appropriate settings" (1997). Both of these objectives are accomplished in the proposed use.

The Fort Ord Reuse Plan also suggests the City "utilize the existing equestrian center site as a major community open space for the district to provide recreational amenities for the residents" (1997).

The following sub-policy statements in the Recreation and Open Space Element of the Fort Ord Reuse Plan further support the proposed use:

Recreation Policy D-1: The City of Marina shall designate and locate park facilities to adequately serve the current and projected population of Marina within the former Fort Ord for both active recreation as well as to provide for passive uses such as scenic vistas, fish and wildlife habitat, and nature study.

The proposed use for the MEC will provide facilities for active and passive recreation for the current population and accommodate the projected population for the City of Marina, including the expected increase in population related to planned housing developments in the surrounding area.

Recreation Policy D-2: The City of Marina shall develop active parkland within the former Fort Ord which reflects the adopted City of Marina standard of 5 acres of neighborhood/community parks per 1,000 population.

The proposed facility would provide significantly increased access to quality recreation opportunities for this population in a unique park.

Recreation Policy D-3: The City of Marina shall maximize use of existing former military recreation facilities as a catalyst for creation of quality parks and recreation opportunities.

The military used this site for equestrian recreation when Fort Ord was an army base. This proposal would improve currently under-utilized equestrian resources to allow increased public recreational opportunities for both the horse enthusiast and the passive observer. This plan will expand the use of the facilities and create an equestrian and outdoor recreation venue for the 3.3 million tourists annually to the Monterey Peninsula, in addition to its residents.

The California Outdoor Recreation Plan acknowledges one of the major advantages to participating in outdoor recreation and having a more active lifestyle is improved physical health. Safe and attractive facilities that promote physical activities are important to city residents and enhance Marina as an attractive place to live and work. The proposed use includes facilities that support opportunities to maximize the health benefits of active recreation.

The Marina Parks and Recreation Facilities Master Plan (MP&RFMP) mission states "The City of Marina is committed to establishing and maintaining facilities, parks and services that enhance the quality of life for all ages, cultural origins and abilities" (2005). The plan describes a "Community Park" as "a recreation area that provides recreational opportunities for several neighborhoods" and avoids "duplication of facilities already provided in neighborhood parks." The proposed use will serve people of all ages, cultural origins and abilities from neighborhoods throughout the region, and would be unique in size and scope in the City of Marina and the County of Monterey.

In addition, the following statements contained in the document further support the proposed use:

Goal 7: Promote regional and state park and recreational facilities that contribute Marina's evolving role as a visitor-serving/recreational-based destination on the Monterey Peninsula.

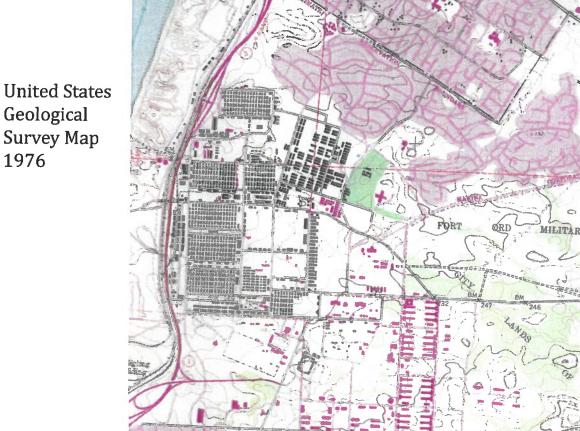
Objective 7-2: Explore the development of new regional-based recreational facilities.

Policy 7-3: Solicit proposals to develop new, regional based recreational facilities.

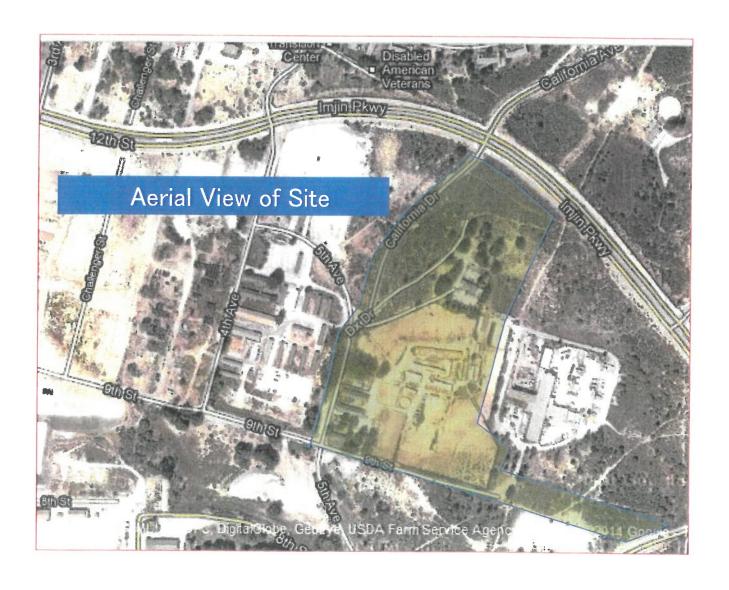
Summary

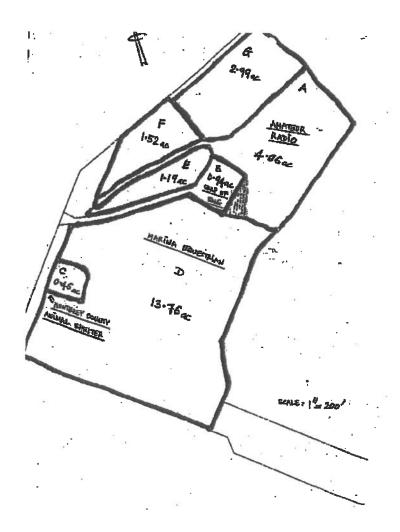
Geological Survey Map 1976

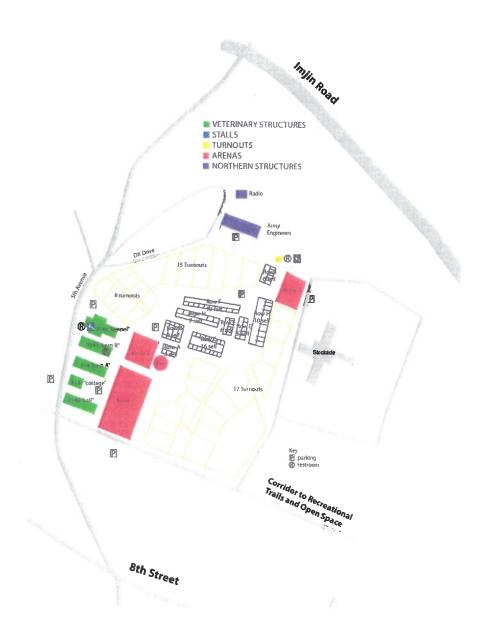




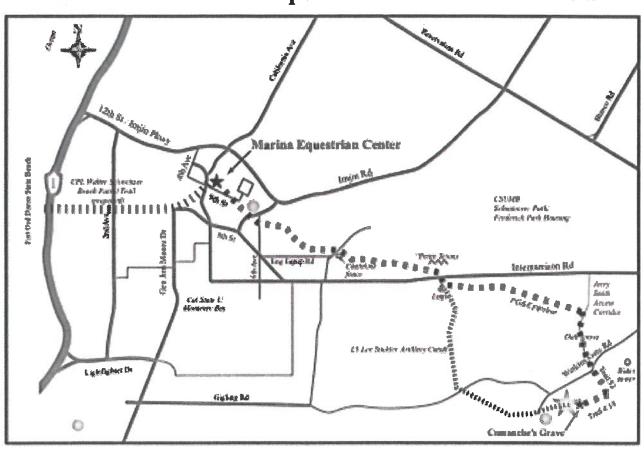

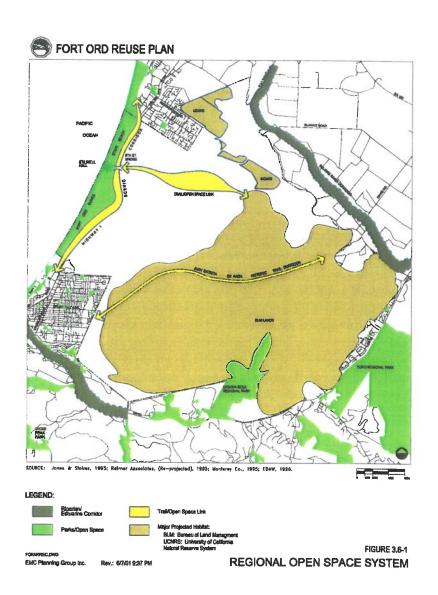

In September 2013 we received an updated draft Program of Utilization (POU) for the 27.24-acre Marina Equestrian Center ("MEC POU Approved by Council 7-16-2013"). Since that time we have had several conversations regarding implementation of a Program of Utilization at the site, and our reservations regarding approval of a POU that contained a statement that some areas would still be dedicated to private use. We also understood that there may be some local controversy regarding the highest and best public recreational use to which the property should be put that perhaps the City was still in the process of resolving. In general, however, we find that the proposed utilization plan represents an improved approach to opening the area to public recreational use and would meet NPS requirements for consistency with the terms of the property transfer, with one caveat.

The one area of major concern for us is the private boarding of horses. The first priority, as we understand your POU, would be for stabling horses needed for lessons and rentals, as well as some short-term boarding for visitors coming to the area to use the trails. Those very clearly serve the public park purpose.

Private long-term boarding of horses is not a public recreational use of the site. As we have stated in previous communications, boarding of horses is not precluded as a legitimate public recreational use of the park in certain circumstances. Those circumstances require that boarding of horses be structured such that it is a public use, not one that establishes a long-term right of exclusive occupancy. This requires a fair allocation system for boarding opportunities – such as waiting lists, rotations, and award of limited duration (even if longer than short-term) boarding contracts with no guarantee of renewal that allow broad public use. Boarding of horses for anything more than short-term periods, if allowed at all, should use a small percentage of the boarding space available. The presence of privately owned boarded horses may not impede the public access to and use of the park. Horses owned by a concessionaire that are used for public rental, trail rides, and riding instruction may reside at the stables while in such service. No portion of the park may be dedicated to private use.

The proposed POU remarks that park improvements depend upon income from horse boarding. As stated above and previously, the park is restricted to use only for park and public recreation area purposes. Therefore any activity conducted on the site must be for that purpose. Generation of revenues by a non-public-recreational use may not be justified on the basis of its eventual economic support of the park. Therefore, any boarding that occurs, must be carried out as a public use. Also, under the terms of the deed, any revenues generated on the parkland must be channeled back to park maintenance, operations, and improvements.

With the proviso that the City establishes a suitable plan to make boarding of horses an equitable public park use, we concur in the revised program of utilization presented in the referenced 2013 document.

We assume that any site plans that would alter the facilities or use of the area would be subject to compliance with state and local requirements regarding environmental and cultural resources.

As a reminder, the area must be permanently and clearly signed as land that was received from the federal government for use as a public park. Our current guidance is for the following language: "This park land was acquired through the FEDERAL LANDS TO PARKS PROGRAM of the United States Department of the Interior, National Park Service, for use by the general public".

As you know, any concession or license agreements must be reviewed by the National Park Service for consistency with the terms of the transfer. Leases and granting of easements or any property rights, are not allowed.

Biennial Reports are also required under the terms of the transfer, and should be submitted to NPS by the City of Marina, not by a licensee or concessionaire. They should include reports of park use and condition, revenues and expenditures, capital improvements, management issues, and a certification regarding non-discrimination and use of revenues. We have a standard form available for this purpose.

Please let me know if you have questions or concerns about any of this, and best wishes to you in the next phase of this project.

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INTRODUCTION

In accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations pertaining to the conveyance of surplus military real and personal property, the City of Marina is requesting a public conveyance of all land, land interests (i.e. leases, easements, licenses, permits, etc.) buildings, fixtures, appurtenances, personal property, and utilities and infrastructure improvements comprising Main Parade Field, Sports Arena, Stillwell Hall, Twelfth Street Tennis Courts, Second Avenue Tennis Courts, Abrams Park, and Passive Park/Future Sports Complex and their environs.

The City of Marina requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately 238 acres of the Fort Ord Military Reservation lying southerly of Reservation Road as depicted in the attached maps, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights.

The City of Marina requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastructure improvements located on or connecting with the sites, including natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, distribution and storage systems, sanitary sewers and wastewater processing facilities, storm drains and drainage system, and the military telephone system on the sites.

Main Parade Field is an 8 acre facility bound by Twelfth Street to the north and Third Avenue to the east. The Sports Arena is a 3 acre facility bound by Ninth Street to the north, Second Avenue to the east, and Eighth Street to the south. Stillwell Hall is a 77 acre facility bound by Beach Range Road to the southeast and the Pacific Ocean to the north and west. Twelfth Street Tennis Courts is a 2 acre facility bound by Twelfth Street to the south and Third Avenue to the west. Second Avenue Tennis Courts is a 1 acre facility bound by Second Avenue to the east, and Third Street to the south. Abrams Park is a 27 acre facility bound by Abrams Place to the north and Imjin Road to the south. Passive Park/Future Sports Complex is an 120 acre facility bound by Inter-Garrison Road and Schoonover Residential Development to the north, Abrams Drive to the northwest, Travel Camp to the east, and informal training grounds to the south and east.

The property is more fully described in Part B of this application, attached hereto and made a part thereof.

Enclosed herewith as <u>Part C</u> of the application is a resolution or certified statement showing the authority of the undersigned to execute this application and to do all other acts necessary to consummate the transaction.

The undersigned agrees that this application is made subject to the following terms and conditions:

- This application and its acceptance by the Department of the Interior shall constitute the entire agreement between the Applicant and the Department of the Interior, unless modified in writing signed by both parties.
- 2. The descriptions of the property set forth above are believed to be correct, but any error or omission shall not constitute ground or reason for non-performance of the agreement resulting from the acceptance of this application.
- 3. It is understood that the property is to be conveyed "as is" and "where is" without representation, warranty, or guaranty as to quantity, quality, character, condition, size, or kind, or that the same is in condition or fit to be used for the purpose intended and no claim for any adjustment upon such grounds will be considered after this application has been accepted.
- 4. The Applicant agrees to assume possession of the property within 15 days of any written request given by the Department of the Interior after the property has been assigned to the Department of the Interior by the General Services Administration. Should the Applicant fail to take actual possession within such period, it shall nonetheless be charged with constructive possession commencing at 12:01 A.M., local time, of the 16th day after such request by the Department of the Interior. The word "possession" shall mean either actual physical possession or constructive possession.
- 5. At the date of assumption of possession of the property, or the date of conveyance, whichever occurs first, the Applicant shall assume responsibility for any general and special real and personal property taxes, which may have been or may be assessed on the property, and to prorate sums paid, or due to be paid, by the Federal Government in lieu of taxes.
- 6. At the date of assumption of possession of the property, or the date of conveyance, whichever occurs first, the Applicant shall assume responsibility for care and handling and all risks of loss or damage to the property, and have all obligations and liabilities of ownership.
- 7. The Applicant shall on a mutually agreeable date not later than 30 days after the property has been assigned to the Department of the Interior, or such longer period as may be agreed upon in writing, tender to the Department of the Interior the purchase price, if a purchase price is due.

- 8. Conveyance of the property shall be accomplished by an instrument, or instruments, in form satisfactory to the Department of the Interior without warranty, express or implied, and shall contain reservations, restrictions, and conditions substantially as follows:
 - A. That the Grantee shall forever use the property in accordance with its application and the approved Program of Utilization included in <u>Part B</u> of this application.
 - B. That the Grantee shall, within six months of the date of the signing of the Deed of Conveyance, erect and maintain a sign or marker near the point or principal access to the conveyed area indicating that: the property is a park or recreation area; has been acquired from the Federal Government for such use; is or will be made available for use by the general public.
 - C. The property shall not be sold, leased, assigned, or otherwise disposed of except to another eligible governmental agency that the Secretary of the Interior agrees in writing can assure the continued use and maintenance of the property for public park or public recreational purposes subject to the same terms and conditions in the original instrument of conveyance. However, nothing in this provision shall preclude the Grantee from providing related recreational facilities and services compatible with the approved program mentioned under the above Item A through concession agreements entered into with third parties, provided the prior concurrence of the Secretary of the Interior is obtained in writing to such agreements.
 - D. The Grantee shall prepare biennial reports setting forth the use made of the property during the preceding two-year period and submit it to the appropriate Regional Office of the National Park Service (whose return address appears on the transmittal letter to you) for ten consecutive reports, and as further determined by the Secretary of the Interior.
 - E. If at any time the United States of America shall determine that the premises herein conveyed, or any part thereof, are needed for the national defense, all right, title, and interest in and to said premises, or part thereof determined to be necessary to such national defense, shall revert to and become the property of the United States of America.
 - F. The Federal Government shall have the right to reserve all oil, gas, and mineral rights.
 - G. Title to the property transferred shall revert to the United States at its option in the event of non-compliance with any of the terms and conditions of disposal.

- 9. The Program of Utilization included in <u>Part B</u> of the application may be amended at the request of either the Applicant or the Federal Government with the written concurrence of the other party. Such amendments will be added to and become a part of the original application and shall be consistent with purposes for which the property was transferred. The Applicant further agrees to furnish such data, maps, reports, and information as may be needed by the National Park Service.
- 10. Any title evidence which may be desired by the Applicant will be procured by the Applicant at its sole costs and expense. The Federal Government will, however, cooperate with the Applicant or its authorized agent in this connection and will permit examination and inspection of such deeds, abstracts, affidavits of title, judgements in condemnation proceedings, or other documents relating to the title of the premises and property involved as it may have available. It is understood that the Federal Government will not be obligated to pay for any expense incurred in connection with title matters or survey of the property.
- 11. The Applicant shall pay all taxes imposed on this transaction and shall obtain at its own expense and affix to all instruments of conveyance and security documents such revenue and documentary stamps as may be required by federal and local law. All instruments of conveyance and security documents shall be recorded within 30 days of their receipt in the manner prescribed by local recording statutes at the Applicant's expense.
- 12. "Assurance of Compliance with the Department of the Interior Regulations under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1 ..."

The following agreement is made by the Applicant in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining the transfer of any or all property covered by this application and the Applicant recognizes and agrees that any such transfer will be made by the United States in reliance on said agreement.

The Applicant agrees that (1) the program for or in connection with which any property covered by this application as transferred to the Applicant will be conducted in compliance with, and the Applicant will comply with and require any other person (any legal entity) who through contractual or other arrangements with the Applicant is authorized to provide services or benefits under said program to comply with, all requirements imposed by or pursuant to the regulations of the Department of the Interior (43 CFR Part 17) issued under the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; (2) this agreement shall be

subject in all respects to the provisions of said regulations; (3) the Applicant will promptly take and continue to take such action as may be necessary to effectuate this agreement; (4) the United States shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this agreement; and (5) this agreement shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of the Applicant.

13. "The applicant agrees to comply with the requirements of Public Law 90-480 (82 Stat. 718) the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 as amended by Public Law 91-205 of 1970 (84 Stat. 49) to assure that development of facilities on conveyed surplus properties for public park and recreation purposes are accessible to the physically handicapped; and, further assure in accordance with Public Law 93-112, The Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (87 Stat. 394) that no otherwise qualified handicapped individual shall solely by reasons of his handicap be excluded from the participation in, be denied benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

It is agreed that the instrument effecting the transfer to the Applicant of any property covered by this application will contain provisions satisfactory to the United States, incorporating the substance of the foregoing agreement such provisions to consist of (a) a condition, coupled with a right reserved to the United States to cause the property to revert to the United States in the event of any breach of such condition and (b) a covenant running with the land.

PART B.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

- A. A legal survey of the properties is unavailable at this time. The City of Marina intends to prepare a legal survey of the properties upon notification of approval of transfer of the title to the properties.
- B. The maps provided in Attachment A depicts the physical boundaries of each location and existing roads serving the facilities. The following information provides a written discussion of the location of each of the facilities.

Main Parade Field: Bound by Twelfth Street to the north, Third Avenue to the east, a parking lot and baseball diamond to the south, and Martinez Hall to the west.

Sports Arena: Bound by Ninth Street to the north, Second Avenue to the east, Eighth Street to the south, and an indoor swimming pool to the west.

Stillwell Hall: Bound by Beach Range Road to the southeast, and the Pacific Ocean to the north and west. This facility is located west of Highway 1 at the intersection of Eighth Street and Quartermaster Avenue.

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: Bound by a Patton Park residential neighborhood and play area to the north, a child development center and undeveloped land to the east, Twelfth Street to the south, and Third Avenue to the west.

Second Avenue Tennis Courts: Bound by service buildings to the north, Second Avenue to the east, Third Street to the south, and residential units to the west.

Abrams Park: Bound by Abrams Drive to the north, Imjin Road to the south and Abrams Park Residential Development to the north, east and west.

<u>Passive Park/Future Sports Complex</u>: Bound by Inter-Garrison Road and Schoonover Residential Development to the north, Abrams Drive to the northwest, Travel Camp to the east, and informal training grounds to the south and east.

C. In accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations pertaining to the conveyance of surplus military property, the City of Marina is requesting a public conveyance of all land, land interests (i.e. leases, easements, licenses, permits, etc.) buildings, fixtures, appurtenances, personal property, and utilities and infrastructure improvements comprising the properties and its environs. The following is the physical description of each of the facilities:

Main Parade Field: This facility is the main parade ground at Fort Ord and is adjacent to Martinez Hall. The City requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately across as depicted in Attachment A, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights. The City requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastucture improvements located on or connecting with the site, including natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, storm drains and drainage system. There are 8 paradle bleachers that can accommodate up to 300 conte a flag poll, and several large pine and sycamore trees surrounding the field. A parking lot accommodating approximately 150 vehicles is located adjacent to the site and is included in this conveyance request. (See Attachment B)

Sports Atoma: This arena consists of a 31,000 square foot wooden structure, The City requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately 3 acres as depicted in Attachment A, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights. The City requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastucture improvements located on or connecting with the site, includding natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, storm drains and drainage system, and the military telephone system on the site. The building was constructed in 1946 and currently provides basketball, volleyball, weight training, handball and squash facilities for Fort Ord troops. The structure has 1 main pavilion area that includes 3 regulation side-by-side basketball courts (6 permanent hoops and 2 drop-down hoops). The basketball courts can also be used as volleyball courts. A weight training area is located west of the courts. The arena also contains permanent pull-down bleachers and a few aluminum portable bleachers. Flanking the main pavilion area are men's and women's locker rooms, restrooms with saunas, storage rooms, and offices. The women's restroom contains a private weight training facility. The facility also contains a box office. Parking is available on both sides of the building for approximately 60 vehicles and is included in this conveyance request. (See Attachment B)

Stillwell Hall: This facility was constructed in 1944. The City requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately 77 acres as depicted in Attachment A, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights. The City requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastucture improvements located on or connecting with the site, including natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, storm drains and drainage system, and the military telephone system on the site. The building embodies distinctive characteristics of both the Mission Revival and Spanish Hacienda Styles in American architecture. The historical significance of the building is discussed in Part B-1.E of this application. The building has a red tile roof, a covered

veranda, and adobe bricks covering portions of the exterior. The facility has expansive views across Monterey Bay. Stillwell Hall is presently used as a community center. The facility contains original murals located in the tap room and meeting rooms that were installed in the 1940's. The building has been poorly maintained in the past few years resulting in decaying mortar, brick and rusting reinforcement bar in the concrete. In 1984, the army built a concrete/rock retaining wall to delay the ongoing erosion of the sand dune the building was erected on. The retaining wall is currently in need of repair. Remodeling over the years has somewhat distorted the architectural context of the structure. A parking lot accommodating approximately 135 vehicles is located on the site and is included in this conveyance request. (See Attachment B)

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: The City requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately 2 acres as depicted in Attachment A, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights. The City requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastucture improvements located on or connecting with the site, including natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, storm drains and drainage system. This parcel has 4 tennis courts surrounded by a windbreak and a chainlink fence. The tennis courts are across the street from the Main Parade Field. The tennis courts are not lighted. One parking lot accommodating approximately 15 vehicles is located along Twelfth Street and another parking lot accommodating 150 vehicles is located on the corner of Twelfth Street and Third Avenue. Both are included in this conveyance request. (See Attachment B)

Second Avenue Tennis Courts: The City requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately 1 acre as depicted in Attachment A, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights. The City requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastucture improvements located on or connecting with the site, including natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, storm drains and drainage system. This parcel has 4 tennis courts surrounded by a windbreak and a chainlink fence. The tennis courts are lighted. Parking is available on the surrounding streets. (See Attachment B)

Abrams Park: The City requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately 27 acres as depicted in Attachment A, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights. The City requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastucture improvements located on or connecting with the site, including natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, storm drains and drainage system. This facility was constructed in 1982 as part of the Abrams Park housing development. There are 4 baseball fields, 1 football/soccer field, 1 kickball area, 1 handball court, 4 tennis courts, and 1 basketball court. (See Attachment B)

Passive Park/Future Sports Complex: The City requests full conveyance of all rights, title and in interest in approximately 120 acres as depicted in Attachment A, including easements for public utilities and roadways, leaseholds and mineral and water rights. The City requests full conveyance of all government owned utilities and infrastucture improvements located on or connecting with the site, including natural gas and electrical transmission lines and distribution systems, water wells, storm drains and drainage system. This facility is currently used for informal training exercises. The site currently has several hundred mature oak trees, dirt roads and utility lines throughout it. (See Attachment B)

- D. Photographs of the seven sites were taken on Monday, July 12, and Wednesday, July 21, 1993. Please refer to Attachment B for the photographs showing each site.
- E. All seven sites were evaluated to see if they were on, nominated to, or eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. Per discussions with the National Parks Service, the State Office of Historic Preservation, and the Fort Ord Department of Engineering and Housing, Stillwell Hall was found to be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under the following criteria: Stillwell Hall qualifies under Criteria A because of its association with the training and demobilization of troops who fought in both the Second World War and the Korean Conflict. Many soldiers had their first and last contact with the military at both Fort Ord and Stillwell Hall, and were influenced greatly by their experiences. Both of these conflicts have helped to shape our relationship with the Far East (Japan, China and Korea) and are important for our understanding of the present world political situation.

Stillwell Hall also qualifies under "Criteria B" because of its association with lives of persons significant in our past. General Joseph Stillwell (whom the building was named after) was an extremely important figure in the development of the United States' relationship with China. General Stillwell and General Frank Dorn led Chinese and American Forces in Burma fighting the Japanese in the Second World War. In addition, General Stillwell was the American military liaison with Generalissimo Shiang-Kai Shek's Government in China during the Second World War. This liaison helped to shape our relationship with Taiwan and the Republic of China up to the present.

Finally, Stillwell Hall qualifies under "Criteria C" as embodying the distinctive characteristics of the Mission Revival Style in American architecture. Stillwell Hall is an excellent example of the Mission Revival Style both on the interior and the exterior and is significant because of its scale and integrity. The building form is classic with a red tile roof, a covered veranda in front, and adobe bricks covering portions of the exterior. The interior is characterized by large open spaces (i.e. a large ballroom), a walk-in fireplace, and a large tap room. There are murals in the tap room and in the reading room. There are five fireplaces in the interior, one of which has plaster cast heads attached to the mantle.

None of the other sites are on, nominated to, or eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places.

2. NEED

In order to accommodate future population growth, the City is dedicated to providing recreation opportunities for its citizens. There is a current and future need for additional tennis courts, football/soccer fields, baseball fields, and indoor/outdoor basketball and volleyball courts and picnic areas which are currently available at the Fort Ord Main Parade Field, Sports Arena, Twelfth Street and Second Street Tennis Courts, Abrams Park, and Passive Park/Future Sports Complex. The City of Marina is additionally in need of a community center such as Stillwell Hall to hold classes, programs, dances, concerts, and meetings.

The City of Marina General Plan-Section 3.2 states the following recreation goals:

- Encourage passive recreation opportunities on the beach and sand dune areas;
- Encourage and support recreational and visitor oriented activities;
- Encourage the use of Marina State Beach to the extent possible so as not to degrade the quality of the dunes and shores;
- Provide at least five acres of recreation and park space per thousand population;
- Recreational open space should be within one-half mile of user population where possible; and
- Parks should be located so that the user population does not cross major arterials to enjoy their use.
- A. There are 5 existing City-owned park and recreation facilities in the City of Marina. The following is a description of the type, location and description of the existing City park and recreation facilities.

Marina City Park: Located at 3200 Del Monte Boulevard in the City of Marina. This facility is approximately 4.8 acres and contains a community building, picnic area, horse shoe pits, park benches, playground, restrooms, and a barbecue. The community building provides space for evening rentals and contract classes.

<u>Civic Center Park</u>: Located at 211 Hillcrest Avenue in the City of Marina. This facility is approximately .33 acres and has a 6000 square foot community center building, a playground, and restrooms. The Youth Center was built in 1982 on the east side of the community center building. This facility hosts the majority of the recreation classes and civic functions.

Glorya Jean Tate Park: Located on the corner of Abdy Way and Cordoza Road in the City of Marina. This facility is approximately 3.9 acres, 3.4 of which are lawn and scrub. This facility contains a soccer/football field, baseball field, community building, picnic area, playground, restrooms, open space, and lighted parking lot.

Locke-Paddon Park: Located on the corner of Reservation and Del Monte Boulevard in the City of Marina. This facility is approximately 17/4 acres and contains a picnic area, stone amphitheater which seats approximately 200 people, restrooms, open turf, pedestrian trails, and a wildlife preserve.

Los Arboles Sports Complex: Located at 327 Reindollar Avenue in the City of Marina. This facility is approximately 6 acres and contains the City's only outdoor lighted sports facility. The facility contains a lighted baseball field, batting cage, soccer field, snack bar, community building, restrooms, open turf, and four public tennis courts. The City's Parks & Recreation Department seasonally hosts a men's fastpitch leagues and tournaments, men's socko and coed slow pitch softball at this facility.

The City of Marma utilizes three school playgrounds (Vista, Olson, and Del Mar) for after school activities and the Los Arboles Middle School Gym for evening programs (adult basketball program, karate, and volleyball). Additionally, the City annually holds the following special events: Marina 5 Miler and Easter Egg Hunt, Children's Christmas Party, Bicycle Rodeo, Jr. Olympics, Pass, Punt and Kick Competition, Elks Lodge Hoops Shoot, Pepsi Hot -Shot and various youth basketball and football leagues.

The City of Marina Parks and Recreation Department offers the following classes or programs on a contract basis: Jazzercise, Senior Aerobics, Ballroom Dancing, Children's Day Care, Dance and Twirl, Ballet, Tennis, Martial Arts, Dog Training, Yoga, Weight Watchers and Square Dancing.

In addition to the City's facilities, the State of California owns and operates Marina State Beach which is located at the terminus of Reservation Road west of Highway 1. Marina State Beach contains approximately 165 acres of park and open space.

B. The City of Marina Department of Public Works has prepared the Park Facilities Plan (November, 1991) for expansion of the existing City's parks and recreation system. There are currently four projects being considered under the Park Facilities Plan, they include: expansion of Glorya Jean Tate Park, expansion of Los Arboles Sports Complex, construction of Monterey Bay Estates Park, and construction of Armstrong Ranch Park. The following is a detailed description of the planned park facilities.

Glorya Jean Tate Park: Expansion of this existing park facility is planned by for the construction of field lighting and a restroom/concession facility. The total project cost would be \$400,000. The project would be completely funded by the Park Facilities Improvement Fee.

Los Arboles Sports Complex: Plans to expand this existing park facility call for the construction of additional tennis courts and a parking lot. The total project cost (including a \$400,000.00 land acquisition fee) would be \$667,000.00. The project would be completely funded by the Park Facilities Improvement Fee.

Monterey Bay Estates Park: Plans for this new park facility include construction of tennis courts, a tot lot, restrooms, landscaping, a turf irrigation system, and parking. The total project cost would be \$665,000. The project would be completely funded by the Park Facilities Improvement Fee.

Armstrong Ranch: A new park facility is planned with construction of 13.5 acres of passive and active uses such as ball fields, lighting facilities, restrooms, tennis courts, tot lots, benches, tables, pathways, landscaping, and a turf and irrigation system. The total project cost would be \$4,064,000. The project would be completely funded by the Park Facilities Improvement Fee.

- C. The City of Marina is located in northern Monterey County on the Monterey Peninsula. The current population of the City of Marina is 26,300. (Source: California Department of Finance, May, 1992). This figure is expected to decline to 11,070 by the year 1995 due to the effects of the closure of Fort Ord. As the reuse of Fort Ord is developed, the City of Marina is expected to absorb a large proportion of the population due to its location and cost of housing. As a result, the population of the City of Marina is expected to increase to 28,700 by the year 2000, and 33,500 by the year 2015. (Source: Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments, March 13, 1992).
- D. City of Marina residents have participated in recreational opportunities offered by the City Recreation Department. The 1992 Recreation Department Attendance Report for parks and recreation facilities indicates that the attendance for 1992 was 73,346 participants. Ten to fifteen percent of the participants are from outside the Marina city limits (Monterey Peninsula and Salinas Valley). The following are annual attendance figures from 1985 to 1992.

E. The proposed properties provide excellent accessibility to the residents of the City of Marina and the surrounding communities (Monterey Peninsula and Salinas Valley). All of the seven facilities are within minutes of the City of Marina. All of the seven sites are accessible from Highway 1 and Twelfth Street.

The sites all combine excellent access with proximity to several population centers in Marina and the surrounding communities. The following is a listing of the accessibility of acquisition site to population centers in the City of Marina.

Main Parade Field: Located 1.5 miles from the City of Marina population center. The site is accessible from Highway 1, Twelfth Street and Third Avenue.

Sports Arena: Located 1.5 miles from the City of Marina population center. The site is accessible from Highway 1, Twelfth Street, Ninth Street, and Second Avenue.

Stillwell Hall: Located 2 miles from the City of Marina population center. The site is accessible from Highway 1 and Beach Range Road.

Twelfth Str... Tennis Courts: Located 1.5 miles from the City of Marina population center. The site is accessible from Highway 1, Twelfth Street, and Third Avenue.

Second Avenue Tennis Courts: Located 2 miles from the City of Marina population center. The site is accessible from Highway 1, Twelfth Street, Main Gate, and Second Avenue.

Abrams Park: Located 3 miles from the City of Marina population center. The site is accessible from Highway 1, Twelfth Street, Reservation Road, Imjin Road and Abrams Drive. Monterey-Salinas Transit currently runs a bus line along Abrams Drive.

<u>Passive Park</u>: Located 3 to 4 miles from the City of Marina population center. The site is accessible from Highway 1, Twelfth Street, Reservation Road, Imjin Road, and Inter-Garrison Road.

As indicated in Part B-2.C of this application, there will be an increasing need for additional recreational opportunities in the City of Marina to achieve the goal of the City's General Plan. As indicated in Part B-2.A of this application, the existing recreational opportunities in the City are limited and do not include weight training facilities, handball courts, and only 1 football/soccer field and 4 tennis courts. The City currently has several unmet needs for recreation facilities. The Park Facilities Plan (Part B-2.B of this application) will partially fulfill the current recreational needs

of the City. The additional current and future deficiencies in the City's park and recreational facilities would be ameliorated by obtaining the Fort Ord facilities.

The existing City parks and recreation facilities had 33,346 attendees in 1992. As the City of Marina grows, the need for additional parks and recreation facilities will increase.

Approximately forty percent of the anticipated growth will occur as infill of vacant or under utilized parcels within the developed portions of Marina. Sixty percent of the growth would result from residential development of the 249-acre portion of the Armstrong Ranch within City Limits. It is the City's policy for new residential developments which generate additional park and recreation needs to finance the cost of providing the necessary facilities to meet those needs. It is the City's objective to distribute the cost of the park facilities among the developing properties in an equitable manner. A Park Facilities Improvement Fee for new residential development is charged on the number of bedrooms per dwelling unit as follows:

The City requires the fee be paid prior to issuance of any building permit for new development within the City pursuant to Chapter 15.50 of the Marina Municipal Code.

The City of Marina welcomes the opportunity of adding park and recreation facilities to their community. The public conveyance request of 4 sets of tennis courts will fulfill the City's current and future need of tennis courts. The City currently has one set of tennis courts for a population of 26,000. The indoor Sports Arena will provide volleyball, basketball, weight training, handball and squash facilities. The City currently utilizes school playgrounds and gyms for these activities. The Main Parade Field will provide an additional soccer/football field for future recreational needs. The City currently has only 1 football/soccer field. Abrams Park and the Passive Park/Future Sports Complex will provide baseball, softball, basketball, football/soccer, kickball, and handball. The City has a current and future unmet need for these recreational facilities. Stillwell Hall would provide a much needed community center for recreational classes. The City currently provides several classes and is in current and future need of an additional community center.

G. The annual volume of anticipated public use and the design capacity for each facility is indicated below:

Main Parade Field: The capacity of Main Parade Field is dependent upon the type of use proposed. Sporting activities (football/soccer) on the field would accommodate up to 52 players, plus additional numbers of coaches and spectators. The portable aluminum bleachers can accommodate up to 300 people. Approximately 20,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

Sports Arena: The Sports Arena has three basketball/volleyball courts, a weight training area, handball and squash facilities (approximately 50 players). Additionally, the arena can accommodate up to 200 spectators. Approximately 35,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

<u>Stillwell Hall</u>: Stillwell Hall has 1 large ballroom and 4 meeting rooms. The entire facility can accommodate up to 2,000 people. The parking lot provides approximately 135 parking spaces. Approximately 35,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: This facility can accommodate up to 10 players at one time assuming doubles are played in each of the 4 courts. Approximately 5,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

Second Street Tennis Courts: This facility can accommodate up to 16 players at one time assuming doubles are played in each of the 4 courts. Approximately 5,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

Abrams Park: This park contains 4 baseball fields, 1 football/soccer field, 1 kickball area, 1 handball court, 4 tennis courts, and 1 basketball court. All of the recreational uses can accommodate up to approximately 200 players at one time (plus additional numbers of coaches and spectators). Approximately 25,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

Passive Park/Future Sports Complex: This facility is planned to be used as a passive park until the year 2003 (or longer). The park facilities will include hiking trails, picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches. The passive park will accommodate hundreds of people. Approximately 20,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

Between the years 2003 and 2025 the City plans to build a Sports Complex on this site. The Sports Complex will have 2 baseball fields, 1 soccer/football/track field, 1 basketball court, 1 volleyball court, 4 tennis courts, a concession stand, and restrooms. The park will also include hiking trails, picnic tables, barbecues and park benches. This facility will accommodate hundreds of people. Approximately 45,000 people per year are anticipated to use this facility.

3. SUITABILITY OF THE SITE FOR PROPOSED USE

The suitability of each of the sites for the proposed use are described below:

Main Parade Field: The field has adequate public access and is adjacent to a parking lot for approximately 150 vehicles. The site has approximately 8 acres of usable land for soccer/football fields. There are currently no constraints on this land use. The site is located within 1.5 miles from the existing City of Marina population center.

Sports Arena: The Sports Arena has adequate public access and provides a parking lot for up to 60 vehicles. The 31,000 square foot structure is suitable for the proposed sporting activities. There are currently no constraints on this land use. The site is located within 1.5 miles of the existing City of Marina population center. The proposed land use will remain the same as the existing land use.

Stillwell Hall: Stillwell Hall has adequate public access and provides a parking lot for up to 135 vehicles. The site has approximately 77 acres of usable land and a structure designed to accommodate up to 2,000 people. The proposed use of the site will not change as it will remain a community center. There are currently no constraints on this land use.

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: The tennis courts are in an easy public access location and provide a parking lot for up to 165 vehicles. The courts are located on two acres and can accommodate up to 16 tennis players. There are currently no constraints on this land use.

Second Street Tennis Courts: The tennis courts are in an easy public access location. The courts are located on approximately 1 acre and can accommodate up to 16 players. There are currently no constraints on this land use.

Abrams Park: The 27 acres of usable land has adequate public access. The facility is suitable for the various sporting activities. The park is located on a landfill and the ball fields have settled. The park is located within 3 miles of the City of Marina population center.

Passive Park/Future Sports Complex: The 120 acre site is suitable for a passive park and a future sports complex due to its size and proximity to the City of Marina, the Monterey Peninsula and Salinas Valley. The site is accessible from Reservation Road/Imjin Gate and Highway 1/Twelfth Street Gate.

A. The following provides the physical characteristics of the sites and their relation to development of the area:

Main Parade Field: This field is bound by Martinez Hall, a baseball field, a vacant lot and a parking lot. The proposed uses for the field will not conflict with surrounding land uses (baseball field, tennis courts, Martinez Hall). The site is located within the Marina city limits. Monterey Peninsula College has also requested conveyance of the Main Parade Field.

Sports Arena: This indoor sports arena is located adjacent to an indoor swimming pool to the west, barracks and parking lots to the north and south, and service facilities to the east. This indoor sports facility is compatible with surrounding uses and will not create any land use impacts. The site is located within the Marina city limits. There are no conflicts with other agencies with this conveyance request.

Stillwell Hall: This facility is located adjacent to the Pacific Ocean, a sewage treatment plant to the northeast, and vacant land to the south. This facility is located on sand dunes and the topography is generally flat. A retaining wall was built in 1984 because the underlying dunes were being undermined by the Pacific Ocean. The uses associated with a community center are compatible with surrounding open space and coastal land uses. The site is located within the Marina city limits. The California State Parks Department has additionally requested public conveyance of this property.

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: This facility is located on flat land surrounded by Patton Park residential units to the west, Main Parade Field to the south, a child development center to the east, and a play area to the north. The uses associated with tennis courts are compatible with the residential units, Main Parade Field, and the Child Development Center land uses. The site is located within the Marina city limits. There are no conflicts with other agencies with this conveyance request.

Second Avenue Tennis Courts: This facility is located on flat land which is surrounded by residential units and service buildings. The uses associated with tennis courts are compatible with the residential units and service buildings. The site is located within the Marina city limits. There are no conflicts with other agencies with this conveyance request.

Abrams Park: This facility is surrounded by open space (landfill) to the south and Abrams Park residential neighborhood to the north, east and west. The park was built on a landfill and has experienced fill settling resulting in uneven playfield surfaces and cracked and heaved court surfaces and walkways. The park is surrounded by dense pine trees and scrubs and is located on a knoll above Abrams Park residential units. The location of a sports field park adjacent to a landfill and residential units does not create land use conflicts. The site is located

within the Marina city limits. There are no conflicts with other agencies with this conveyance request.

Passive Park/Future Sports Complex: This facility is located on rolling hills which is surrounded by open space to the south and east and Schoonover Park Residential Development to the north. The Passive Park/Future Sports Complex will not create land use conflicts with surrounding uses due to its location which is adjacent to open space and residential units. Although the site is not located within the Marina city limits, a portion of the site is within the City's Sphere of Influence. There are no conflicts with other agencies with this conveyance request.

- B. No outstanding easements or encumbrances are known to exist on the seven sites. All of the properties are entirely within the boundaries of Fort Ord.
- C. The following is a list of physical improvements on each of the properties.

Main Parade Field: The property is currently landscaped with grass and large pine and sycamore trees. Water, sewer, power and telephone lines are adjacent to the site. the property contains 8 portable aluminum bleachers, a flag pole, portable bathrooms, and a paved parking lot.

Sports Arena: The building is surrounded by a landscaped grass and scrub area. The site contains a paved parking lot and sidewalks leading to the facility. The facility is 31,00 square feet and contains lights, wooden floor, weight equipment, boxing equipment, lockers, locks, nets, basketball backboards and hoop nets, bleachers, washers, dryers, towels, balls, chairs, desks, tables, telephones, and supporting equipment. All power, heat, light, water, fire alarm suppression system, telephone lines are also on the property.

Stillwell Hall: This 17,500 square foot building is located on 77 acres on a sand dune. The building contains furnishings, chairs, tables, lights, office equipment, telephones, desks, paintings, stage equipment, wooden bar, photographs, curtains, and a covered storage area. A retaining wall is located on the eastern portion of the building. A 135 vehicle paved parking lot and Beach Range Road are located east of the building. All power, heat, light, water, fire alarm suppression system, telephone lines are also on the property.

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: The property is paved for tennis courts with nets, locks, sidewalks and parking spaces. A windbreak and chainlink fence surround the tennis courts.

<u>Second Avenue Tennis Courts</u>: The property is paved for tennis courts with nets, locks, lights and sidewalks. A windbreak and chainlink fence surround the tennis courts. Power lines for lights are also provided.

Abrams Park: This property has football goal posts on a grass field, paved basketball courts with hoops, portable aluminum bleachers, backstop, playground equipment, fencing, nets, windbreaks, a paved parking lot, four baseball playing fields, dug outs, chainlink fencing and a smashball board. The property additionally has a water sprinkler system.

Passive Park/Future Sports Complex: This property currently has hundreds of mature oak trees, a major roadway in the northern portion of the site, power lines and dirt roads.

D. All seven of the facilities are currently accessed exclusively through the Fort Ord road system. Access to Fort Ord road system is currently through five active gates which restrict access to the Military Reservation. The existing road system is characterized as having insufficient capacity on several major roads and an overall street pattern that is too circuitous, leading to safety and congestion problems. All of the various alternatives for reuse of the post would require the construction of a new roadway system (Fort Ord EIS). Attachment C provides a vicinity map depicting the road systems servicing the subject properties.

State Route 1 is a 4 lane freeway which runs north-south through the Monterey Peninsula with freeway interchanges providing access to the Twelfth Street Gate, the Main Gate and Reservation Road. State Route 1 in the vicinity of Fort Ord generally operates at a Level of Service "C".

Public transportation is provided by Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST). MST currently has one bus line that runs along Abrams Drive.

- E. Stillwell Hall is the only facility out of the seven properties that contains an outstanding scenic and/or historic resource. Stillwell Hall was found to be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The historical significance of Stillwell Hall is discussed in Part B-1.E of this application. Stillwell Hall is located on a bluff overlooking the Pacific Ocean. The building has several rooms that have expansive views across Monterey Bay.
- F. Public access to Fort Ord is currently regulated through gated entrances. These entrances to Fort Ord provide access from north and south via Highway 1, and from west and east via Highway 218 and 68. All of the sites except for Abrams Park and the Passive Park/Future Sports Complex would use the Highway 1-Twelfth Street entrance to Fort Ord. Access to Abrams Park and the Passive Park/Future Sports

Complex sites is from the Imjin Gate entrance located off Reservation Road in Marina. The following is a listing of the streets adjacent to each of the properties:

Main Parade Field: Twelfth Street and Third Avenue.

Sports Arena: Ninth Street and Second Avenue.

Stillwell Hall: Beach Range Road, Eighth Street, and Fifth Street.

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: Twelfth Street and Third Avenue.

Second Avenue Tennis Courts: Third Street and Second Avenue.

Abrams Park: Imjin Road and Abrams Drive.

<u>Passive Park/Future Sports Complex</u>: Inter-Garrison Road, Imjin Road, Abrams Drive, and Schoonover Drive.

G. The City of Marina has determined that five of the seven properties are currently at their highest and best use. Each of the facilities (except the Main Parade Field and the Passive Park/Future Sports Complex), will remain in the originally planned recreational use. The City does not plan to alter any of the sites except where required by safety concerns. It is in the City of Marina's best interest to continue to use the facility for public recreational purposes. Stillwell Hall will continue to be used as a community center available for recreation classes, meetings, and conferences.

The Main Parade Field will be used as a soccer/football field. The City does not have a need to use this area for a parade field. The Passive Park/Future Sports Complex is currently used for informal training exercises. The City proposes to use this area for a passive park from the time of acquisition until the year 2003. Between the years 2003 and 2025, the City will develop 2 baseball fields, 1 football/soccer/track field, 1 basketball court, 1 volleyball court, 4 tennis courts, a concession stand, and restrooms. The park will also include hiking trails, picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches. The Passive Park/Future Sports Complex area has hundreds of mature oak trees throughout the site. The City has determined that this area is suitable for a passive park/future sports complex due to its location, size and tree cover.

4. CAPABILITY

A. The City of Marina presently has 1 full-time Recreation Department Director who coordinates city-wide recreational activities servicing three area playgrounds, a youth center, and a gymnasium. The Recreation Department Director is assisted by 1 full

time staff member and 8 part-time employees. A 7 member Parks and Recreation Commission meets once a month in the Council Chambers to review programs, park development and related matters and makes recommendations to the City Council for their consideration. The City of Marina has offered numerous classes, programs, and special events since 1984 and has had an average monthly attendance in excess of 6,000 participants.

B. The proposed source of funds to acquire, develop, operate, and maintain the Main Parade Field, the Sports Arena, the Twelfth Street and Second Street Tennis Courts, Abrams Park and the Passive Park/Future Sports Complex is the General Fund and the Park Facilities Improvement Fee. The proposed City of Marina 1993/1994 annual Interfund Transfers has designated a \$121,147 transfer from the General Fund to the Parks and Recreation Fund for this purpose.

Funds for Stillwell Hall will come from a variety of grant applications (to government agencies and historical groups), volunteer donations, and the General Fund.

- C. The City of Marina currently has 52 full-time employees. The Recreation Department has 1 full-time Director, 1 full-time employee, and 8 part-time employees. The 5 member Marina City Council meets twice a month at a regular meetings. The acquisition of the seven properties may require additional hours from the part-time employees. Additionally, a team of professional help and volunteers may need to be developed to help restore Stillwell Hall. The Recreation Department is able to operate and maintain all seven of the properties as required to serve the needs of the citizens of Marina.
- D. The proposed City of Marina 1993/1994 annual total budget is \$3,579,913. The proposed recreation budget is \$158,647. Parks and Recreation's proposed operations and maintenance budget is \$6,773 (The city can draw from the General Fund for Parks and Recreation operation and maintenance costs). Refer to Attachment E.
- E. Attachment D provides a organizational chart for administration of the Parks Department and its relationship to the City Government.

5. PROGRAM OF UTILIZATION

A. The City of Marina does not plan to construct any new facilities at the Main Parade Field, Sports Arena, Stillwell Hall, Twelfth Street and Second Avenue Tennis Courts, or Abrams Park. The City will use the 84 acre Passive Park/Future Sports Complex site as a passive park with hiking trails, approximately 100 picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches within the next 10 years. In the future the City plans to develop

the site into a Sports Complex with 2 baseball fields, 1 soccer/football/track field, 1 basketball court, 1 volleyball court, 4 tennis courts, a concession stand and restrooms. The park will continue to also have hiking trails, picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches. The City will attempt to upgrade existing facilities to City standards, if necessary. The City will properly maintain the facilities to the extent that all facilities will attract users and be maintained at a level that users will find pleasing, comfortable and safe. These facilities will be used for the their intended purposes.

B. The following provides the schedule of development/maintenance for each of the facilities.

Main Parade Field: This facility will not be altered by the City of Marina. It shall be maintained as is and be used for sports activities such as football and soccer. There is no revenue or a one time improvement cost associated with the Main Parade Field. The estimated cost for operations and maintenance would be approximately \$5000 per year.

Sports Arena: The Sports Arena's main hardwood floor will need to be resurfaced. The plumbing will need to be replaced and the leak in the roof repaired. The cost to fix the floor, plumbing and roof will be approximately \$25,000 to \$30,000. The City proposes performing these repairs within one year of acquisition. The estimated cost of operations and maintenance is approximately \$20,000 per year. The revenue for this facility is estimated to be approximately \$15,000 per year.

Stillwell Hall: This facility has a roof that leaks, extensive rust in the reinforcement bars embedded in the concrete walls, water damage to the floors, rotting window sills and window frames. The exterior adobe brick has eroded throughout the structure. The retaining wall on the western portion of the property will need to be reinforced. The original oil paintings in the various rooms are slightly damaged, except for the painting behind the bar which has been extensively damaged over the years by drilling holes to accommodate shelves. The cost to upgrade the facility has not been calculated at this time. The revenue for this facility is estimated to be approximately \$11,000 per year. The estimated cost for operations and maintenance is approximately \$39,000 per year. The time it would take to upgrade the facility is estimated to be 3 to 5 years.

Twelfth Street Tennis Courts: This facility is presently maintained at a high level allowing immediate use. Only normal court maintenance is required. The revenue for this facility is estimated to be approximately \$5,000 per year. There is no one time improvement cost associated with the Twelfth Street Tennis Courts. The estimated cost for operations and maintenance is approximately \$1,500 per year.

Second Avenue Tennis Courts: This facility is presently maintained at a high level allowing immediate use. Only normal court maintenance is required. There is no revenue or a one time improvement cost associated with the Second Avenue Tennis Courts. The estimated cost for operations and maintenance is approximately \$1,000 per year¹.

Abrams Park: This facility is poorly maintained. All of the playing fields are in poor condition due to its location on a landfill. The tennis courts do not have a net. The basketball courts do not have poles. The concrete paths leading to the residential units have heaved and settled. The cost to upgrade the facility is estimated to be approximately \$75,000. Only normal field maintenance is required. There is no revenue associated with Abrams Park. The estimated cost for operations and maintenance is approximately \$7,000 per year¹.

Passive Park/Future Sports Complex: The City plans to develop this area into a passive park within one year of acquisition. The park will include hiking trails, approximately 100 picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches. This area is presently undeveloped and contains hundreds of mature oak trees. The cost to implement the passive park facilities is approximately \$50,000. Only normal park maintenance is required. There is no revenue associated with the passive park. The estimated cost of operations and maintenance is approximately \$1,000 per year¹.

Between the years 2003 and 2025 the City plans to build a Sports Complex at this site. The Sports Complex will have 2 baseball fields, 1 soccer/football/track field, 1 basketball court, 1 volleyball court, 4 tennis courts, a concession stand and restrooms. The park will also have hiking trails, picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches. The estimated cost to implement the Sports Complex is approximately \$1,000,000. Only field maintenance is required. The revenue is anticipated to be approximately \$50,000 per year. The estimated cost of operations and maintenance is approximately \$20,000 per year.

C. Site Development Plan

Main Parade Field: The City proposes no development changes to the Main Parade Field. The field will be used for football and/or soccer.

Sports Arena: The Sports Arena will continue to be used for basketball/volleyball, weight training, handball, and squash. No development changes are proposed by the City of Marina. However, the City will provide immediate funding to refinish the floor, fix the plumbing and the leaks in the roof.

Stillwell Hall: The City proposes to use this facility for a community center. No development changes to the facility are proposed by the City. The City will ensure that the use of the building will protect the historical integrity of the property.

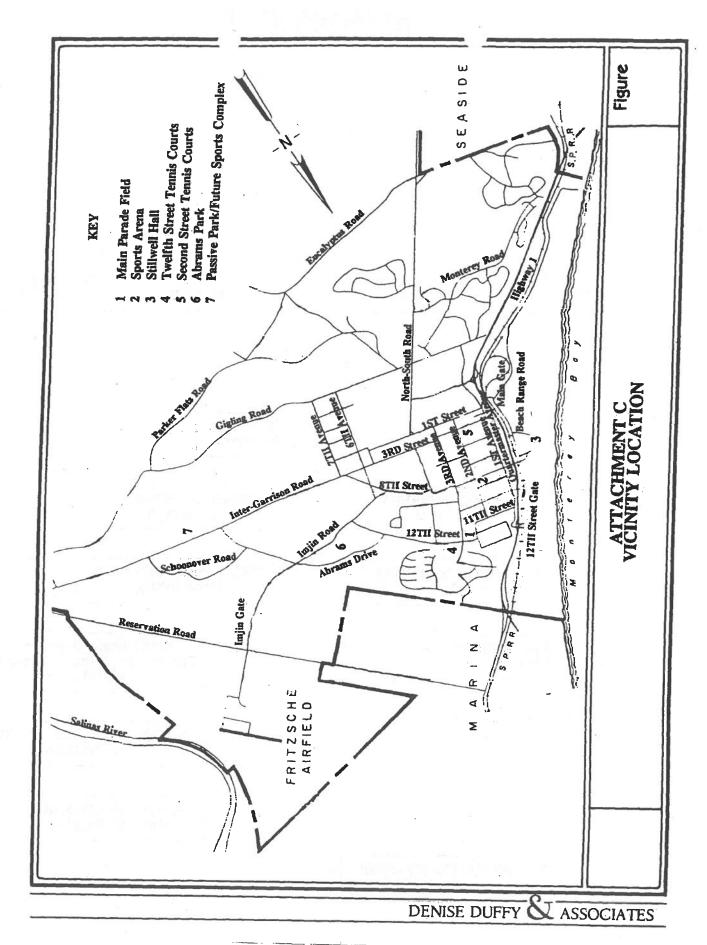

Second Avenue Tennis Courts: The City proposes no development changes to the tennis courts.

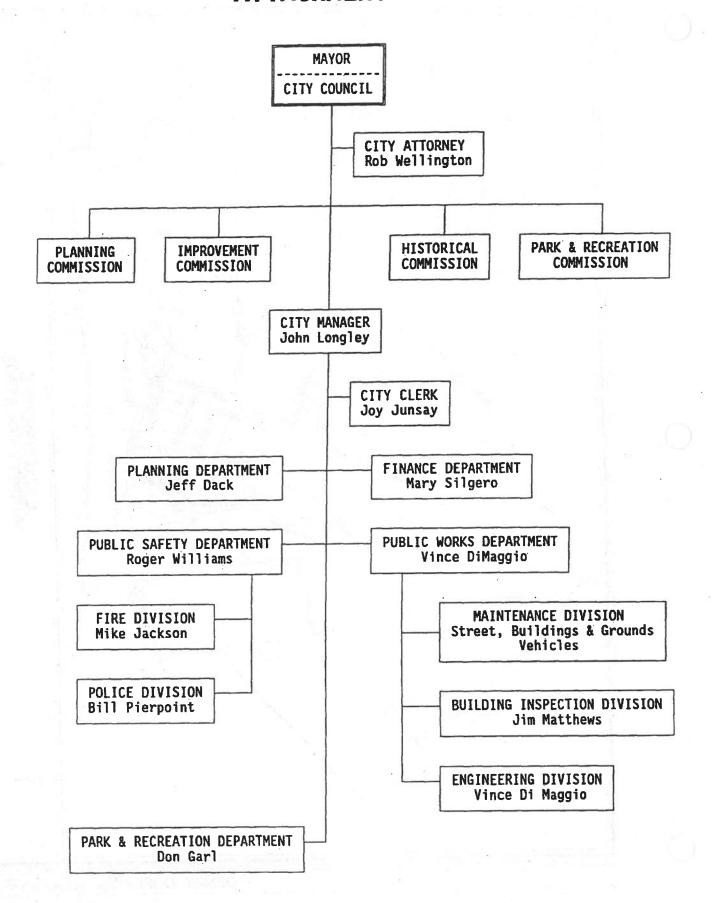
Abrams Park: The City proposes no development changes to the baseball fields, football/soccer field, kickball, handball, or basketball courts.

Passive Park/Future Sports Complex: The City proposes to use this site as a passive park within one year of acquisition. The park will include hiking trails, approximately 100 picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches. Between the years 2003 and 2025, the City plans to build a Sports Complex at this site. The Sports Complex will have 2 baseball fields, 1 soccer/football/track field, 1 basketball court, 1 volleyball court, 4 tennis courts, a concession stand and restrooms. The park will also have hiking trails, picnic tables, barbecues, and park benches. Refer to Attachment F for the Sport Complex Site Development Plan.

D. Six of the seven sites are neither on, nominated to, or eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. Through discussions with the National Park Service, the State Office of Historic Preservation, and the Fort Ord Department of Engineering and Housing, Stillwell Hall has been found to be eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. The City of Marina will use Stillwell Hall in a use compatible with the historic integrity of the property.

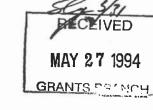

Per our recent discussions, I am writing to formally request an amendment to the Recreation Conveyance Application filed by the City of Marina to include the horse stables at Fort Ord. Recently, citizens of this community approached our City Council regarding the need to keep the stables open at Fort Ord to provide public recreation and to take advantage of the extensive trail system currently available, particularly in the north-easterly region of the base.

The stables facilitate 82 boarding stalls, several fenced corrals and several wooden structures for storage, tack rooms and office space. The entire stable area encompasses 34.7 acres. The City has been approached by the Marina Equestrian Association (a non-profit organization) regarding a need to operate the stables for community benefit and to make the stables available to military families, as well as the civilian community at large. Recently F.O.R.G. (the Fort Ord Reuse Group) amended the reuse plan to allow the use of a stable in the area it is currently located.

Please find enclosed a Resolution (No. 94-23) of the City Council of Marina authorizing public conveyance of the Fort Ord stables and a map denoting the location of the facility.

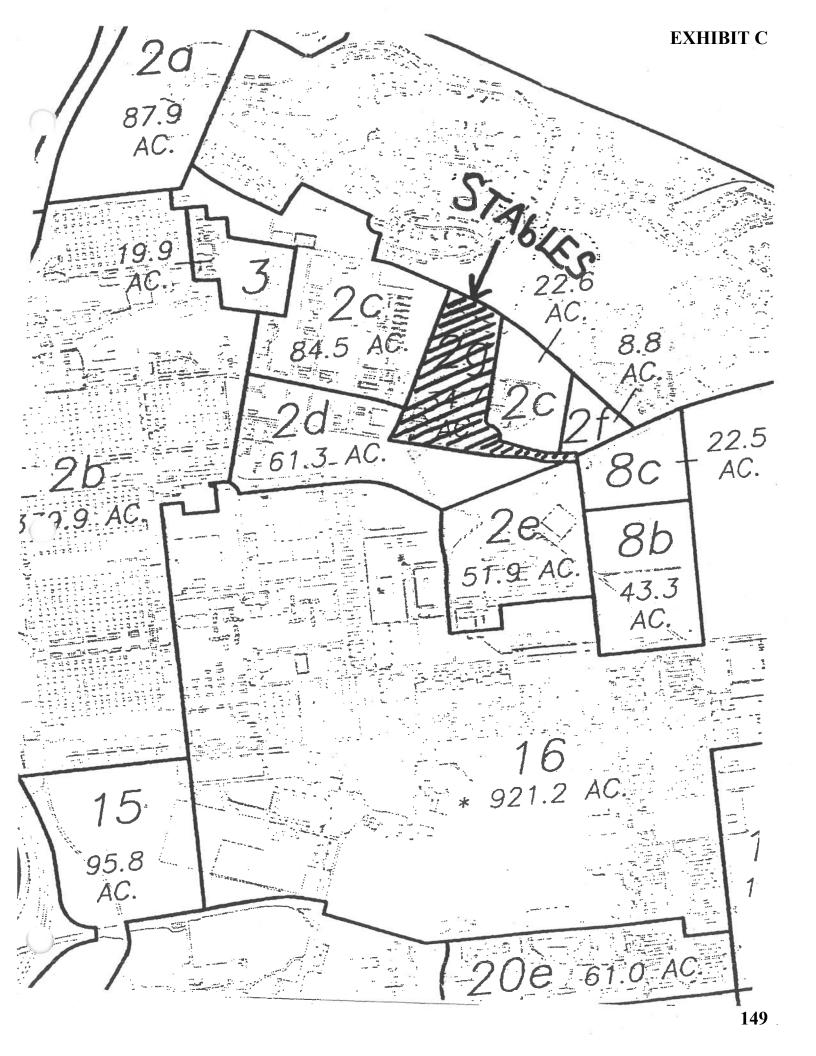


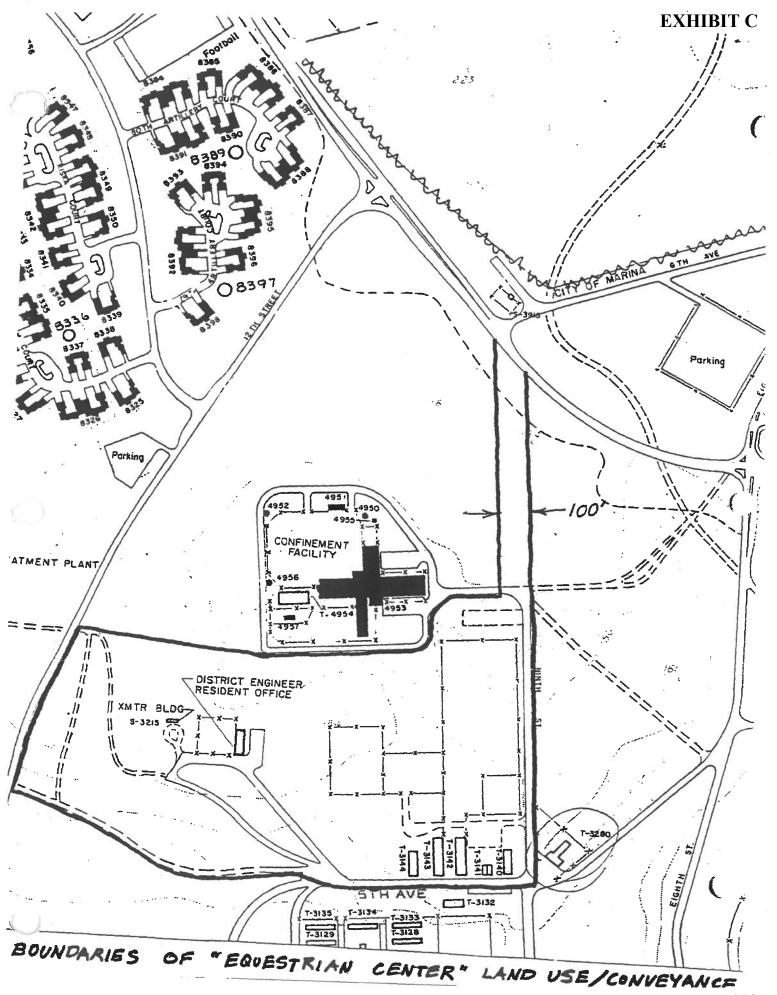

There is no objection on the part of the Grantor to make any alterations, repairs, or additions, and neither said Grantor or Army shall be liable for any latent or patent defects in the property.

The hereinbefore decribed property is granted by the Grantor to the Grantee subject to valid and existing easements for streets, utility systems, rights-of-way, railroads, pipelines, and/or covenants, restrictions, reservations, conditions, and agreements which now exist affecting the foregoing the described premises and further subject to the reservations, exceptions, restrictions, conditions and covenants herein expressed and set forth unto the Grantee, its successors and assigns, forever.

Pursuant to authority contained in the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990, as amended and the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended, and applicable rules, regulations, and orders promulgated thereunder, the Department of the Army determined the property to be surplus to the needs of the United States of America and assigned the property to the Department of the Interior for conveyance to the Grantee.

The Grantor expressly excepts and reserves all oil, gas, and mineral rights and deposits in said land to the Grantor or to such person(s) as may be authorized by the Grantor to prospect, mine, and remove such deposits from the hereinbefore described property under applicable laws.

And the Grantee by its acceptance of this deed does acknowledge its understanding of the agreement, and does covenant and agree for itself, and its successors and assigns, forever, as follows:

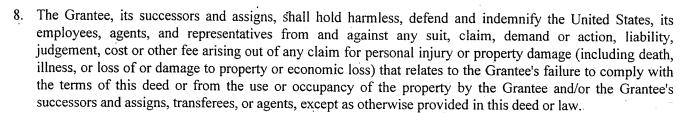
1. This property shall be used and maintained for the public purposes for which it was conveyed in perpetuity as set forth in the program of utilization and plan contained in an application submitted by the Grantee on July 28, 1993, and amended by letter dated May 25, 1994, which program and plan may be amended from time to time at the written request of either the Grantor or Grantee, with the written concurrence of the other party, and such amendments will be added to and become a part of the original application.





- 2. The Grantee shall, within 6 months of the date of the deed of conveyance, erect and maintain a permanent sign or marker near the point of principal access to the conveyed area indicating that the property is a park or recreation area and has been acquired from the Federal Government for use by the general public.
- 3. The property shall not be sold, leased, assigned or otherwise disposed of except to another eligible governmental agency without the prior approval of the Secretary of the Interior in writing. Any such disposition shall assure the continued use and maintenance of the property for public park or public recreational purposes subject to the same terms and conditions in the original instrument of conveyance. However, nothing in this provision shall preclude the Grantee from providing related recreational facilities and services compatible with the approved application, through concession agreements entered into with third parties, provided prior concurrence to such agreements is obtained in writing from the Secretary of the Interior.
- 4. From the date of this conveyance, the Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall submit biennial reports to the Secretary of the Interior, setting forth the use made of the property during the preceding two-year period, and other pertinent data establishing its continuous use for the purposes set forth above, for ten consecutive reports and as further determined by the Secretary of the Interior.
- 5. As part of the consideration for this Deed, the Grantee covenants and agrees for itself, its successors and assigns, that: (1) the program for or in connection with which this Deed is made will be conducted in compliance with, and the Grantee, its successors and assigns, will comply with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to the regulations of the Department of the Interior as in effect on the date of this Deed (43 C.F.R. Part 17) issued under the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; (2) this covenant shall be subject in all respects to the provisions of said regulations; (3) the Grantee, its successors and assigns, will promptly take and continue to take such action as may be necessary to effectuate this covenant; (4) the United States shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this covenant; (5) the Grantee, its successors and assigns, will (a) obtain from each other person (any legal entity) who, through contractual or other arrangements with the Grantee, its successors or assigns, is authorized to provide services or benefits under said program, a written agreement pursuant to which such other person shall, with respect to the services or benefits which he is authorized to provide, undertake for himself the same obligations as those imposed upon the Grantee, its successors and assigns, by this covenant, and (b) furnish a copy of such agreement to the Secretary of the Interior or his successor; (6) this covenant shall run with the land hereby conveyed, and shall in any event, without regard to technical classification or designation, legal or otherwise, be binding to the fullest extent permitted by law and equity for the benefit of, and in favor of the Grantor and enforceable by the Grantor against the Grantee, its successors and assigns; and (7) the Grantor expressly reserves a right of access to, and entrance upon, the above described property in order to determine compliance with the terms of this conveyance.
- 6. The Grantee further agrees to comply with the requirements of Public Law 90-480 (82 Stat. 718) the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 as amended by Public Law 91-205 of 1970 (84 Stat. 49) to assure that public facilities developed on this property are accessible to the physically handicapped; and, further assure in accordance with Public Law 93-112, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (87 Stat. 394) that no otherwise qualified handicapped individual shall solely by reasons of his handicap be excluded from the participation in, be denied benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity in effect on this property; and agrees to comply with the provisions of Title III of the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (Public Law 94-135; 45 C.F.R. Part 90) prohibiting discrimination on the basis of age in programs and activities conducted on this property.
- 7. The Grantee further agrees to comply, where applicable, with the provisions of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (87 Stat. 975) and the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 4102).



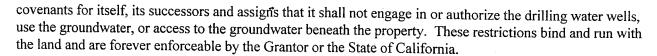


- 9. The conveyed property is subject to the condition and requirement that the Grantee shall convey to Monterey County an easement for a future light rail corridor. The area subject to this condition and requirement is described as a portion of Parcel A, labeled as the "approximate limits of future light rail corridor", an area containing approximately 4.117 acres, as depicted on a Record of Survey attached as Exhibit B. Said future conveyance shall be at no cost, except for direct and indirect expenses of such conveyance, and will be subject to prior approval and any condition deemed appropriate by the Grantor.
- 10. The conveyed property is subject to the following reservations;
 - 10.1. A reservation for use by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers of a 0.942 acre area for a period of ten years. The area subject to the reservation is described as a 0.942 acre parcel, a portion of Parcel A, as depicted on attached Exhibit C. Said reservation requires the Grantee to permit the use of said described property by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, subject to mutually agreeable terms and conditions contained within a reservation agreement.
 - 10.2. A reservation for all storm sewer and sanitary sewers collection lines located on the property, serving and collecting stormwater and wastewater from locations not on the property, subject to future assignment and transfer of said facilities.
 - 10.3. A reservation for water distribution lines located between the property boundary and water meter location. All telecommunications facilities located on the property are transferred to the Grantee without reservation.
 - 10.4. The Grantee shall not impair the reasonable maintenance, repair, or replacement of improvements described within this section, provided that proper consultation and coordination has occurred with the Grantee.
- 11. The Grantee acknowledges that it has received the technical environmental reports, described within this instrument, prepared by, or on behalf of the Army. The Grantee acknowledges that it has inspected and accepts the physical condition and current level of environmental hazards on the property and deems the property to be safe for the Grantee's intended use, human health, and the environment in general, except as otherwise noted herein. The Grantee's acknowledgement of the condition of the Property creates a rebuttable presumption that hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or petroleum products discovered on the property after the date of the transfer are related solely to the activity of, caused, deposited, or created by the Grantee, its agents, transferees, successors or assigns as consideration for the conveyance, agrees to release the Grantor and Army from any liability or responsibility for any claims or damages arising out of or in any way related to the release of any substances on the property occurring after the conveyance of the property to the Grantee. This paragraph shall not affect or limit liabilities of the Army under applicable law or its responsibilities to conduct response actions or corrective actions that are required by law.
- 12. By accepting this deed, the Grantee, acknowledges that the Army has provided the Grantee with a copy of the Federal Facilities Agreement (FFA) dated July 23, 1990, between the Army and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The Army shall provide the Grantee with a copy of any future amendments to the FFA. In this regard, it is understood that:

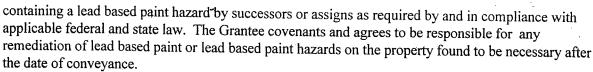


- 12.1. In exercising the rights hereunder, the Army shall give the Grantee or its successor or assigns reasonable notice of action taken on the property under the FFA and shall, to the extent reasonable, consistent with the FFA endeavor to minimize the disruption to the operation and use of the subject property.
- 12.2. The Grantee agrees that notwithstanding any other provision of this deed, the United States assumes no liability to the Grantee, its successor or assigns, or any other person, should implementation of the FFA interfere with the use of the property. The Grantee and its successors and assigns shall have no claim on account of any such interference against the United States or any officer, agency, employee, or contractor thereof.
- 12.3. The Grantee covenants for itself, it successors and assigns to not interfere with any response action being undertaken on the subject property, or interrupt, relocate, or directly or indirectly interfere with any remediation system, now or in the future located, over, through, or across any portion of the property without the prior written consent of the Army and EPA.
- 12.4. Prior to the determination by the United States that all remedial action is complete under the Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA) of the Fort Ord National Priorities List (NPL) site, the Grantee, its successors and assigns shall; (a) not undertake activities on the property that would interfere with or impede the completion of the CERCLA clean-up at the Fort Ord NPL site, (b) give prior written notice to the Army, EPA, and DTSC of any construction, alterations, or similar work on the property which may interfere with or impede said clean-up, and (c) comply with any institutional controls put in place by the Grantor or required by the previously issued Record of Decision (ROD) or amendments thereto, issued pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) or the FFA, and (d) ensure that any permit or license for the use of property provides for legally binding compliance with terms herein.
- 12.5. All terms and conditions contained within this section shall bind and run with the land and are forever enforceable by the Army, EPA or DTSC. The Grantor reserves the right to rescind all or portions of this section, upon request of the Grantee, following the receipt of a determination by the United States that all remedial actions at the Fort Ord NPL site are complete.
- 12.6. Prior to the determination by the Army that all remedial action under CERCLA and the FFA are complete for the Fort Ord NPL site, the Grantee shall provide written notice by certified mail to the appropriate regional office of the EPA and the State of California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC), together with the required authorization of the Grantor as required by other terms and conditions of the deed, of any conveyance of interest in the subject property. Said notice shall be made within fourteen days of the date of transfer.
- 13. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(i) of CERCLA (42 U.S.C. 9620), the Grantor has been provided a copy and an opportunity to review the *Finding of Suitability to Transfer* (FOST), dated July 14, 1997 and the Letter of Assignment (LOA) dated September 5, 1997. The FOST and LOA contains, to the extent such information is available, a notice of the type and quantity of hazardous substances stored on the property for one year or more, a notice of the time at which such storage, release, or disposal took place, and a description of the remedial actions taken of the property.
- 14. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(ii)(I) and (B) of CERCLA, and pursuant to a finding by the EPA that the groundwater remedy for the property is operating properly and successfully, the Army has covenanted, by virtue of a 1997 Memorandum of Agreement (hereby incorporated and made a part of this agreement by reference) between the Grantor and the Department of Defense among others, that all remedial action necessary to protect human health and the environment with respect to any hazardous substances on the property has been taken prior to this conveyance.
- 15. The Grantee acknowledges the receipt of notice contained within the FOST and LOA regarding the contamination of groundwater located beneath the property with volatile organic chemicals. The Grantee

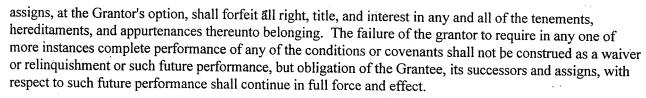




- 16. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(ii)(II) of CERCLA, the Army has covenanted, by virtue of a 1997 Memorandum of Agreement (hereby incorporated and made a part of this conveyance) between the Grantor and the Department of Defense among others, that any additional remedial action found to be necessary after the date of this conveyance that resulted from the Army's use or occupancy of the property shall be conducted by the Army.
- 17. Pursuant to Section 120(h)(3)(A)(iii) of CERCLA, the Grantor reserves a right of access to the property on behalf of the Army, EPA, and DTSC in any case in which remedial action or correction action is found to be necessary, after the date of this conveyance. To the extent permitted by law, this reservation includes the right or access to and the use of available utilities at reasonable cost. The Army shall give the Grantee reasonable notice of action requiring access to the property and endeavor to minimize the disruption of the Grantee's use of the property.
- 18. The Grantee, its successors or assigns, acknowledges the provisions of the *Habitat Management Plan* (HMP), incorporated and made a part hereof, may apply to the subject property. The property is shown in the HMP as parcel L5.9.1and is designated as a Development Area. The Grantee, its successors or assigns, is responsible for complying with the Endangered Species Act (16 U.S.C. 1531-1544), its regulations, the HMP, and the accompanying Biological Opinion by the U.S Fish and Wildlife Service, dated April 11, 1997, as may be applicable to the property conveyed by this deed.
- 19. The Grantee is hereby informed and does acknowledge nonfriable asbestos and asbestos containing materials have been found on the property [Asbestos Survey Report, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers-Fort Ord Installation, Fort Ord, California (April 1993)]. The Grantee covenants and agrees, on behalf of it, its successors and assigns, that in its use and occupancy of the property, it will comply with all Federal, State and local laws relating to asbestos; and that neither the Grantor or Army assumes liability for damages for personal injury, illness, disability or death, to the Grantee, its successors or assigns, or to any other person, including members of the general public, arising from or incident to the purchase, transportation, removal, handling, use, disposition, or other activity causing or leading to contact of any kind whatsoever with asbestos on the property, whether Grantee, its successors or assigns have properly warned or failed properly to warn the individual(s) injured. The Grantee further agrees to be responsible for any future remediation of asbestos found to be necessary on said property.
- 20. The Grantee is hereby informed and does acknowledge that all buildings on the property constructed prior to 1978 are presumed to contain lead based paints. The presence of lead based paints within these structures effects there possible use for residential purposes in compliance with 24 CFR Part 35, Subpart H. The Grantee acknowledges receipt of notice to this effect as contained in the FOST, LOA, Environmental Baseline Survey or the Community Environmental Response Facilitation Act (CERFA) Report, Fort Ord (April 8, 1994).
 - 20.1. The Grantee acknowledges that lead based paints present an exposure risk to young children and pregnant women, which could result in lead poisoning resulting in neurological damage. The Grantee covenants and agrees to provide notice of said risks to any successor or assign of any interest in said property pursuant to this deed.
 - 20.2. The Grantee covenants that it has received the opportunity to conduct a risk assessment or inspection for the presence of lead-base paints or lead based paint hazards prior to the execution of this conveyance. The Grantee further covenants that it will provide for an inspection, abatement, and/or elimination of any lead based paint hazard prior to the occupancy or use said portion of the property



- 20.3. The Grantee covenants and agrees, on behalf of it, its successors and assigns, to indemnify and hold harmless the Grantor and Army, its agents and employees against any health problems which may result from the existence of lead-based paint on the property or any claims by the parties in relation to thereto.
- 21. The Grantee acknowledges that said property is located on a former military installation with a historyof ordinance and explosive (OE) use. Although OE investigations indicate that OE is unlikely on the property, there is a potential for OE to be present. In the event that the Grantee, its successors or assigns, should discover or become aware of ordnance or explosives on the property, the Grantee agrees it shall not attempt to remove or destroy it but shall notify local law enforcement officials and the Directorate of Law Enforcement at the Presidio at Monterey for prompt disposal of such ordnance at no expense to the Grantee.
- 22. The Grantee, its successors and assigns, acknowledges that said property is located within the vicinity of general aviation airports, and covenants and agrees to obtain a determination of no hazard to air navigation issued by the Federal Aviation Administration, pursuant to 14 CFR 77, for any proposed structure which would exceeds an elevation of 330 feet mean sea level at its highest point.
- 23. An obligation by the Army to reimburse any money under this deed is subject the availability of appropriated funds, and nothing in this deed shall be interpreted to required obligations or payment by the United States in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.
- 24. The Grantee and its successors and assigns shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the United States, it's employees, agents, and representatives, from and against any suit, judgement, cost or other fee (including death, illness, or loss of or damage to property or economic loss) that results from, or is in any manner predicated upon, the release or threaten release of any hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant, or petroleum or petroleum derivative as a result of the activities of the Grantee or the Grantee's successors, assigns, transferees, and/or agents except where such suit, claim, demand or action, liability, judgement, cost or other fee is the result of negligence of willful misconduct by the Department of Defense or any of its employees, agents, or representatives.
- 25. Subject to the limitation and other requirements contained in Section 303 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1993 (P.L. 102-484), as amended (10 U.S.C. 2687), the Secretary of Defense shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the Grantee, it's successors and assigns, transferees, and/or agents from and against any suit, judgement, cost or other fee arising out of any claim for personal injury or property damage (including death, illness, or loss of or damage to property or economic loss) that results from, or is in any manner predicated upon, the release of any hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant, or petroleum or petroleum derivative as a result of Department of Defense activities at the Fort Ord NPL site.
- 26. In the event that there is a breach by the Grantee, its successors or assigns, of any of the conditions and covenants, whether caused by the legal or other inability of the Grantee, its successors or assigns, to perform said conditions and covenants, the Grantor will give written notice, with a reasonable time stated therein, that the Grantee shall eliminate, rectify, cure, or commence actions necessary to cure said breach. Upon failure to eliminate, rectify, cure, or commence actions necessary to cure said breach within the time set forth in the notice, all right, title, and interest in and to said premises shall, at the Grantor's option revert to and become the property of the Grantor. In addition to all other remedies for such breach, the Grantee, its successors and



- 27. The Grantor, Army, and other federal agencies, have the right of access, upon reasonable notice, to inspect for compliance with the provisions herein, as well as applicable federal laws and regulations. The Grantor, to the extent it knows, will give the Grantee reasonable prior notice of the intention of Army or other federal agencies to enter. Such notice shall not apply when the entry is required for safety, environmental, operation, or security or law enforcement purposes.
 - During the above access situations, the United States, and its agencies will be liable to the extent allowed by the Federal Tort Claims Act for wrongful death, personal injuries, or property damage resulting from negligent or wrongful act or omission of any employee of the United States while acting within the scope of his employment, arising out of this conveyance. Further, said Grantor, or other federal agency employees will be covered by the Federal Employees Compensation Act, to the extent allowed by law, for injuries to said employees.
- 28. The Grantee, by its acceptance of this deed, covenants and agrees for itself, and its successors and assigns, that in the event the Grantor exercises its option to revert all right, title, and interest in the property to the Grantor, or the Grantee voluntarily returns title to the property in lieu of a reverter, then the Grantee shall provide protection to and maintenance of said property at all times until such time as the title is actually reverted or returned to and accepted by the Grantor, including the period of any notice of intent to revert. Such protection and maintenance shall, at a minimum, conform to the standards prescribed by the General Services Administration in its regulations FPMR 101-47.402 in effect as of the date of this deed.

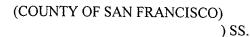

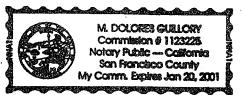

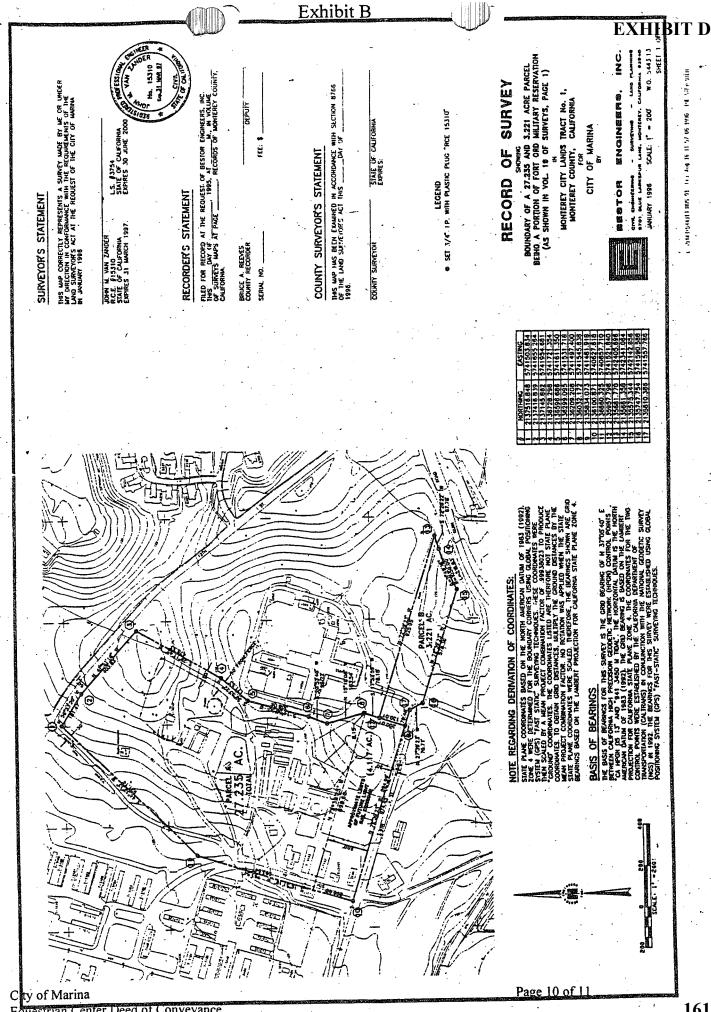

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Proposed Program of Utilization

This is a Program of Utilization for property known as the "Marina Equestrian Center" (herein referred to as "MEC"), deeded from the US Government to the City of Marina on April 13, 1998 under the National Park Service's Federal Lands to Parks Program.

This program of utilization specifies the use of the property consistent with the Quitclaim Deed recorded in the County of Monterey on April 24, 1998; and specifies budget, time for completion and environmental impacts.

Physical Description

The MEC is an approximately 35-acre facility bound by Ninth Street on the south, California Avenue to the west, Imjin Parkway to the north and the former post stockade to the east. The site includes five of the six original buildings of the 1941 Fort Ord Station Veterinary Hospital, three arenas, one round pen, 73 horse stalls, and 33 horse turnouts. Unrelated existing structures on the site are a portable building formerly used by the Army Corps of Engineers, and a shortwave radio building with accompanying radio antennas. There is a cell tower on the site from which additional monthly income for park development is generated.

Purpose

Geographically, Marina is without dispute the northern gateway to the Monterey Peninsula, Fort Ord National Monument, and Fort Ord Dunes State Park. The MEC will be key in Marina's plans to market this identity, besides being a recreational draw in itself.

The MEC shall serve the residents of the City of Marina and tourists to the Monterey Peninsula as a multi-use recreational facility with a primary focus on outdoor recreation serving as a primary connection between the urban and natural resources of the City of Marina by capitalizing on its proximity and connections to the newly designated Fort Ord National Monument (Department of the Interior) and the Fort Ord Dunes State Park (California State Parks). It will serve as a spacious public park with natural landscapes, stables, horse and bicycle rentals; serve as a recreation hub for activities by individuals and groups; and be a venue for public events and celebrations for the city and region. Community access and programming will be developed for the radio and portable buildings in coordination with recreation and cultural programs provided by the City alone and in cooperation with regional park programming providers.

The park is half a mile from another Lands to Parks transfer, consisting of 12 acres at 8th Street and 2nd Avenue. With proper planning, the MEC will connect the two federally granted parks and provide much-coveted northern gateway to the Monterey Bay at Fort Ord Dunes State Park. The existing Monterey Bay Coastal Trail through the state park enables recreationers to travel 29 miles between Castroville to the north and Asilomar/Pacific Grove to the south. Trekkers will branch off the coastal trail into Marina and to the MEC for amenities, services, rental of horses and bikes, and greenway access to Fort Ord National Monument.

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In addition to the connection between the urban and natural worlds the park will provide a connection between Fort Ord's past and present. Combining a location rich in recreational potential with structures whose history unites a number of compelling themes, the park will beckon locals and visitors to exploration and refreshment. With enhancement of naturalistic landscapes, the addition of scenic walking paths and facilities for picnics, horse/bicycle rentals, outdoor recreation, and public and private events, the MEC shall be the emblem of Marina excellence in recreation, as Golden Gate Park is for San Francisco.

In addition to creating new and needed recreational opportunities, the proposal further benefits the public by potentially anchoring a new community identity, creating jobs, and supporting the local economy. The City of Marina and its residents have identified these benefits as goals consistent with the community's vision (City of Marina, 2003).

Outdoor recreation is a \$46B annual industry in California. Marina's weather, location, and the resources given by the Army on the breakup of Fort Ord, including airport, beach, equestrian center, and trail system make it an ideal destination for outdoor recreation tourists.

Concept Plan

Outdoor recreation is prescribed by the Fort Ord Base Reuse Plan. The City of Marina is already an outdoor recreation venue on the Peninsula. The MEC is very well situated to provide both a destination venue and to fulfill the desired connection between the urban and natural resources of the City of Marina, and the City with the newly designated Fort Ord National Monument and the Fort Ord Dunes State Park.

The MEC will provide and manage significant new public outdoor recreation opportunities for all on the park site and the surrounding area. It will serve as both a venue and a recreation hub for residents and tourists to enjoy the horseback riding, off-road and on-road bicycling, and hiking. The equestrian facilities on the site will be available for public use, horse rentals, lessons, guided trail rides, both temporary and some private, long-term boarding, and multiple disciplines of equine therapy. All amenities will promote informal and structured cultural and recreational opportunities. All recreational opportunities will be available to the local and regional public, and insofar as possible be accessible for people with disabilities. Associated parking and other required support amenities will be included as part of the development of the site.

The MEC's second major connection is cultural. Thematically, the park will capitalize on the five Fort Ord Station Veterinary Hospital structures, which provide an excellent example of the mobilization-style construction now fast disappearing on Fort Ord. This medical facility is a significant landmark in the history of warfare, represented the final years of horse use by U.S. cavalry and field artillery. The continuity of use and unaltered appearance of the structures create an opportunity for living history. Historical continuity will also be an important aspect of MEC design and branding. The park will have a retro military theme for signage, accounterments, and amenities, to contribute to the singular identity of the venue and to avoid stylistic clashes when used for living history events. The buildings have been identified as the last existing World War II era veterinary hospital in the United States.

FUNCTIONS OF THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN CENTER

Public Park

The MEC will serve as a community park with picnic area, benches, landscaping, bike racks, and walking paths for visitors.

The area north of 9th Street, east of California Avenue and west of the large arena, south of the small arena will be closed to vehicular traffic. This southeast corner of the property, in and around the historical structures lining California Street (the C-5 Building and Colic Building and its surrounding area) will be most heavily used for general park purposes. The large open space between these buildings and the main arena will serve as picnic area, a place for public and private events. Addition of picnic facilities, barbecues, bench seating, and landscape will transform this area and provide an inviting place to meet, eat and mingle. The addition of a gazebo will provide a stage, enhancing both private and public events.

Hiking paths will be developed through the natural landscape of the northwestern portion of the property. A trail will traverse the northern perimeter of the property along Imjin Parkway to further the objective of creating connections for multiple disciplines of recreational users and commuters to the residential neighborhoods of Marina. Developing a run/walk path between the park and Peninsula Wellness Center to the west along Imjin Parkway will encourage development of a cooperative, outdoor fitness program for fitness center members and its patients.

Landscaping will pay homage to traditional military and national-park practices such as white-painted rocks demarking flowerbeds. Additional trees will be added to soften sea breezes and improve shade and aesthetics. Nature trails will draw visitors into the natural, coastal landscape. Interpretive signage will enhance the knowledge and enjoyment. Vista points will be accessed by trails and enhanced with installation of seating.

Trails and Recreation Hub

The City of Marina will capitalize on the open space corridor prescribed in Fort Ord Reuse Plan Map 3.6-1. The MEC will provide trailhead amenities as set forth in the land application submitted by the City of Marina to the National Park in a letter of May 25, 1994, citing "the need to keep the stables open at Fort Ord to provide public recreation and to take advantage of the extensive trail system currently available, particularly in the north-easterly region of the base." Connection with the trail system is an extremely valuable aspect of the MEC, both in economic and recreational terms. The MEC will provide bike racks, hitching posts, trailer parking, and water for man, horse, and dog, maps, restrooms, picnic tables, and other typical recreation hub amenities, including a snack shop. The City will also plan a route for the "Beach to National Monument" that connects with the MEC and the second Lands to Parks transfer at 8th Street and 2nd Avenue.

Cultural and Educational Center

Stabilization and revitalization of the veterinary hospital buildings will allow for interpretation of the buildings in their original use as well as stress the broader scope of military presence on the Monterey Peninsula; provide meeting and event space; provide a venue for historical displays

both from Fort Ord and other military periods of interest; and incorporate a Marina visitor center and reception area with brochures and maps. Installation of equipment to accommodate automated slide-talks and/or movie programming that tells the history of the Fort, Marina and the County through photos and films will be incorporated. The story of the soldier and the warhorse may be further illustrated with reenactments and demonstrations in the equestrian portion of the park.

The MEC will be integrated into Marina life as a destination for annual school trips and senior outings, rec department activities, and community events. Children's horse, art, and nature day-camps will be offered in the summer. Instruction will be provided by volunteer docents, groups, and businesses or city or school district staff. Space for these classes will be available in the C-5, Colic, C-6, and portable and radio buildings.

Focuses may include:

- o Fort Ord and Presidio of Monterey history
- o site history
- o equestrian topics
- o native plants
- o Native American history
- o leave-no-trace trail principles
- o bike-horse safety
- o art
- o shortwave radio and citizens' emergency response

Equestrian Center

Utilization of the property as an equestrian center was the guiding purpose of the land grant from the National Park Service through the Federal Lands to Parks program. In its application letter, dated May 25, 1994, the City of Marina cites a need to "operate the stables for community benefit and to make the stables available to military families, as well as the civilian community at large. Recently F.O.R.G. (the Fort Ord Reuse Group) amended the reuse plan to allow the use of a stable in the area it is currently located."

The equestrian functions of the property will continue. The City currently is engaged in preparation of a Request for Proposal for a concessionaire to restructure and manage equestrian uses of the park, with the specific direction to increase public uses and access. Guided trail rides, lessons, and equine activities are to be offered to the public.

The ability to rent horses for riding lessons and guided trail rides will be a significant feature of the park. The facility will also accommodate transient horse use by enabling tourists to board horses for a day or for the duration of a longer stay in our local hotels/motels and for equine events.

A portion of the existing stables will be available for self-care and full-care boarding. Fees for these services will be at market rate, although City of Marina residents may receive a resident discount. This is not to suggest fewer privately owned horses, but rather, better management of the space available to minimize the area dedicated to private use. Partial funding of the planned park improvements is dependent upon generation of revenues from horse boarding.

Qualified providers will offer a variety of horse-based therapeutic programs such as PATH, EAGALA, and Horses for Heroes.

Public-event Venue

Public events such as history days, Halloween, Veterans Day, and other holiday celebrations put on by City of Marina and partners, as well as lectures, and meetings will be accommodated in and around the buildings. The buildings will provide multiple private party and meeting venues. Uses are expected to include city-sponsored activities and events as well as use of the buildings and grounds for weddings, birthdays, and other private events. Possible addition of a gazebo may enhance these uses. Currently the C-5 building will accommodate approximately 75 seats for meetings and has a sink/prep/storage area with no oven. The Colic Building contains a kitchen with oven and small stage/meeting area. The portable building will also accommodate such use.

The outdoor arenas will be available for public rental.

Recreation Center

Bike rentals and bicycle tours to Fort Ord National Monument and Fort Ord Dunes State Park will be available. The venue will be marketed as bike friendly, with trailer parking, bike racks, and maps.

This currently under-utilized City land resource will addresses a newly identified, continually growing need in Marina and the region for easy access to trails and open space that offer significant distances and points of interest. The MEC will allow the development and ongoing operation of unique multi-use recreational facilities and opportunities otherwise unattainable by the City.

Site Improvements

The City anticipates working with a park planner to develop future improvements on the site. For example, the topography of the north easterly area of the property may be ideally suited for an amphitheater cut into the leeward side of the property. The natural bowl-like setting may lend itself to construction of a community amphitheater. This will provide a venue for live stage productions, movies, and other performances.

Bike rental and storage facilities will be developed. Hitching posts and watering troughs added. Additional bathrooms installed and food concession incorporated. Portions of the areas presently identified as turnouts will be transformed to complement the park uses.

Time for Completion

The City of Marina regards the fulfillment of this Program of Utilization as high priority.

Budget

The City of Marina will retain the oversight of the proposed park and facility; enlist a park

planner as needed; and direct the development through full implementation. An independent concessionaire will be sought for operation of the site consistent with the intended use and ongoing operating costs.

Environmental Impacts

The proposed utilization is consistent with prior public and equestrian use under army ownership, albeit with expansion of the number of users/visitors. While appropriate site specific environmental evaluation will occur during project planning, larger scale environmental evaluations conducted under the base re-use process did not identify any sensitive environmental resources on this site (Fort Ord Base Reuse Authority, 1997).

Guiding Documents

Current and future uses of the Project Site must be consistent with several planning documents including the National Park Service's Federal Lands to Parks Program, the California Outdoor Recreation Plan, the Fort Ord Reuse Plan, and the City of Marina Parks and Recreation Plan.

The National Park Service (NPS) requires land acquired through the Federal Land to Parks Program be used for "public park and recreational use in perpetuity." The land may be "developed for a single recreational activity, or multiple recreation activities, or be used to support an existing park or recreation area by providing parking or improved access. It may serve as a community center, a neighborhood park, a town square, or a regional or state park" (National Park Service, 2004). The proposed use for the Project Site is consistent with NPS goals as it develops a public park and recreational area serving several recreational purposes. The proposed services will attract individuals and groups throughout the community and beyond and will serve as a community center, a neighborhood park, a recreation hub, and a venue for public and private events.

The California Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP), as developed by the California State Parks' Planning Division, serves as the master plan for parks, outdoor recreation, and open space for all recreation providers. The CORP states that the goal of all park and recreation providers in California should be meeting the park and recreation needs of all current and future residents.

The Fort Ord Reuse Plan for the City of Marina further defines CORP's broader goals by setting the overall parameters for recreational uses in the former Fort Ord area within which this park is situated. In particular, Objective D for the City of Marina's Recreation Policies and Program is, "Establish a system of community and neighborhood parks which provide recreation opportunities reflective of local community standards" (Fort Ord Reuse Authority, 1997). Objective E reads, "Create opportunities for economic revitalization of the former Fort Ord through encouragement of commercial recreation opportunities in appropriate settings" (1997). Both of these objectives are accomplished in the proposed use.

The Fort Ord Reuse Plan also suggests the City "utilize the existing equestrian center site as a major community open space for the district to provide recreational amenities for the residents" (1997).

The following sub-policy statements in the Recreation and Open Space Element of the Fort Ord Reuse Plan further support the proposed use:

Recreation Policy D-1: The City of Marina shall designate and locate park facilities to adequately serve the current and projected population of Marina within the former Fort Ord for both active recreation as well as to provide for passive uses such as scenic vistas, fish and wildlife habitat, and nature study.

The proposed use for the MEC will provide facilities for active and passive recreation for the current population and accommodate the projected population for the City of Marina, including the expected increase in population related to planned housing developments in the surrounding area.

Recreation Policy D-2: The City of Marina shall develop active parkland within the former Fort Ord which reflects the adopted City of Marina standard of 5 acres of neighborhood/community parks per 1,000 population.

The proposed facility would provide significantly increased access to quality recreation opportunities for this population in a unique park.

Recreation Policy D-3: The City of Marina shall maximize use of existing former military recreation facilities as a catalyst for creation of quality parks and recreation opportunities.

The military used this site for equestrian recreation when Fort Ord was an army base. This proposal would improve currently under-utilized equestrian resources to allow increased public recreational opportunities for both the horse enthusiast and the passive observer. This plan will expand the use of the facilities and create an equestrian and outdoor recreation venue for the 3.3 million tourists annually to the Monterey Peninsula, in addition to its residents.

The California Outdoor Recreation Plan acknowledges one of the major advantages to participating in outdoor recreation and having a more active lifestyle is improved physical health. Safe and attractive facilities that promote physical activities are important to city residents and enhance Marina as an attractive place to live and work. The proposed use includes facilities that support opportunities to maximize the health benefits of active recreation.

The Marina Parks and Recreation Facilities Master Plan (MP&RFMP) mission states "The City of Marina is committed to establishing and maintaining facilities, parks and services that enhance the quality of life for all ages, cultural origins and abilities" (2005). The plan describes a "Community Park" as "a recreation area that provides recreational opportunities for several neighborhoods" and avoids "duplication of facilities already provided in neighborhood parks." The proposed use will serve people of all ages, cultural origins and abilities from neighborhoods throughout the region, and would be unique in size and scope in the City of Marina and the County of Monterey.

In addition, the following statements contained in the document further support the proposed use:

Goal 7: Promote regional and state park and recreational facilities that contribute Marina's evolving role as a visitor-serving/recreational-based destination on the Monterey Peninsula.

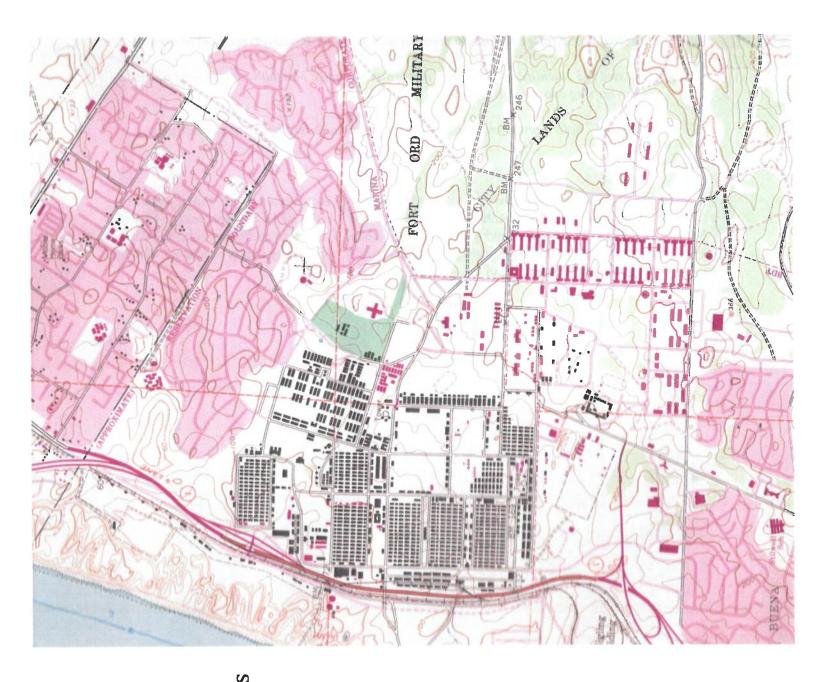
Objective 7-2: Explore the development of new regional-based recreational facilities.

Objective 7-3: Identify opportunities that would enhance Marina's identity and role as a visitor-serving coastal destination.

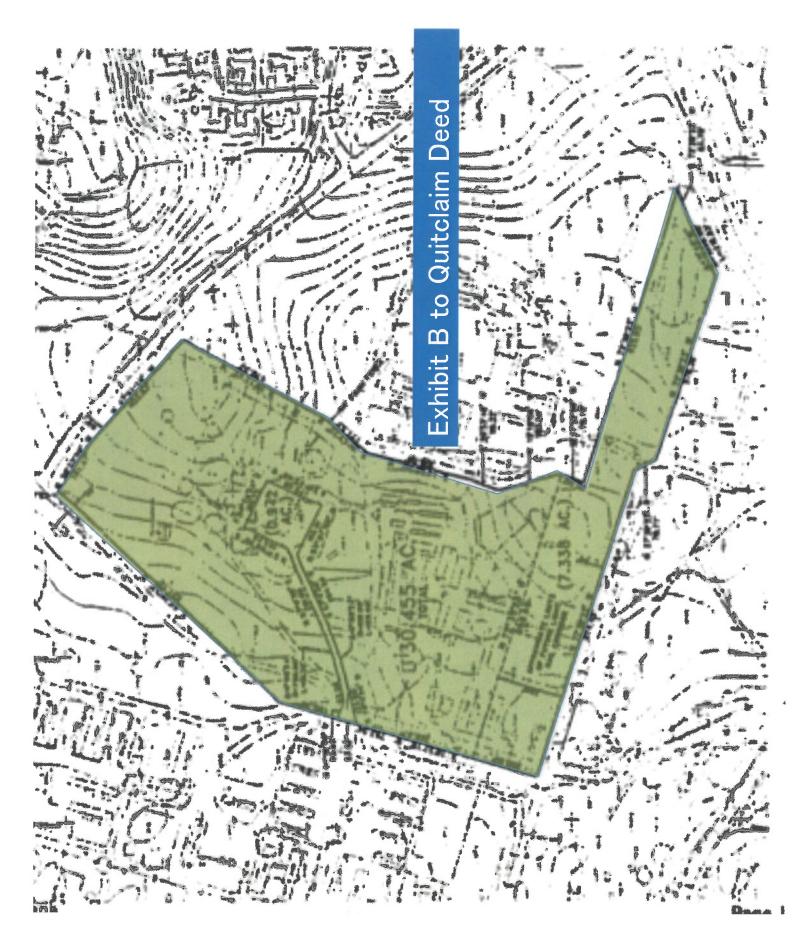
Policy 7-3: Solicit proposals to develop new, regional based recreational facilities.

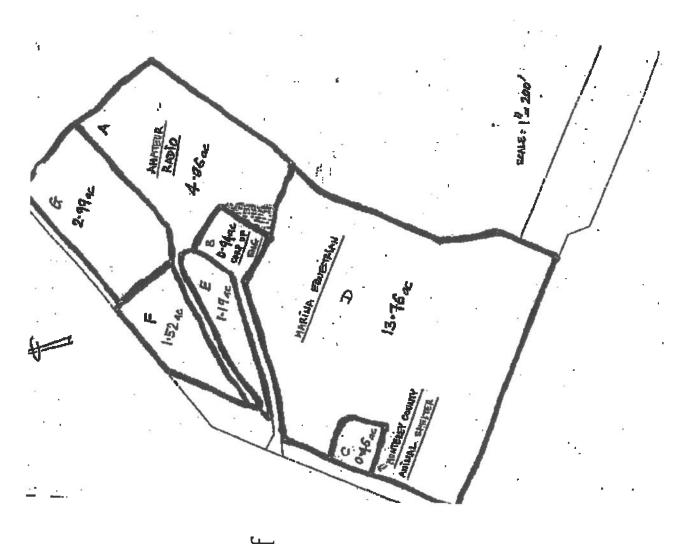

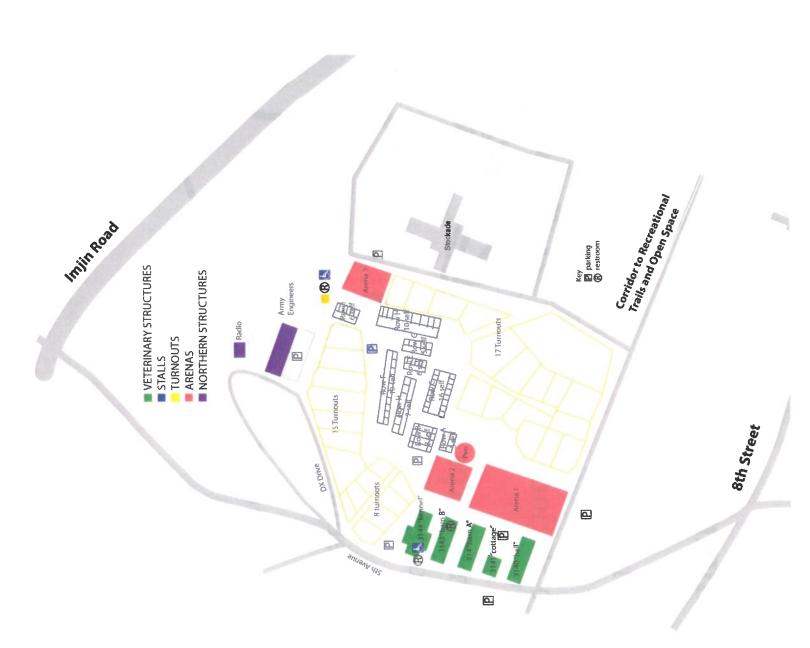




Current Configuration

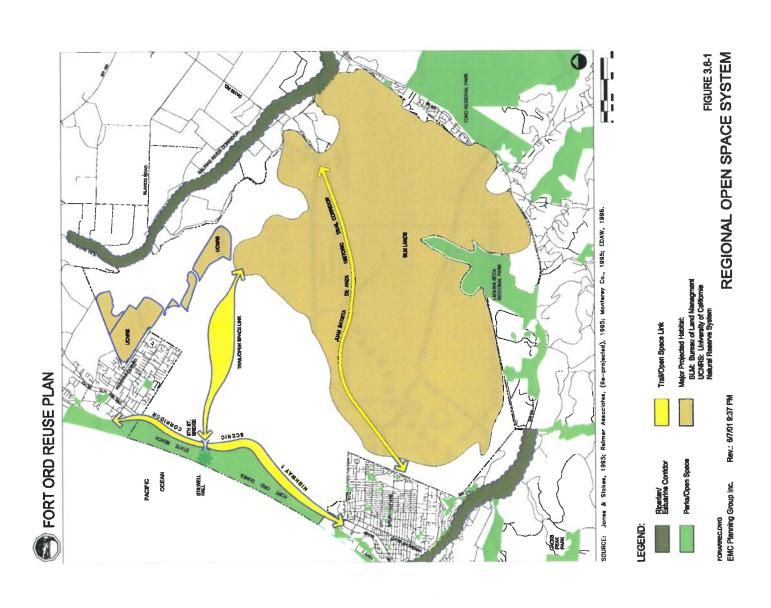

In September 2013 we received an updated draft Program of Utilization (POU) for the 27.24-acre Marina Equestrian Center ("MEC POU Approved by Council 7-16-2013"). Since that time we have had several conversations regarding implementation of a Program of Utilization at the site, and our reservations regarding approval of a POU that contained a statement that some areas would still be dedicated to private use. We also understood that there may be some local controversy regarding the highest and best public recreational use to which the property should be put that perhaps the City was still in the process of resolving. In general, however, we find that the proposed utilization plan represents an improved approach to opening the area to public recreational use and would meet NPS requirements for consistency with the terms of the property transfer, with one caveat.

The one area of major concern for us is the private boarding of horses. The first priority, as we understand your POU, would be for stabling horses needed for lessons and rentals, as well as some short-term boarding for visitors coming to the area to use the trails. Those very clearly serve the public park purpose.

Private long-term boarding of horses is not a public recreational use of the site. As we have stated in previous communications, boarding of horses is not precluded as a legitimate public recreational use of the park in certain circumstances. Those circumstances require that boarding of horses be structured such that it is a public use, not one that establishes a long-term right of exclusive occupancy. This requires a fair allocation system for boarding opportunities – such as waiting lists, rotations, and award of limited duration (even if longer than short-term) boarding contracts with no guarantee of renewal that allow broad public use. Boarding of horses for anything more than short-term periods, if allowed at all, should use a small percentage of the boarding space available. The presence of privately owned boarded horses may not impede the public access to and use of the park. Horses owned by a concessionaire that are used for public rental, trail rides, and riding instruction may reside at the stables while in such service. No portion of the park may be dedicated to private use.

The proposed POU remarks that park improvements depend upon income from horse boarding. As stated above and previously, the park is restricted to use only for park and public recreation area purposes. Therefore any activity conducted on the site must be for that purpose. Generation of revenues by a non-public-recreational use may not be justified on the basis of its eventual economic support of the park. Therefore, any boarding that occurs, must be carried out as a public use. Also, under the terms of the deed, any revenues generated on the parkland must be channeled back to park maintenance, operations, and improvements.

With the proviso that the City establishes a suitable plan to make boarding of horses an equitable public park use, we concur in the revised program of utilization presented in the referenced 2013 document.

We assume that any site plans that would alter the facilities or use of the area would be subject to compliance with state and local requirements regarding environmental and cultural resources.

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As a reminder, the area must be permanently and clearly signed as land that was received from the federal government for use as a public park. Our current guidance is for the following language: "This park land was acquired through the FEDERAL LANDS TO PARKS PROGRAM of the United States Department of the Interior, National Park Service, for use by the general public".

As you know, any concession or license agreements must be reviewed by the National Park Service for consistency with the terms of the transfer. Leases and granting of easements or any property rights, are not allowed.

Biennial Reports are also required under the terms of the transfer, and should be submitted to NPS by the City of Marina, not by a licensee or concessionaire. They should include reports of park use and condition, revenues and expenditures, capital improvements, management issues, and a certification regarding non-discrimination and use of revenues. We have a standard form available for this purpose.

Please let me know if you have questions or concerns about any of this, and best wishes to you in the next phase of this project.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA RECEIVING A PRESENTATION ON THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN CENTER PARK; APPROVING CHAPARRAL COUNTRY CORPORATION, INC. OF WOODSIDE, CA AS THE MOST QUALIFIED RESPONDENT TO THE REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS (RFP) TO PROVIDE RECREATIONAL FACILITIES AND PROGRAMS TO THE PUBLIC AT THE MARINA EQUESTRIAN CENTER PARK; DIRECTING STAFF TO NEGOTIATE THE TERMS OF A CONCESSION AGREEMENT WITH CHAPARRAL COUNTRY CORPORATION, INC. OF WOODSIDE, CA; DIRECTING STAFF TO OBTAIN NATIONAL PARK SERVICE'S CONCURRENCE WITH THE TERMS OF A CONCESSION AGREEMENT; DIRECT STAFF TO DO FURTHER VETTING OF THE FINANCIALS BY THE CHAPARRAL CORPORATION; AND DIRECTING STAFF TO RETURN TO CITY COUNCIL WITH A CONCESSION AGREEMENT FOR APPROVAL.

WHEREAS the 35-acre parcel of property at 5th Avenue and 9th Street known as the "Marina Equestrian Center Park" was deeded by the U.S. Government to the City of Marina on April 13, 1998, under the National Park Service's (NPS) Federal Lands to Parks Program; and

WHEREAS the Quitclaim Deed recorded April 24, 1998 attached as **EXHIBIT A**, the "Public Conveyance of Parks and Recreation Property at Fort Ord" July 1993 attached as **EXHIBIT B**, and the letter dated May 25, 1994 with City of Marina Resolution No. 94-23 attached as **EXHIBIT C** provided for the transfer of 34.7 acres commonly referred to as "horse stables at Fort Ord" to remain as equestrian center for public recreation and use; and

WHEREAS on July 16, 2013, City Council unanimously adopted a proposed Program of Utilization (POU) for the Marina Equestrian Center Park; and

WHEREAS in July 2013, the proposed POU was submitted to the National Park Service; and

WHEREAS on January 12, 2017, the National Park Service communicated its approval of the proposed POU with the proviso that the private long-term boarding of horses is not a public recreational use of the site and the City must establish a suitable plan to make boarding of horses an equitable park use; and

WHEREAS in order to implement the POU, the City Council adopted resolution 2017-28 on March 21, 2017, directing staff to prepare and issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) for a concessionaire to operate an equestrian facility at the Marina Equestrian Center Park consistent with the POU and direction from the NPS; and

WHEREAS staff issued an RFP for potential concessionaires on October 23, 2020. Three proposals in response to the RFP were received on January 4, 2021; and

WHEREAS three proposals in response to the RFP were received on January 4, 2021. The proposing concessionaires were Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc. (proposal attached as **EXHIBIT H**); Marina Equestrian Association (proposal attached as **EXHIBIT I**); and Fort Ord Equine Foundation (proposal attached as **EXHIBIT J**). Interviews of all three proposers were conducted on February 8th, 2021; and

WHEREAS staff evaluated the proposals, presentations by the proposers and interview responses according to the criteria stated in the RFP. The proposers were rated and ranked to determine the most qualified respondent to the request for proposals. Staff determined that Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc., of Woodside CA is the most qualified concessionaire.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council hereby approves Resolution No. 2021—which includes the following actions:

- 1. Receiving a presentation on the Marina Equestrian Center Park;
- 2. Approving Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc. of Woodside CA as the most qualified respondent to the request for proposals (RFP) to provide recreational facilities and programs to the public at the Marina Equestrian Center Park;
- 3. Directing staff to negotiate the terms of a concession agreement with Chaparral Country Corporation, Inc. of Woodside CA;
- 4. Directing staff to obtain National Park Service's concurrence with the terms of a concession agreement; and
- 5. Direct staff to do further vetting of the financials by the Chaparral Corporation; and
- 6. Directing staff to return to City Council with a concession agreement for approval.

I write to respectfully request that the City Council of Marina, California be allowed to make its own decision when it comes to any long-term horse boarding at the Marina Equestrian Center (MEC). Although some long-term boarding at the MEC has been sanctioned by the National Park Service (NPS) over the past twenty years, you recently decided to stop that long-established service. We ask that you reconsider your decision in order to allow the Marina City Council to make its own determination as to whether there can be some long-term boarding at the MEC. The decision whether some long-term boarding is in the best interest to the public should be decided by the people of the City of Marina and their representatives on the City Council, and not the federal government.

For over two decades, the NPS and the City of Marina allowed and encouraged some long-term boarding as a component of the MEC. This park's creation and existence as a community-centered public horse park is an important part of history. The original vision and deed for the MEC was for equestrian use and included some long-term boarding. The original horse stalls were built by a veteran, Sergeant Allen MacDonald, with the permission of the U.S. Army in 1968. His role is memorialized with the Sergeant Allan MacDonald Cavalry Trail that starts at the MEC.

The 1998 quitclaim deed, the 1998 program of utilization, and the current program of utilization approved by the Marina City Council July 16, 2013 and approved by you in 2017, all allowed for some long-term boarding. The 1998 deed states, "This property shall be used and maintained for the public purposes for which it was conveyed in perpetuity as set forth in the program of utilization and plan contained in an application submitted by the Grantee..." That 1998 program of utilization included a "sixty horse, self-care boarding facility" and was approved by Gary Munsterman who was the NPS Regional Coordinator for the Federal Lands to Parks program at that time.²

The 2013 program of utilization that you approved is the current governing document for the City of Marina. Long-term boarding is specifically addressed as one of the equitable uses in the concept plan in this document. It states, "The equestrian facilities on the site will be available for...both temporary and some private long-term boarding...", along with other public activities. It also states, "A portion of the existing stables will be available for self-care and full-care boarding."

It is clear from those guiding documents that there is a precedent for some long-term boarding and that the boarding of horses has always been a use of this property dating back to 1968. What is unclear is on what basis NPS has now decided to not allow any public long-term boarding at the park, even though the 1998 deed states the property shall be used in compliance with the approved program of utilization.

The statute authorizing the Federal Lands to Parks Program, in 40 U.S.C. 550(b) and (e), very broadly defines what is a public park and a public use. It states, "The [GSA] Administrator ... may assign to the Secretary of the Interior for disposal surplus real property, including buildings, fixtures, and equipment situated on the property, that the Secretary recommends as needed for use as a public park or recreation area."

To help clarify NPS's interpretation of the statute, the NPS Programs brochure provides background and summary information on the Federal Lands to Parks Program. It states that applicants to the program agree to "maintain the property for public park and recreational use in perpetuity." However, no specific information is provided to explain what constitutes such use. Certainly, no information concerning restrictions on the use of the buildings and fixtures transferred nor regarding limitations on horse boarding is provided.

Members of the Marina Equestrian Association (MEA), who have provided the boarding services, have put their own labor in to offset the normal commercial costs of operating a stable. The MEA has provided an opportunity for working-class families to experience horse ownership, in addition to hosting other public activities. MEA volunteers have provided public riding lessons, equine therapy programs for community members with special needs, and equine-assisted learning programs for veterans. The MEA has worked to put on the annual Fall Festival, providing wagon and pony rides and a petting zoo for local families. The MEC itself has also served as an emergency animal evacuation site, and MEA members have provided emergency care to animals from evacuated fire areas.

The NPS is working with the City of Marina to approve a new concessionaire agreement for the MEC. You told city staff and council that any amount of long-term boarding is no longer allowed at the park and cannot be included in a concession agreement. City staff and the Council also believe that NPS will take back the land if long-term boarding is included in the new

concession agreement, undermining the Council's ability to weigh all options for what would best benefit the local community.

Therefore, I request that you reconsider your prior decision regarding long-term boarding and allow the City Council to determine whether some long-term boarding is an appropriate use of the Marina Equestrian Center, provided that it is an equitable use of the park and supported by the community. I appreciate your attention to my concerns and look forward to discussing them further.

Subject: Final Request to Cure Non-Compliance, Marina Equestrian Center Park

Dear Mr. Long:

I am inquiring about the status of the draft concession agreement for the City-selected concessionaire, Chaparral Ranch, for the operation of the Marina Equestrian Center Park. Since the Marina City Council selected Chaparral Ranch in September of 2021, the National Park Service (NPS) has been waiting to receive a draft concession agreement to begin its required review. The City's failure to provide the promised concession agreement to resolve the documented non-compliance has placed the park in jeopardy.

Without an NPS-approved concessionaire agreement the operation of the Marina Equestrian Center Park continues to be out of compliance with the public recreational use requirement of the Federal Lands to Parks (FLP) deed. I write to express both the need for immediate action on the part of the City, and to give you an idea of the next steps we will take if corrective action is not forthcoming.

The City has been correctly and repeatedly informed by the NPS Regional FLP Program Manager, David Siegenthaler, that private, long-term horse boarding is not a legitimate and acceptable public recreational use of the park under the FLP Program requirements. As NPS has stated repeatedly through correspondences starting with Mayor Altfeld in November 2008 to more recently to Mayor Delgado in April 2021, no portion of the park may be dedicated to private use. That means that no pseudo-ownership concepts such as time shares or long-term rental agreements to individuals are allowed. If horse boarding is allowed at all, it must be of limited, short-term duration, and the rationale tied to specific recreational needs in a public park where the public are visitors as opposed to "residents". The City's plans for operation of the equestrian center must spell out how it will manage any such boarding services to ensure they align with the public recreational purpose mandated in the deed. The City has had a long history of allowing horse boarders to develop a sense of exclusive entitlement to access to, and use of, the equestrian center. NPS needs to see language (in the concessionaire agreement and/or management plan) and practice that prevents anyone from forming the expectation that they are assured of a secure boarding arrangement or home residency for a long-term. For example, if allowed at all, any boarding agreements should be of limited duration with explicit provisions regarding time limitations and non-renewability. Such labels as "public boarding" and "self-care boarding" must not be used to semantically obscure an intention to allow long-term horse boarding by private individuals.

Along with a statement regarding how the City intends to manage the equestrian center park, and the draft concession agreement with Chaparral Ranch, NPS requests that the City submit an explanation of its financial and organizational capability to operate and maintain the park and its facilities. In the past it

appears that the City intended the facilities to be operated, maintained and upgraded through the efforts of a volunteer organization. That effort has failed to achieve the public recreational purpose of the conveyance due to the private interests of the group and its lack of having a primary public service purpose. And it has failed to maintain the physical structures, due in part to the lack of sufficient City funding to support the park and its allowance of facility use with inadequate contributions by the limited number of users. In essence, the private, low-cost use of the park has been significantly subsidized by the public.

NPS is in conversation with the General Services Administration (GSA) regarding compliance enforcement options available to us in light of the City's long delay in making Marina Equestrian Center Park a truly public park. GSA agrees with us that a remedy is needed and supports our pursuit of remedial action by either: (1) voluntary reversion to federal ownership, (2) abrogation of the park use requirements through sale of the property to the city at fair market value, (3) transfer of the property to another governmental entity capable of operating the site as a public park or (4) as a last resort through an involuntary reversion, absent an adequate response by the city to our request for a public use plan that meets the public recreation purpose of the conveyance.

NPS continues to support the City's efforts to make the Marina Equestrian Center Park a truly public park. The City staff have put a great deal of effort into locating a concessioner which is capable of facilitating the City's plans to achieve those ends. Now is the time to terminate the hold private individuals and groups have on the City. To summarize, we are requesting the following by August 1, 2022.

- 1) A draft concession agreement for the operation of Marina Equestrian Center Park
- 2) A management plan regarding how the City intends to ensure the public park purpose is carried out, and that the park is open, available, and in good condition for park visitors.
- 3) A financial and organizational capability statement to support the City's plans for the Center.

If the City finds these requirements objectionable, NPS requests that the City consider a voluntary reversion of the property to federal ownership or purchase of the property at fair market value. If not, NPS and GSA will have, to pursue one of the other alternatives previously noted.

If you have any questions regarding these requirements, please feel free to contact our Regional FLP Program Manager, David Siegenthaler. Mr. Siegenthaler has consistently and accurately represented the policies and requirements of the National Park Service and the federal surplus property public benefit conveyance regulations in this matter.
