# Districting Process

| Step   | Description   |
|--|---|
| <b>Two Initial Hearings</b> Sept. 17 and Oct. 1  | Held prior to release of draft maps.  Education and to solicit input on the communities in the District.  Hearings must be within 30 days of each other |
| Release draft maps                               | Maps must be posted at least 7 days prior to 3 <sup>rd</sup> hearing.   |
| Two Hearings on Draft Maps November 5 and 19     | Two meetings to discuss and revise the draft maps and to discuss the election sequencing.  Hearings must be within 45 days of each other                |
| Introduce Ordinance or Final Adoption December 3 | Map must be posted 7 days prior to adoption.  |
| <b>Election Day</b><br>November 2020             | First by-district election held in two districts.   |
| Adjust Maps<br>2021                              | Map adjusted using 2020 Census data   |
| Election Day<br>November 2022                    | First by-district election held in two districts. (Mayor remains elected Citywide)  |



## Latino Concentrations

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Latino eligible voters are particularly concentrated along Sunset Ave between Carmel Ave and Reindollar Ave, and in the yellow Census Block along the outer ring of Hayes Circle.




### Asian Concentrations

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Asian-American eligible voters are somewhat more concentrated near the UCSC Center, but overall are not particularly geographically concentrated.

There are no geographic concentrations of African-American or Native American eligible voters in the City.





## Draft Maps


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
- □ Initially, 8 maps received from residents and two from NDC
  - Maps 101 110
- □ November 5<sup>th</sup>, Council narrowed focus to 104, 109 and 110
  - With directions for modifications to each to offset some population growth in the formerly Fort Ord area.
  - With relatively small districts, moving only a census block or two often leads to population imbalances, so most changes made by NDC are small
- □ November 19<sup>th</sup> ten maps were presented
  - Original 104, 109, 110, 111 (111 was not population-balanced),112 and 113
  - NDC-Revised 104b, 109b, 110b, 112b and 113
- □ Council narrowed focus to map 109b, with direction to add 100 people to District 2 from the surrounding districts.
  - With this Council direction NDC created map 109c.
